Occupation Shortage Report - June 2025

The Occupation Shortage Report offers analysis on possible shortage pressures in the labour market. Some highlights this quarter:

- The national vacancy fill rate rose to 70.6%, showing employers are filling jobs more easily.
- Both metropolitan (72.2%) and regional (65.8%) fill rates improved, narrowing the gap between city and country.
- Fill rates for Skill Level 3 occupations (55.1%) remain well below other skill levels, despite some improvement over the year.
- A new Mismatch Index (MI) highlights uneven distribution of applicants and vacancies across occupations.
 - o In 2024–25, 30% of applicants would need to switch occupations for a balanced market, down from 33% in 2023–24.
 - o Professionals account for more than one-third of the mismatch.
 - A better balance could be achieved if some applicants shifted from Clerical and Administrative roles to Community and Personal Service work.

Applicants can be assessed on formal qualifications, life experiences and other transferable skills. Applicants are encouraged to identify when they apply via QTAC or UAC so they can be considered for Griffith's dedicated pathway options if they are not meeting the standard admission criteria. Once they are a student, the GUMURRII Student Support Unit can also provide ongoing assistance from orientation through to graduation.

Young Indigenous Women's STEM Academy - CSIRO

CSIRO's award winning Young Indigenous Women's STEM Academy is a national program for young Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander women from high school through to higher education, tertiary pathways and graduate employment. Ordering your QTAC preferences properly

Go to the <u>QTAC website</u> (scroll down quite a way to the heading 'Preferences') and P11 in your QTAC Guide for information about managing your preferences. It is important to plan your preferences well. When preferencing your courses you should have:

Preferences 1 & 2 - Your dream courses aligning with your passions and aspirations.

Preferences 3 & 4 - Your backup options that include the less competitive courses within the same field or a different field that interests you.

Preferences 5 & 6 - Your courses that will see you start tertiary study and when successful, improve your tertiary rank for competing for a future course.

Your sixth preference should be one that you have a very good chance of gaining entry to, given its previous adjusted ATAR/Tertiary Rank and your results. You also need to check the offer round dates of your preferences and make changes if the dates differ (preferences need to be chronologically organised according to the offer round of the courses you are applying for).

Courses you are offered in early offer rounds can be conditionally accepted and you can change your preferences for subsequent offer rounds if necessary.

Don't include wasted courses/preferences. Wasted courses include those that:

- You do not meet the entry requirements
- You would not do if you got an offer for them
- Are located in regional centres that you have not consulted your parents/guardians about
- Are too difficult or impossible to commute to given where you live
- Are very competitive and you listed them below much less competitive courses.

3 Myths About Early Entry Programs

You've heard about Early Entry programs but there's a lot of muddled info out there. Year 13 have broken down some of the biggest myths surrounding how you can lock in a place at a great uni! Just a heads up, they're using the University of New England (UNE) as an example in the article and not all universities have the same early entry policies, so make sure you check up on all the different policies of any unis you're applying to. Myth 1: If I'm planning on using an early entry scheme, I don't have to worry about my marks in Year 11 or Year 12

Myth 2: Getting an Early Entry offer means I can't apply for other courses later

Myth 3: You can apply for any course you want via the Early Entry Program

Course Seeker -

<u>Course Seeker</u> is an Australian Government initiative where you can search and compare thousands of courses from different institutions across Australia. The website displays course information, entry requirements, admission processes, student satisfaction and graduate survey results. It is particularly helpful if you are thinking of studying interstate.

Early offers

Offers made through Universities' Early Offer schemes for Year 12 are mostly being made by QTAC, however, some are made directly from the institution. If you get an offer, your options are:

- accepting the offer outright
- accepting the offer conditionally
- deferring (depending on the university).

If you accept an early offer outright, your QTAC application will stop there. If the university allows you to conditionally accept your early offer and you choose this option, you need to go back into your QTAC application and reorder your course preferences putting your most desired course as your Number 1 preference. You will then be eligible for consideration in the next offer round. Fast track options - are they suitable for you?

Institutions use a semester system with two periods of study: the first from around March to June, followed by a short winter break and the second from around July to November, followed by a long summer break while some institutions and courses have a third period of study that takes place during the traditional summer break. These three periods are called trimesters. By fitting an extra semester's worth of material into each year, students can graduate from their course sooner (for example, a standard three-year bachelor degree may be completed in two years). These accelerated options are known as "fast-tracked" courses. The Good Universities Guide has put together an article that sets out the positives and negatives of the fast-track option so you can decide if it's for you.

Micro-apprenticeships could bimprove your employability after Uni

Micro-apprenticeships are mini on-the-job training programs run by an employer, that build on the skills, knowledge or experience gained during University degrees/Diplomas and can cover an incredible variety of industry-specific skills. Being much shorter than a typical endorsed work placement, micro-apprenticeships are highly accessible and are becoming increasingly sought after when kickstarting a STEM career. They're specifically designed to supercharge your transferrable skills and get you up-skilled – ideally by your employer. Click here to find out more.

Open Universities Australia

If you can't get to a Uni campus (perhaps interstate or you are regional) or only want to study one subject/course to start with, then Open Universities Australia may be your answer. Open Universities Australia (OUA) offers online higher education courses through OUA, you can:

- Study online, so you have flexibility about when and where you study
- Choose from a large range of undergraduate courses
- Select individual undergraduate units/courses/subjects instead of a whole course
- Study with Australian universities e.g. Monash, Griffith, Macquarie, Curtin, RMIT, Swinburne University of Technology, University of South Australia and many more
- Graduate with the same qualification as an on-campus student
- Access online support services.

UQ's Adjustment Factors - are you eligible?

Adjustment factors aren't extra ATAR points, they don't actually change your overall ATAR. They are bonus that tertiary institutions (such as universities) add onto your ATAR to increase your selection rank, helping you get into specific programs at that institution. It's important to know that different institutions have
