Liturgical Jottings Morning Prayer

The Liturgy of the Hours, also called the Divine Office is the official book of prayers of the church. The daily prayers are set out in "Hours". The two hinges of the day are morning and evening prayer with smaller "hours" completing the day: prayer during the day and night prayer. Also included is the Office of Readings. The morning prayer is also known as "Lauds" from the Latin "Laudate" meaning Praise coming from the last three Psalms. It is one of the most ancient Christian rites tracing back to the Apostles. The Prayer is recited at daybreak to give praise to God for the new day and to offer the work of the forthcoming day to the Lord. It consists of several elements: a hymn, a morning psalm, an Old Testament canticle, a psalm of praise, short scripture reading and responsory, the Benedictus (hymn of Zechariah), intercessions, the Lord's Prayer and concluding prayer or Collect. The texts and antiphons are according to the liturgical day, season or feast.

Looking at the Gospel

Today we hear how the Spirit of God dwells in all of us, helping us in our weakness. The first disciples had Jesus to explain the parables; we have the Spirit to enlighten us. It is the Spirit who helps us to interpret the teaching of Jesus and to be receptive to the challenges that they pose.

The presence of sinners in the kingdom of God is often a stumbling block to good people. There will be a time for separation and judgment, but the time is not now. This means that the righteous will have to live with the sinner and, even more challengingly, show them the same kind of concern that they show to others. The presence of sinners does not necessarily erode the quality of the kingdom. Rather, it provides disciples an opportunity to rise to the occasion of generosity and forgiveness.

There are two images of judgment in the readings. The one in the gospel is terrifying and decisive. The wicked are bound together into bundles and readied for burning. We must remember that this is a parable. In the first reading and in the psalm response the justice of God is said to be lenient, clement and kind. The power of God is demonstrated not in retribution but in mercy. God is said to be 'merciful and gracious, slow to anger and abounding in kindness and fidelity', and repentance is a very real possibility. This is the image that gives us hope. © Dianne Bergant CSA

Pope Francis on Good & Evil, Wheat and Weeds

The Lord helps us to understand that good and evil cannot be identified with specific areas or human groups: "These are the good, those are the bad". He tells us that the boundary line between good and evil passes through the heart of each of us. Then Jesus teaches us a different way of looking at the field of the world, of observing reality. We are called to learn God's time — which is not our time — and also God's "gaze": thanks to the beneficial influence of uneasy anticipation, what were weeds or seemed to be weeds can become a good product. REFLECTION FROM FR PETER

Both bring a combined ministry of 120 years of Priesthood. This is some total!!! As each celebrate 60 years of priesthood. We applaud both Mgr. Peter and Fr John in this time of celebration and as they see back over 60 years respectively in particular to the gospel reading for this Sunday of 'gathering the wheat into the barn'.

Fr John Ryan I remember seeing some years ago in Canberra, he too is insightful and reflective on the nature of being a priest person is today.

May Mgr. Peter and Fr John enjoy this time as congratulations are given and applause is offered on their healthy and positive images of priesthood lived in today's church
