Liturgical JottingsEucharistic Prayer part 10 Origins

In the past nine weeks we looked at the different elements of the Eucharistic prayer. These nine elements evolved very early in the Church's liturgy with both scriptural evidence from the Gospels and the letters of Paul, particularly on the words of the institution narratives. Other early writings such as the Didache (pre 100AD), the Apostolic Constitutions the Anaphora of Addai and Mari, and the Apostolic Tradition contain other elements. The form and structure also their roots in Jewish table grace and synagogue prayers and blessings which in turn have origins in the writings of the psalms and the prophets. Before fixed written Eucharistic Prayers the celebrant prayed according to circumstances and his oratorical skills. One of the first fixed prayers was written for the purpose of con-celebration. It is ofnow the basis Second Eucharistic Prayer.

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Looking at the Readings

What is Wisdom?. The reading from the book of wisdom gives some clues: Wisdom is bright, quick and readily available to those who seek it. From the book of Wisdom and the wisdom literature as a whole we learn that wisdom is not knowledge nor a science nor an exercise of judgement but a reflection of God's own wisdom, his desire, his purpose. The author personifies wisdom, it is an attribute or "person" of God.

To be a wise bridesmaid is more than to be careful with the lamp oil reserves. The parable of Jesus, as humorous as it is intriguing and full of symbolic meaning, highlights the difference between the wise and the foolish. The wise prepare and plan, keep watch and wait, recognise the Lord's coming and go out to meet him.

Jesus, later in his passion, asks his disciples to keep vigil, to pray. It is in the night that his betrayer and adversaries arrive, it is in darkness that he dies and in darkness that he rises to new life, He is the door that we must enter into life. In the rite of Baptism the newly baptised are given a lighted candle lit from the Paschal (Easter) Candle with the words: "... this light is entrusted to you to be kept burning brightly, so that ... enlightened by Christ, [you] may walk always as children of the light and, persevering in the faith, may run to meet the Lord when he comes."

Quote for the Week

During the whole of this time in which this age, representing night, is running its course, the Church is keeping vigil, the eyes of her faith fixed upon the holy scriptures as upon lamps lit at night, until the Lord comes. When he will find his Church awake and watching with mind alight and alert, then he will rouse her even from her bodily sleep in the tombs. *St Augustine - sermon 223 D.*

Reflection from Fr Rene

Saving Our Souls Is Our Primary Responsibility

At first glance, we might think that the wise virgins in today's Gospel were selfish or mean. However, that's not the case. According to the customs of the time, their role in the wedding feast was to welcome the newlywed couple to the bridegroom's home after the wedding. This was their responsibility. Giving away their oil would have meant shirking their responsibility since there was simply not enough oil for ten lamps. In the same way, being unfaithful to Christ and his Church, regardless of the pretext, would be equally irresponsible.

The First Reading teaches us the same lesson. Ancient philosophers believed that wisdom was the key to a meaningful and fulfilling life. This was the object of the human person's greatest quest and must be sought after and desired beyond all other things. Everything else was secondary. In biblical terms, this is still true for us today. It is Wisdom, which is God Himself and God's love as experienced and grasped by the human heart, that is "resplendent and unfading." The rest of the goods of this world come to an end, wear out and do not fill our hearts.

We shouldn't ignore the most obvious lesson of Christ's parable. We all have the possibility of salvation, of entering into eternal life with God and the saints. However, we also face the possibility of damnation, of being excluded from heaven. Christ couldn't have made it clearer: "Then the door was locked." It all depends on what we choose to seek as our highest goal. Our primary responsibility in life, the best use of our freedom, consists of making our friendship with God into that highest goal, which is true wisdom. However, God won't force us to do that; if He did, it wouldn't be friendship.

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians Second Reading:

The day of the Lord is going to come like a thief in the night.

You will not be expecting us to write anything to you, brothers, about 'times and seasons', since you know very well that the Day of the Lord is going to come like a thief in the night. It is when people are saying, 'How quiet and peaceful it is' that the worst suddenly happens, as suddenly as labour pains come on a pregnant woman; and there will be no way for anybody to evade it.

But it is not as if you live in the dark, my brothers, for that Day to overtake you like a thief. No, you are all sons of light and sons of the day: we do not belong to the night or to darkness, so we should not go on sleeping, as everyone else does, but stay wide awake and sober.
