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THE BIRTH OF OUR SCHOOL



At the beginning of 1924, a new district high school for the boroughs of Mordialloc and Carrum commenced its foundation year in temporary accommodation at the Mordialloc Mechanics' Institute in Albert Street (pictured above).

On 18 February 1924, the local paper reported a sea of "bright-faced happy children" at the Chelsea and Edithvale stations eagerly awaiting the 8.44am train to take them to their new high school. Cr George Beardsworth, one of the pioneering campaigners for the

local school, was given the honour of officially opening the new Mordialloc District High School at its temporary location. He said:

"...it was a red-letter day in the history of the municipalities of Carrum and Mordialloc. The long looked-for high school was declared open and commenced in real earnest, the business of educating pupils."

This first year saw an enrolment of 148 students, in grades six, seven and eight. However, one sour note on this opening day was crticisim of the

decision to name the school Mordialloc District High School – the residents of Chelsea were upset that the name did not include them. Consequently, in August 1924, the name was changed to Mordialloc-Carrum High School. In the century that followed, this would not be the last time the school's name was changed.

By 1925, the school was already outgrowing the temporary space at the Mechanics' Institute, so a decision was made to lease additional premises.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

We're already well into the 2023 school year, with 218 Year 7 students (making a Middle School of 658 students). With 242 students having moved into Year 10 from Year 9, we

also now have a Senior School of 576 students. This brings our total school enrolment this year is 1,234 students. We had to knock back 40 out-of-zone applications for Year 7 for 2023 as we had reached our enrolment capacity.

We look forward to all students continuing their positive attitude throughout 2023, and staying focused on achieving their personal best and striving to improve. I am proud to be the Principal of Mordialloc College, and I hope that everyone is proud to be a part of the Mordialloc College community. I am looking forward to the rest of the year and have faith that, once again, all students will make the most of the opportunities and challenges that are presented to them.

EXCELLENT YEAR 12 RESULTS AND DUX 2022

I am pleased to report that in 2022, Mordialloc College students achieved an excellent success rate in completing their VCE studies.

Some of the highlights include:

- ◆ 14 students achieved an ATAR in the 90s (12.5%) of the cohort, 20 students in the 80s which is 17.9% of the cohort, (30.4% of the cohort above 80) and 22 students scoring in the 70s which is 19.6% of cohort, and 50% of cohort above 70. Thus, 50% of our cohort were in the top 30% of the State!
- A median study score of 30.
- 82.7% of our cohort applying for a tertiary placement, with 100% being successful.

This is a truly outstanding set of results and a credit to all staff and students who have worked so hard to achieve so much — not only last year, but over the course of their six-year journey.

In addition, congratulations go to all our Year 12 VCAL students for completing all their course requirements and receiving offers to complete diplomas, traineeships, and apprenticeships.

All of our Year 12 students can all be very proud of their achievements.

Special mention also goes to our very high achievers who scored in the 90s. I am proud to be able to list these outstanding students below (I was able to contact 13 out of the 14, so cannot mention one student without their permission).

Congratulations first to our **DUX** for **2022**, **Aaliyah Zaph** achieving an ATAR of 99.45 – an absolutely sensational result to make it to the top 1% of State results. Aaliyah scored a perfect score of 50 for Health and Human Development! She plans to study a Bachelor of Fine Arts at Melbourne University.

I would also like to congratulate the following students:

In the top 3% of the State: Tristan Cox achieved an ATAR of 97.3 and plans to study Neuroscience at Melbourne University; Max Telfer achieved an ATAR of 97.25 and plans to study Computer Science at Monash University; and Tim Whitford achieved an ATAR of 97.05 and plans to study Science at Monash University. In the top 4% of the State: Jade Goodman achieved an ATAR of 96.1 and plans to study Science at Melbourne University. In the top 5% of the State: Tamsyn Russell achieved an ATAR of 95.55 and plans to study Commerce/Science at Monash University.

In the top 7% of the State: Tom Krivacevic achieved an ATAR of 93.35; Lachlan Tomlinson achieved an ATAR of 93.35 and plans to study Commerce at Monash University; Beth Rowland achieved an ATAR of 93.3, Indiana Tsiros achieved an ATAR of 93.25 and plans to study Arts at Monash University; and India Thomas achieved an ATAR of 93.25 and plans to study Journalism or Psychology. In the top 8% of the State: Jeneya Tran achieved an ATAR of 92.95 and plans to study Law at Monash University; In the top 10% of the State: Emma Schultz scored an ATAR of 90.1.

On a subject level, we achieved excellent results far exceeding the State average, including for English, Biology, Business Management, Product Design, Food Studies, Japanese, Physics, Visual Communication and Studio Arts.

While we celebrate individual student

success stories, it is important to remind everyone that your final ATAR score does not define you as a person. In the end it is a rank for tertiary admission.

It won't necessarily determine where you go in the future or how happy you will be. All students should feel proud of their efforts and be satisfied they have given their personal best.

BUILDING PROGRAM UPDATE

We are very excited that after many delays, our new plexipave outside basketball and netball courts were ready for student use from Monday 27 February (pictured below).

We have had a new electronic front sign installed – you may have noticed that our current electronic sign stopped working during Term 4 last year (not surprising, given it was over 10 years old).

I have approved the schematic designs with the DET-appointed architects for the replacement of our balcony and lower back wall facing the courtyard, as well as the windows in the two-storey building at the front of the school.

These plans include enclosing the balcony upstairs to protect it from the weather, in particular rain which led to damage and leakage issues.

This will make it safer, provide carpeted break-out spaces outside of the classrooms upstairs and will overall produce a more user-friendly space.

It is anticipated that these works will be completed in the middle of the year, during the school holiday break.



2022 SCHOOL TOUR

We had a terrific turnout of past students across all decades for our annual Past Students and Staff School Tour. The eldest member of the tour was the amazing Mavis Angliss (née Park) who remembers her time at MCHS in the early 1940s vividly. Another highlight was having the company of several teachers who commenced at the school in the 1970s.

It was a fast-paced tour with our tour leader Principal Michelle Roberts, but it was hard to resist going 'off course' with two former science teachers who were still just as fun and adventurous as they had always been.

Reunions between our teachers on the tour and their past students (some of whom are now teachers at the school) provided some special moments. Loretta llott and Ariana Nickou are now teachers at our school and were delighted to meet up with their past teachers. We feature Ariana and Loretta and their happy memories on pages 7 and 8 of this issue of *Ventured*.

CLASS OF 1992 REUNION





THE BIRTH OF OUR SCHOOL (CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

In 1927, the building of the new school commenced in accordance with plans prepared by the Public Works Department.


The plans show a two-storey building with administrative office, entrance hall and chemistry and physics rooms on the ground floor. A cookery room complete with fuel, gas and electric stoves, sinks and tables, pantry and scullery with an adjacent dining room was also on this floor, plus an art room and boys' and girls' common room and library. The second floor had seven classrooms, three of which were divided by accordion screens to make one large assembly hall.

A separate block accommodated a manual training centre with sheet metal room, smithy and woodwork room completely fitted up for trade work.

The building was of brick with a colour blend tile roof and included a septic tank installed for sewerage purposes. The contract price was £20,990 with Messrs R L Phillips and Son of Murrumbeena being granted the contract. The building was completed in late 1927, and the official opening was conducted by the Minister of Education, Mr J Lemmon, in March 1928.

The images of the architect's plans were photographed by Archival Access at the Public Record Office and provided to the MCAA. We extend a big thank you to Mark Grealy for his help and generosity. 

LESLEY COLSEY (NÉE FLETCHER), MCHS 1947-1948

Lesley's singing took a classical direction, and she joined choirs, including a festival choir in South Australia, as well as the London Philharmonic Orchestra under the baton of Sir Malcolm Sargent. Wonderful experiences!

A great thrill was joining the World Festival Choir, with choristers from all over the world. Pavarotti was the star attraction – of course – and it was exciting to be part of it, says Lesley. As a member of the choir she sang Verdi's Messa di Requiem twice –



"The Australian choir had fewer singers, whereas overseas we had nearly 1,000 voices – exciting!"

Lesley almost made it to Japan with the World Festival Choir, but Pavarotti "pulled the pin". Although disappointed, she travelled to Japan independently at a later stage.

Lesley will turn 90 this year and enjoyed meeting fellow ex-students. She was

meeting fellow ex-students. She was especially excited to reunite with Patricia Sweetser (née O'Connor), who she sat with at school for two years.



PAM NISBET (NÉE FLETCHER), MCHS 1952-1953

Between the ages of 8 and 12, Pam was attending Eisteddfods, and with her grandmother in tow, won quite a number of them. At 14, she became the resident singer with the Mentone Town Hall band. After success in several radio competitions she was asked to join Swallows Juniors, a popular talent show, until she turned 16. Pam takes up the story...

"Radio was a wonderful experience for me, as it enabled me to get a job singing at Leggetts Ballroom twice a week.

"I continued working at a lot of other venues like Ziegfields, Hawthorn and St Kilda Town Hall dances and many more.



"At 16, I was lucky enough to be invited to the Channel 2 studios to perform in a weekly show called *Variety Review*. This show ran for six weeks and that was my first introduction to television, where I learned techniques for performing in front of a camera. Another ABC show was *Old Time Ballroom* — also a six-week period.

"In 1960, Channel 9 had a show called *Toddy Time*, for up and coming entertainers. I was lucky enough to win, which gave me my introduction into IMT with Graham Kennedy. From then on, my life changed completely, with me travelling all over Australia performing at clubs, hotels and on local TV shows. "In 1962, I was offered a three-month contract to perform doing floor show and band work for the Cockpit Hotel in Singapore – a great experience for me. I returned the following year for another three months. While I was there, I did some singing commercials and performed at the opening of their first television station, making me the first European ever to perform on their television network. A fascinating experience!

"Other career highlights were performing at Government House for the Bicentennial Ball with the Max Causon Big Band, being the supporting act to Shirley Bassey and Warren Mitchell (Alf Garnett). "I continue singing, but these days it is all for charity. A group of us perform under the title of 'Merry Melodies', for church groups and retirement places. We all get a lot of enjoyment seeing people come alive to music. It really is great medicine for a lot of lonely people."

ARIANA NICKOU, MCHS 1998-2003

"I was at Mordy from 1998-2003, after which I went on to study Science at Deakin University in Geelong. After that, I took a year off to travel and then came back and did my undergraduate in teaching.

"I eventually moved back to this side of the Bay and returned to Mordy, but this time as a science teacher. I've taught chemistry, VCAL and some maths, and I am now teaching Year 7-9 science.

"My greatest memories of school – and likely my inspiration – are Mr Mac and Mr Osborne, my chemistry and biology teachers. I remember sitting in my VCE science classes being wowed by the things we were learning and wanting to know more, and I try to incorporate that feeling into my science classes now to help foster that love for learning that I had and continue to have."
