Common classroom expectations this year

Uniform – Hair policy 2023

Please take note that ‘mulletts’ are not acceptable in 2023 at St Patrick’s. If a student presents with this type of style, then a parent/carer will be asked to pick them up and organise for it to be cut. Students may not return to school until their hairstyle meets the guidelines. Similarly, hair longer than collar length should always be tied back neatly.

If a haircut and/or colouring does not meet College’s expectations:

- A letter will be sent home and time given to rectify the problem (by Monday Week 2, February 6).
- If the haircut or style is not rectified within the prescribed time, **students will be sent home until the problem is rectified.**

Mobile Phones policy for 2024

- In 2023, phones will be confiscated, **and parents will be asked to come to the main office to collect them. Phones will not be returned to the student.**

FAQ on mobiles

What if I need to purchase food at the canteen?

You can use your card or cash. All canteen staff are aware you cannot use your mobile for purchases

Mum or Dad might need to contact me during the day about something important. What can I tell them?

They can contact the reception for the message to be relayed to the teacher. In an emergency staff from reception may visit the classroom

What if work needs to call me?

You need to inform your employer that you can only take calls about your shifts or other matters afterschool (i.e. 3:30 onwards).

Other General Rules – Direct from the student diary

- **Courtesy:** Students are expected to treat staff and fellow students with courtesy at all times and to consider the dignity and rights of others. This includes Canteen staff, visitors etc. This includes appropriate language, and willingness to assist others without being requested to do so.
- **Liquid Paper (e.g. 'White Out')** No student is permitted to have this type of correction fluid at school
- **Chewing gum** No student is permitted to have chewing gum at school
- **Litter** Dropping litter shows lack of concern for the rights of others. Papers and food scraps must be placed in the bins provided.
- **Plagiarism** is the presentation of another's work as your own. It is considered a serious academic offence and will not be tolerated at St Patrick's College. Sources, printed and electronic, must be declared in your documentation. Any student who is discovered plagiarising any work from any type of resource will be notified and a letter sent to his parents. Any evidence of plagiarism will incur an 'N' result for the piece of work.
- **Punctuality** - Students are expected to arrive punctually to all classes and move quickly between classes.

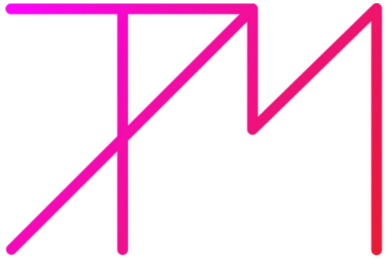


Youth Live 4 Life



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- Live4Life is the only mental health education and youth suicide prevention model designed specifically for rural and regional communities.
- The Crew: Youth Leadership and Participation Program
- Mental health training
 - Student representatives from year 10 are able to join a local Live4Life Crew. The role of The Crew is to assist in the delivery of events and drive key Live4Life messages at the school and in their community.



Tomorrow Man



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- The Tomorrow Man program will introduce students to the skills to empower men to re-define a healthier version of masculinity for themselves that will positively impact them and those they love the most.
- Throughout the year we hope to introduce the students to three presentations with various focus point
 - **Module one:** Breaking the Man Code – Exploring the impact of masculine gender stereotypes and expectations. Learning how to build stronger connection
 - **Module two:** The History of Man – Identify the positive and negative traits of men.
 - **Module three:** Man + the Mask – Explore how fear of judgement and excessive 'banter' affects individuals and the culture of a cohort.

One Night of Homelessness



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The One Night of Homelessness gives students an opportunity to engage with a social justice activity in which they develop empathy for the marginalized.

- The night involves the students experiencing what it might be like for those who sleep-rough (homelessness)
- The OnTrack foundation will present to the students and deliver soup to the boys utilizing their community bus.
