Liturgical Jottings Sacrifice

All the readings and psalm today contain the word sacrifice; albeit with different qualifiers. Exodus: communion sacrifice; Psalm 115: thanksgiving sacrifice; Hebrews: Christ as the perfect sacrifice; and Mark: the Passover lamb sacrificed. In our history, traditions and liturgy we are very familiar with the term "Sacrifice of the Mass" yet an unambiguous definition alludes us. The Old Testament has sacrifices of Abel to Moses, but the prophetic warnings of empty sacrifices. The New Testament attests to the cup of sacrifice and spiritual sacrifices. The history of religion gives five primary elements of sacrifice: homage, expiation, communion, gift and life. In Christ who is the sacrificer (priest) and sacrificed (victim), we enter the mystery of sacrifice in praise and thanksgiving.

Focus on the Readings

For the feast last year we were experiencing the Great Lockdown with church doors closed and public Masses suspended. Many were able to view live-streamed Masses on the internet or recorded Masses on TV. But we could not receive the Eucharist. This deprivation was felt more keenly on Easter and on this Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ. Catechumens and young children had their first Communion on a prolonged hold. Now we are back in Church (as I write this) or not if more outbreaks cause other lockdowns. In any case we still cannot receive communion from the chalice: the Blood of Christ.

The Cycle B Readings for this Sunday focus on the second of word in the title: "The Blood of Christ". Reminiscent of the Passover Ritual in Egypt Moses sprinkled the people with blood as a sign and seal of the covenant and means of recognition and identification as God's people. Thus the qualifier that it is a communion sacrifice. The Letter to the Hebrews stresses Christ's sacrifice establishes the new covenant with forgiveness of sins and universal salvation,

The Responsorial Psalm (115) gives a new dimension which is timely today as we offer a thanksgiving sacrifice: a sacrifice of the heart and service, of prayer and works of generosity,


On the Lighter Side

Given where we are across Victoria with the lockdown, our regular gatherings for the Eucharist have been disrupted again. Prior to COVID -19 when our receiving the Eucharist was under the form of bread and wine, this current Pandemic has forced us to see the Eucharist from receiving the host only. We can say the understanding we have of the Body and Blood of Christ has been disrupted. However way the Eucharist has been seen in our lives over the past twelve months, our faith objective is one of seeing this Sacrament of unity as a living source of nourishment through the Body and Blood of Christ.





what was known as a covenant relationship. Their identity was realized as a people God has chosen. Blood became a sign of sealing this relationship where the blood of animals became understood as a means of sacrifice and where the Israelite people freed from slavery in Egypt opened themselves to be a new people of unity. This ideal is being more than questioned today given the ongoing conflicts.

From this background we realize our identity as a people open to the unity our faith gives through the Eucharist. This identity giving us a relationship with the one who became The Sacrifice we enact each time we are drawn to the Lord's table. In light of this ... How do we value this Sacrament expressing our lives as the Living Body and Blood of Christ? the encouragement I bring to value is of Jesus who takes, blesses, breaks and gives, his flesh for my and our lives together.

The Body and Blood of Christ humanizes all we are and as a community of faith recognize our moments when we take, receive blessing, feel those moments when we are broken somewhat, and where our giving enables we build the Body and Blood of Christ within each other.

Responsorial Psalm: I will take the cup of salvation, and call on the name of the Lord.
