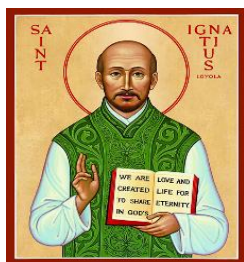


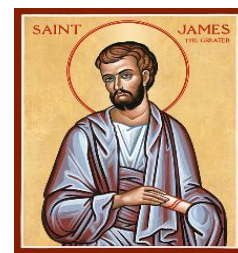

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had
all met in one room, when suddenly they heard
what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven,
the noise of which filled the entire house in which
they were sitting; and something appeared to them
that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated
and came to rest on the head of each of them. They
were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to
speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them
the gift of speech.

Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem
from every nation under heaven, and at this sound
they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear
these men speaking his own language. They were
amazed and astonished. ‘Surely’ they said ‘all
these men speaking are Galileans? How does it
happen that each of us hears them in his own
native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites;
people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and
Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and
Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round
Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome – Jews and
proselytes alike – Cretans and Arabs; we hear
them preaching in our own language about the
marvels of God.’

No one can say, ‘Jesus is Lord’ unless he is under
the influence of the Holy Spirit.

There is a variety of gifts but always the same Spirit;
there are all sorts of service to be done, but always
to the same Lord; working in all sorts of different
ways in different people, it is the same God who is
working in all of them. The particular way in which
the Spirit is given to each person is for a good
purpose.

Just as a human body, though it is made up of many
parts, is a single unit because all these parts, though
many, make one body, so it is with Christ. In the one
Spirit we were all baptised, Jews as well as Greeks,
slaves as well as citizens, and one Spirit was given
to us all to drink

GOSPEL *Luke 17:5-10**A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke*

The apostles said to the Lord, ‘Increase our faith.’ The
Lord replied, ‘Were your faith the size of a mustard seed
you could say to this mulberry tree, “Be uprooted and
planted in the sea”, and it would obey you.

‘Which of you, with a servant ploughing or minding
sheep, would say to him when he returned from the
fields, “Come and have your meal immediately”? Would
he not be more likely to say, “Get my supper laid; make
yourself tidy and wait on me while I eat and drink. You

can eat and drink yourself afterwards”? Must he be grateful to the servant for doing what he was told? So with you: when you have done all you have been told to do, say, “We are merely servants: we have done no more than our duty.”

PRAYERS OF THE FAITHFUL WORLD DAY OF MIGRANTS AND REFUGEES 5 OCTOBER 2025

PRESIDER:

Merciful God and Father of all, wake us from the slumber of indifference, and open our eyes to the suffering of our migrant and refugee brothers and sisters. Inspire us, as nations, communities and individuals, to see that those who come to our shores are our brothers and sisters, as we gather around the table of the Eucharist.

READER:

For Pope Leo and all our clergy in the Church, that they may be encouraged by our prayers and support to lead God's people in building a culture of a future that respects the human dignity of all migrants. (Pause for silent prayer) Lord, hear us.

We pray that believers in different religious traditions might work together to defend and promote peace, justice and human fraternity. (Pause for silent prayer) Lord hear us.

For refugees, who are forced to flee from their homes and experiencing great suffering, that God brings them to a place of peace and safety and bring peace to their country of origin. (Pause for silent prayer) Lord, hear us.

For all people, that they may grow in awareness of the issue of migration and become a voice calling for greater protection of our migrants and refugees. (Pause for silent prayer) Lord, hear us.

For policy makers in our nations, that God grant them the wisdom to enact laws that provide greater protection and support for all migrant populations who yearn for a new beginning. (Pause for silent prayer) Lord, hear us.

For the United Nations and global organizations, that they be strengthened in their commitment to assist migrants and refugee resettlements. (Pause for silent prayer) Lord, hear us. For migrant workers, that they may labor in safe and just conditions, and that we who benefit from their labor may be truly grateful for what they provide. (Pause for silent prayer) Lord, hear us.

For migrants, refugees, and all other strangers in our midst, that they may find strength in our concern for justice and feel the warmth of our love. (Pause for silent prayer) Lord, hear us.

We pray for those who have died recently . . . , and those whose anniversary of death occurs around this time. We pray especially for those who have died along the way of migrant journeys. May they find their place of rest in the Kingdom of God. (Pause for silent prayer) Lord, hear us.

PRESIDER:

Father, listen to our prayers. We recognize that we are one human family, all migrants, journeying together in hope with Jesus, who once was a migrant himself. May the Eucharist bring us “to act justly, love tenderly and walk humbly” with one another for a world where Justice. Peace, Integrity of Creation and Solidarity pervade, now and forever.
