- Taking it in turns to read the Acknowledgment to country at assembly.
- Engaging in a session with Uncle Bill Nicholson and learning how to play Aboriginal traditional games.
- Facilitating monthly traditional games with anyone interested on Friday at recess





THE EDUCATION

On Tuesday 18th March, our students participating in the Koorie Student Program at Yarra Ranges Tech School had the pleasure of visiting Worawa College. Our students were representing Mooroolbark College, Upper Yarra Secondary College, Yarra Hills Secondary College, Lilydale Heights College, Lilydale High School, and Healesville High School.







The program is an incredible initiative that gives Koorie students the opportunity to design and produce STEM projects that incorporate their culture while using cutting-edge technology like laser cutters, VR, and 3D printing. It also connects students with career pathways through guest speakers and hands-on learning experiences.

On Thursday 27th March, Kilsyth Primary School hosted its Term 1 Yarning Circle, focusing on Creation and Dreamtime Stories. Students watched videos including The Story of Bunjil by Aunty Joy Murphy, The Story of the Emu and the Platypus, and Tiddalik's Story. These stories and discussions helped students deepen their understanding and appreciation of culture, traditions, and storytelling.



Deadly Kilsyth Primary School



The Department of Education and the Outer East Koorie Education Workforce (KEW) invited Marrung Leads from all Outer East schools to the Marrung Lead Collaboration and Capability Day at Karralyka Centre on Monday March 24th.





More than 60 attendees came together and were Welcomed to Wurundjeri lands by Aunty Joy Wandin Murphy via a recorded message.

Leading the Work in Schools

Trish Fahy facilitated the day, discussing the significance of Marrung Leads leading this work in schools. She emphasised its role in promoting self-determination in education and fostering systematic thinking and perspectives at the state, regional and Outer East area goals level.

Koorie Aspirations Program

Brooke Kogleman, Project Manager of the Lilydale District and Yarra Valley Education Plan, focussed on their Leadership in Schools program and sharing insights on student engagement at Worawa College as part of their Aspirations Program.

Attendees explored the Marrung Goals and the significance of School Attendance, highlighting the importance of *connection* and *belonging*.





Attendance – Turning Things Around in 2025

Shane Mitchell, Koorie Engagement Manager NEVR, was unable to attend in person but he shared valuable data on attendance and the plans for improvement in 2025. In his words "I can't help but congratulate you all on the amazing work happening in the areas to support our Koorie kids and young people, our Koorie communities, our schools and the continued focus on the progression along the self-determination continuum.

Shane highlighted in his presentation that in 2025, there will be a strong focus on improving attendance across all Outer East ISS schools particularly for Koorie students.

Throughout the year the KEW will continue monitoring student attendance data to identify those at risk. Shane also shared students and schools flagged as at risk for low attendance by Outer East Leadership and KEW team, based on ongoing 2025v CAD data, will receive targeted support from the KEW through SSGs and will be included in the Area Attendance project led by the SEILS. Additionally, Koorie student attendance will be a key focus during Term 1 Marrung Lead PL day.

Shane re-iterated the <u>Education and Training Reform Act 2006 (Vic)</u>, rules, regulations and exemptions for students to attend school.

When does absence from school become a concern? There is no set point at which absence becomes a concern; however, the following categories can help to identify patterns of absence: Regular attendees: miss less than 10 days a year (less than 5% absence) Risk of chronic absence: miss between 10 and 19 days a year (5 – 10% absence) Chronically absent: miss 20 + days (10% absence; average 1 day per fortnight) Early in the year, the percentages can indicate an emergent problem and signal where action is required before the chronic absence threshold is met.

They also learned about Tinternvale Primary School's Koorie Curriculum Cluster Project in collaboration with Wurundjeri Woi Wurrung Cultural Heritage Aboriginal Corporation.



Tinternvale Primary School Learning Together

Two years ago, Tinternvale Primary School were in the same position as some of the new Marrung Leads at the training day – recently appointed to the role and new to the work in their school. Recognising the need for more to be done, they engaged in discussions with leadership and set short-term goals.

In their first year, they accomplished several key initiatives, including creating a school Acknowledgement of Country, developing a school-wide framework for incorporating Indigenous perspectives and securing a grant to build a dry riverbed and Yarning Circle. This work marked the beginning of their Koorie Curriculum Cluster Project, which deepened the school's knowledge and awareness.





They feltt very fortunate to be chosen for the Cluster Project, a partnership involving three schools in the Outer East, their Registered Aboriginal Party (Wurundjeri) and the Education Department. The program aimed to collaboratively develop resources that incorporate local perspectives, providing practical tools for the teachers to embed Indigenous perspectives in their classroom.

Where to next

Koorie Curriculum Cluster Project. Tinternvale Primary School said, and I quote, "In the near future we will be finalising the resources in collaboration with Uncle Bill, this has been a 2-year project, and we can't wait to see how it will benefit staff and students moving forward, we look forward to continuing our growing partnership with Uncle Bill"

Tinternvale Primary School. "At TPS we are continually working towards embedding Indigenous perspectives, we want to educate and unlevel our staff capabilities to deliver lessons with these perspectives throughout. So far we have been doing this by facilitating share and review sessions to give the opportunity for staff to share examples for their classes. This builds a joint awareness for all staff members and help them to develop their own understanding.

Aspirations – Career & Pathways

Following the break, Greg Cowan led an insightful session on Careers and Pathways which was particularly valuable for secondary schools. The objectives were to give the staff a concise overview of the Senior Secondary Reforms, explain the role of the Job Skills and Pathways team in our area and outline the current progress of these reforms in 2025.



The commitment to secondary schooling has recently been reinforced in the State Government new plan – *The Education State*. One of the 5 key priority areas is *Lifting Secondary School Student Engagement and Achievement*.

This has been embedded in the department through the creation of the new *Strategy and Secondary School Reform Group* under Deputy Secretary, Scott Widmer. Centrally they are in the process od transition moving from the Senior Secondary Pathways Reform Taskforce to a group.

The Senior Secondary Pathways reforms align with and contribute to this priority by **ensuring all Victorian secondary school students have access to high quality and engaging vocational and applied learning pathways.**

Greg also highlighted efforts to raise the aspirations for Koorie young people in the Outer East Area through collaboration with Swinburne University's Moondabi Toombadool Centre.

One example of this partnership is the joint work between the Koorie Education Workforce, the Lilydale District and Yarra Valley Education Project Manager and the Job Skills Pathway Team, all working with the Moondani Toombadool Centre to support future aspirations for our Koorie young people.


In January 2025, Swinburne University and Moondani Toombadool Centre hosted the First Nations Aspirations Camp. Additionally, career practitioners from the LDYVEP, along with staff from government secondary schools, visited MTC to explore the university and learn how best support Koorie students. Looking ahead, a proposed VET CMP IS SCHEDULED FOR September 2025 during Term 3 or 4.

Resources, Curriculum Links & Teaching Suggestions

Trish provided participants at our Marrung Lead PL with a wide range of numeracy resources, curriculum links and teaching suggestions. These included the *Bush Mob Counting Book, Bush Bingo* and *Going to the Footy* – a literacy resource with curriculum connections and instructional guidance.

Additionally, she shared Science resources with curriculum links as well materials focused on Wellbeing and Belonging. There were also resources for History, Civics and Citizenship, along with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories and cultures, all accompanied by curriculum links and teaching strategies. Many more valuable resources were also available to support educators.







Kilsyth Primary School Mural

We had the privilege of hearing from Kilsyth Primary School Principal, Daniel Gooding, about their journey in creating an art mural and the storytelling behind its design by artist Merrilyn Duff.


The artwork was a genuine collaboration involving the artist, students, school community and family members.

The mural begins with the 'Scar Tree" which for the artist symbolises resilience and strength. Beside it there is a vibrant lemon-coloured section featuring Bunjil the Eagle and the rising sun. Surrounding them are various symbols representing kith and kin acknowledging we all come from different family backgrounds.





The Birrarung (Yarra River) meanders along the bottom of the mural depicting the Platypus and Eel native to the rivers on Wurundjeri lands. The story continues to the symbols used in Aboriginal art representing community made up of many people. There are also smaller Yarning Circles under the blue skies telling us the sun has risen, and the day has begun,







Sitting proudly in the centre of the mural and visible from any angle in the school is the main Yarning Circle which is a reminder of the schools own Yarning Circle where the students share stories, learn together and pass on knowledge.

Lamandra (grass plant) is a strong and resistant weaving plant and an important element to include in the storytelling.





The mural then moves in to the night skies, the stars symbolised by circles with dots around them. The artist speaks about this representing 'reaching for the stars' and striving for excellence.



Nearing the end of the mural you see symbols representing leaving our mark as we head into the future – journeying together noticing human, emu, kangaroo and possum footprints, The students and staff wanted the Kilsyth bird included and each of the three elements of the bird program are included in the mural..



IEP Workshop

Adele Woolard, Manager and Christina Dowling, Allied Health Officer of HWSS (Health and Wellbeing Special Services) facilitated an IEP workshop introducing the learning intentions and overview of an IEP, how to use the IEP Quality Checklist Rubric and writing Quality Goals for an IEP.

An IEP is a written statement that describes the adjustments, goals and strategies to meet a student's individual educational needs so they can reach their full potential.

IEPs are <u>required</u> for students in statutory (<u>OoHC</u>), Koorie students (<u>Marrung – Victorian</u> <u>Aboriginal Education Plan</u>), students supported under individualised disability funding programs (Program for Students with Disabilities and <u>Disability Inclusion</u>), students in youth justice (custody and community), students in re-engagement programs under <u>contract arrangements</u> with another school or provider and students undertaking <u>Flexible Learning Options (FLOs)</u>

IEPs are *highly recommended* for <u>Students with additional learning needs</u>, students not achieving to their potential (including high-ability students, where appropriate – see the <u>High-ability toolkit</u>), students at risk of disengagement, students who are <u>Young</u> <u>Carers</u> (where appropriate) and any other students determined as needing an IEP.

They shared the need for IEPs for Koorie students aligning with the Marrung Education Plan and listed the plans an IEP should not be developed for.



They dissected the building of a quality IEP into four stages – Assess, Plan, Teach and Evaluate incorporating SMART goals. They did exercises with case studies and demonstrated how each stage comes back to the checklist rubric.

Early Years

Koorie Kids Shine at Kindergarten

Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander children can access 15 hours of free kindergarten each week for the two years prior to school. To be eligible, a child must turn three or four by 30 April in the year they start a kindergarten program.

At kindergarten, children will make new friends, enjoy fun activities, and get ready for school in a safe and supportive environment.

Children will:

- learn through play, art, music and dance
- learn to express themselves in a safe, inclusive and caring environment
- build the skills and confidence to prepare them for school.

Kindergarten programs have a qualified teacher and work hard to create culturally safe places for Aboriginal children and families, such as including Aboriginal perspectives in the learning curriculum and environment.
