

# **South Sudanese Positive Parenting Program**

### Why this program?

South Sudanese in Australia face significant parenting challenges within their families as a result of changes in traditional parenting practices. There is a need to support families in developing a shared understanding of approaches to parenting which respects community tradition while integrating the societal and legal context pertaining to children and young people living in Victoria, Australia.

### What does the program aim to achieve?

The program aims to:

- Discuss current youth issues
- Increase knowledge and understanding within South Sudanese families regarding positive parenting approaches.
- Increase awareness among South Sudanese parents regarding relevant Victorian child and family systems, parenting responsibilities and children's rights.
- Provide opportunities for South Sudanese parents to connect and share parenting challenges and learnings.
- Support South Sudanese youth and provide pathways to increased community engagement.

## What will the day involve?

The program is being facilitated by Dr. Santino Atem Deng who gives presentations on family and parenting challenges and how to address them. Other service providers including Child Protection (DHHS), Child First, Victoria Police and Centre for Multicultural Youth (CMY) are presenting on the day.
