## Wakehurst Red win by 79 runs

Overcast skies greeted the commencement of the cricket season for the players and families of SPX Yellow, for its first match of the season at Nolans Reserve, North Manly. The opponents for this round 1 match were Wakehurst Red from the powerful Wakehurst club in the MWJCA, and a team that had been together for a number of years now.

For SPX Yellow this was a new season, with new players selected from three age groups across the college each with confidence and expectation for a strong start to the season, albeit with a player short to complete its roster. The toss was won by Wakehurst who choose to bat first on the usual flat synthetic pitches at Nolans, with the outfield a mixture of sand patches, gravel and grass. SPX Yellow weren't disappointed at bowling first as the general view was the ball may show early swing with the overcast skies.

SPX Yellow opened the bowling with Darcy Keenlyside, last season premier bowler in the division 2 competition and Nikolai Dimantha. Bowling was tight in those early overs with Darcy again showing his pedigree with a very tidy three over for 5 runs. The fall of the first wicket came early for Wakehurst courtesy of a brilliant piece of fielding by Eamon Boyle, who threw down the stumps from side-on for a run-out of the Wakehurst opener. Despite tight bowling and a number of close chances with balls landing only meters away from SPX fieldsmen, the next wicket to fall came with the score at 129 in the 21<sup>st</sup> over. The Wakehurst total of 165 at the end of the innings did not provide a true reflection of the quality of the SPX bowling and effort by the boys, rather it provided an early indication to the younger boys in the team of the quality of the batsmen they will encounter in Division 1. Darcy Keenlyside led the bowlers on the day, with Ben Vaccarella (0/13), Nikolai Dimantha (0/14) and Flynn Pavely receiving special mentions. Best bowling figures on the day came from the wicket takers for SPX Yellow, with Declan Carroll (1/15) and Antony DiMauro (1/16)

The SPX Yellow batting innings got off to a shaky start with the first wicket falling for 11, before a very good partnership steadied the run chase between Lachlan Jurcevic and Victor Mosmann. Both Lachlan and Victor showed patience, technique and the temperament to wait for the bad ball which, more often than not, was either dispatched to the boundary or over it. Lachlan takes the honours for the first six of the season with a lusty hit over mid-on. Unfortunately the fall of both Lachlan and Victor's wickets saw a middle order collapse and, with the tail-enders in search of quick runs and one batsmen short, the SPX innings came to an abrupt and unexpected end on 85 in the 22<sup>nd</sup> over.

Best of the batsmen were Lachlan Jurcevic with top score of 24, Victor Mosmann 19 and Eamon Boyle and Ben Vaccarella both with 10.

With plenty of batting practice to come at Thursday's training session for the middle order and, the cobwebs dusted off from the long break, the boys look forward to playing the other Wakehurst division 1 side for its next game.

Having minimal numbers in the field will create difficulties which these lads don't deserve. Any lad who is thinking about playing the season should, simple as that. It's a test.
