Last Friday Ms Sumner presented the Year 12 Debating CSDA Grand Final winners to the school assembly. Her comments can be found below:

"I had the pleasure of coaching "the dream team" as they are known when they were in Year 8 and Year 9. Even at such a young age, these boys excelled and stood out against students from other schools in their debates: they displayed broad general knowledge, worked together as a team to encourage each other and challenge each other with critical thinking skills, they spoke with sophistication and oozed confidence with their charming manner.

But debating is very different to a lot of other extra-curricular activities. It's not black and white like either getting a goal or missing it. Sometimes, as a debater, or even a member of the audience, you can be so certain that 1 team has won the debate, but the adjudicator can make the opposite decision to what you were expecting. It's totally subjective and therefore absolutely heartbreaking at times.

In Year 8, these debaters sailed through to the quarter finals only to be told at the last minute that they were to debate in the elimination round against the "Wild Card Entry" of OLMC Parramatta. Despite their sophisticated argument, they did not win that night in what seemed like an incredibly unfair adjudication, but the boys were gentlemen and took it on the chin. Then last year, again, the boys were undefeated when they were in Year 11. This time, they made it all the way through to the grand final, only to be pipped at the post by losing in a split adjudication with 1 vote going to \$t Pius and 2 votes going to the opposition.
