C.A.S. Hawker Scholarships are one of the most generous privately funded scholarships available to undergraduate students in Australia. Each residential scholarship is valued at up to \$60,000 over three years. The scholarships are available to all Australian students, and the majority are usually awarded to students entering their first year of university studies. Selection is largely based on personal qualities and demonstrated leadership as well as academic ability. Undergraduate Hawker Scholars are able to attend a range of Australian educational institutions, so this scholarship is not restricted to one university.

The Charles Hawker Scholarship perpetuates the memory of scholar, soldier and pastoralist Charles Allan Seymour Hawker and commemorates the achievements of one of Australia's most respected political leaders.

The 2023 C.A.S. Hawker Scholarships will open on Monday 5 December 2022 and close on Friday 6 January 2023.

> Pathways to Education Courses at Monash

There's more than one way to become a student at Monash. If you're interested in becoming a teacher, but do not meet the entry requirements for the <u>Bachelor of Education</u> (<u>Honours</u>), we offer a range of pathway programs to help you achieve your goal.

There are options including -

Diploma of Tertiary Studies (DoTS)

Students who have completed Year 12 but did not quite meet the entry requirements for their dream course, DoTS might be the pathway to consider. On successful completion of the DoTS - Education stream, students can transfer into the second year of the:

- o Bachelor of Education (Honours) in Early Childhood and Primary Education
- o Bachelor of Education (Honours) in Primary Education
- o Bachelor of Education (Honours) in Primary and Secondary Health and Physical Education
- o Bachelor of Education (Honours) in Secondary Health and Physical Education

This diploma is equivalent to the first year of a university undergraduate degree. In addition to the Education courses listed above, on successful completion of DoTS, students can get up to one year of credit towards a range of degrees in *business*, *business* administration and nursing.

• <u>Diploma of Higher Education (DoHE)</u>

The Diploma of Higher Education (DoHE) might suit students who have completed Year 12 but did not quite meet the entry requirements for their dream course, if they are returning to study, or would benefit from additional learning support.

On successful completion of the DoHE - Education stream, students can transfer into <u>second</u> <u>year</u> of the:

o Bachelor of Education (Honours) in Primary and Secondary Education

In addition, students can receive up to one year of credit into the following Education courses:

- o Bachelor of Education (Honours) in Primary and Secondary Inclusive Education
- o Bachelor of Education (Honours) and Bachelor of Arts Primary or Secondary Education
- Bachelor of Education (Honours) and Bachelor of Business Primary or Secondary Education
- o Bachelor of Education (Honours) and Bachelor of Science *Primary or Secondary Education*

The Diploma of Higher Education can also provide you with entry into second year of the single degree Bachelor of Science.

• Monash College Diploma

Students who have narrowly missed the entry requirements for direct entry into an education double degree, might consider a Monash College Diploma. As part of the *arts, business, and science* diploma program, students can choose an education studies specialisation which includes two education studies units and 10 days of professional experience.

On successful completion of the diploma, students will be eligible for direct entry into the second year of the following double degrees:

- o Bachelor of Education (Honours) and Bachelor of Arts *Primary or Secondary Education*
- Bachelor of Education (Honours) and Bachelor of Business Primary or Secondary Education
- o Bachelor of Education (Honours) and Bachelor of Science Primary or Secondary Education

Non-teaching degree followed by Master of Teaching

If a student attains an ATAR score that does not meet the requirements for direct entry into the Bachelor of Education (Honours), including double degrees, students can consider enrolling in <u>another course</u> - e.g. Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science, followed by the <u>Master of Teaching</u> to qualify as a teacher.

> Subject Adjustments towards the Bachelor of Science

Our VTAC Subject Adjustment rewards students studying more than one Year 12 science subject – this could improve your selection rank by providing additional points (up to 8) towards your ATAR aggregate.

Note: Subject adjustments do not apply to International Fee-paying applicants (IFP).

Visit <u>VTAC Subject Adjustment</u> and gauge what your *new* estimated ATAR might be for entry into the <u>Bachelor of Science</u>.

Deakin is ranked in the top 1% of universities worldwide for media and communication (QS World University Rankings by Subject 2022), and the following courses will allow students to develop real expertise in their areas of interest.

<u>Bachelor of Communication</u> – with majors in *Advertising, Digital and Social Media, Journalism* and *Public Relations*.

<u>Bachelor of Film, Television and Animation</u> – with majors in *Animation, Producing Screen Content,* and *Screen Production*


The minors on offer are: Animation and Motion Graphics, Film Studies, Producing Screen Content, Scriptwriting, and Visual Effects and Virtual Production.

The good news is that employment in the Arts and Media sector is growing. Job opportunities are projected to increase by 8.7% over a five-year period to 2026 (Australian Government 2021 National Skills Commission Projection). Communication and Creative Arts students undertake **Your Future Career** units as part of an **employability sequence** to help them achieve their creative arts dreams. Here, they connect their personal and professional

aspirations and expand on their entrepreneurial mindset. They also engage in networking opportunities with our industry partners to build their own lively creative community.

In 2023, Deakin will be home to Australia's <u>biggest university virtual production studio</u>. In partnership with Dreamscreen Australia students have the opportunity to experience industry placements working on features, music videos, TV dramas, gaming, and commercials side-by-side with Dreamscreen industry professionals. Many candidates lose the job in the first minute of the interview by not thinking carefully about their initial impact. *John Lees* shares his expert interview tips.

1 Don't waste the opening moments

Many candidates lose the job in the first minute of the interview by not thinking carefully about their initial impact. Interviewers make a quick initial decision about your personality from the moment you arrive, based on how you look and sound. Dress as if you already work there and you've just been promoted. Make those initial seconds relaxed and upbeat as you can, even if you're just talking about your journey.

2 Don't over-deliver

Most candidates say too much. Interviewers are not that interested, and will usually accept a short, positive answer and move on. Practise compressing your evidence into good short stories no more than 3 minutes long setting out what problem you were handling, what you did, how you did it, and what the result was.

3 Don't act like a stranger

Leave your coat, umbrella, and bag in reception. Just take in a slim folder into the interview room containing the documents you need, and you will look like an employee rather than a visitor.

4 Don't try to wing difficult questions

Don't duck predictable questions about your know-how and skill level – think carefully about good examples. Equally predictable questions cover things like strengths (talk about qualities that match the job) and weaknesses (talk about skills you are improving and make it clear that you're a fast learner).

Deakin University – Deakin Accelerate

Deakin Accelerate is a distinctive VCE higher education program that allows students to study <u>two</u> first-year university subjects during Year 12. Studying one subject per trimester, this selective program gives students a head-start into university studies and also provides a potential boost to their all-important ATAR score.

Besides the challenge of taking on a university subject, this subject will also count as part of the VCE and contribute towards the ATAR as the fifth or sixth subject. There are no tuition fees for Deakin Accelerate.

Federation University – Advance to University

Advance to University is an opportunity for Year 12 students to study first year university units as part of their VCE. Successful completion of these units may contribute towards the ATAR, and students get credit towards their university degree. There are no fees for Advance to University.

La Trobe University – Achieve and Achieve Plus Programs

Achieve is an opportunity for high achieving Year 12 VCE students to complete a university subject in either the first or second semester in their Year 12 and have them recognised as part of their VCE.

Achieve Plus is an opportunity for high achieving Year 12 VCE students to complete a pair of first-year university subjects – one in each semester – in their Year 12 and have them recognised as part of their VCE.

Both programs are offered at all La Trobe campuses and subjects are delivered online, face-to-face, or a combination of both. There are also no fees associated with these Programs. Find out more, including the subjects on offer at Achieve and Achieve Plus Programs.

> RMIT University - VCE Extension

RMIT's VCE Extension allows Year 12 students to undertake university subjects while completing their VCE. These courses are VCAA-accredited towards VCE results and students may be eligible for credit in a related RMIT program.

Students will get a taste of university life; they attend lectures and study on campus with full access to all the services and facilities enjoyed by RMIT students. *VCE Extension* subjects are taught at the City campus and are counted towards students VCE and provide a boost to their ATAR. RMIT charges no fees for RMIT Extension courses.

University of Melbourne – Extension Program

The *Extension Program* is an opportunity for high achieving Year 12 students to study a university subject whilst at school which counts towards their ATAR, as well as experience university life. The University of Melbourne does not charge any fees for participation in the Extension Program.

 they are studying in New Zealand. If they are studying distance learning papers from
 outside of New Zealand, they will need to pay international fees. They are also not eligible
 to apply for the New Zealand Student Loan or Allowance unless they have been living in
 New Zealand for at least three years and are normally living in New Zealand. For further
