First Reading Ex 17:8-13

As long as Moses kept his arms raised, Israel had the advantage.

The Amalekites came and attacked Israel at Rephidim. Moses said to Joshua, 'Pick out men for yourself, and tomorrow morning march out to engage Amalek. I, meanwhile, will stand on the hilltop, the staff of God in my hand.' Joshua did as Moses told him and marched out to engage Amalek, while Moses and Aaron and Hur went up to the top of the hill. As long as Moses kept his arms raised, Israel had the advantage; when he let his arms fall, the advantage went to Amalek. But Moses arms grew heavy, so they took a stone and put it under him and on this he sat, Aaron and Hur supporting his arms, one on one side, one on the other; and his arms remained firm till sunset. With the edge of the sword Joshua cut down Amalek and his people.

Second Reading 2 Tm 3:14-4:2

This is how the people of God become equipped and ready for every good work.

You must keep to what you have been taught and know to be true; remember who your teachers were, and how, ever since you were a child, you have known the holy scriptures – from these you can learn the wisdom that leads to salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by

God and can profitably be used for teaching, for refuting error, for guiding people's lives and teaching them to be holy. This is how the man who is dedicated to God becomes fully equipped and ready for any good work.

Before God and before Christ Jesus who is to be judge of the living and the dead, I put this duty to you, in the name of his Appearing and of his kingdom: proclaim the message and, welcome or unwelcome, insist on it. Refute falsehood, correct error, call to obedience – but do all with patience and with the intention of teaching.

Gospel Lk 18:1-8

God will see those who cry to him vindicated,

Jesus told his disciples a parable about the need to pray continually and never lose heart. 'There was a judge in a certain town' he said 'who had neither fear of God nor respect for man. In the same town there was a widow who kept on coming to him and saying, "I want justice from you against my enemy!" For a long time he refused, but at last he said to himself, "Maybe I have neither fear of God nor respect for man, but since she keeps pestering me I must give this widow her just rights, or she will persist in coming and worry me to death."

And the Lord said, 'You notice what the unjust judge has to say? Now will not God see justice done to his chosen who cry to him day and night even when he delays to help them? I promise you, he will see justice done to them, and done speedily. But when the Son of Man comes, will he find any faith on earth?'

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Reflection by Greg Sunter

In the gospel of Luke, widows represent the lowly of society. They also are a measure of how the society is travelling. In the Old Testament, God commanded the people to care for widows, orphans and strangers. Widows, in particular, were to be cared for by the whole community. From that point on, the level of compassion within the society could be measured by the care extended to the widows. A number of the prophets point to neglect of the widows as a sign that the community has turned its back on the covenant with God. The gospel of Luke picks up this prophetic tradition and on several occasions uses widows as the key figures in stories or parables.

In this parable, the widow is petitioning her local judge for justice against towards the widow, but the judge fobs her off repeatedly. The widow, knowing that her cause is just, persists and finally wears down the judge.

Another feature of the gospel of Luke is that the lowly and poor represented here by the widow - are those who recognise their own condition and call on the mercy of God to lift them up. Jesus says that God will see justice done to those who cry out for God's help. Jesus' final comment about finding any faith on earth is a reminder that human beings have a tendency to think they can solve all their own problems and forget that they need God's action in their lives. The faithful in the gospel of Luke are those who know that they are in need of God's mercy and love and call out for it.



Something to Think About

When do you find time to pray? In the morning or the evening? Have you ever felt too tired to pray?

The Story

In today's story, Jesus tells us how important it is to keep on praying. The judge in the story gets tired of the widow who keeps nagging him, and eventually helps her. The message is this: if even the uncaring judge can respond to the persistent woman, God will surely respond to our efforts in prayer because God is full of patience, love and compassion.

The Scriptures

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

(18:1-8)

Jesus told his disciples a story about how they should keep on praying and never give up:

"In a town there was once a judge who didn't fear God or care about people. In that same town there was a widow who kept going to the judge and saying,

'Make sure that I get fair treatment in court.'

For a while the judge refused to do anything.

Finally, he said to himself, 'Even though I don't fear God or care about people, I will help this widow because she keeps on bothering me. If I don't help her, she will wear me out.'"

The Lord said:

"Think about what that crooked judge said. Won't God protect his chosen ones who pray to him day and night? Won't he be concerned for them? He will surely hurry and help them.

But when the Son of Man comes, will he find on this earth anyone with faith?"

You will need: set of 2 templates for each child, cardboard, metal split pins, coloured markers, glue.


- 1. Invite children to colour in the templates.



Time for Tomatoes

It's that time again, time to put in this year's crop of tomatoes. For some reason I didn't have much luck with them last year but here's to a better harvest this year.

What would we do without the humble tomato? It comes in so many shapes and sizes, so many varieties, so many taste sensations, so many ways to use it. I read that the common cultivated tomato is the world's highest-value and most widely grown vegetable crop. When I was in boarding school many years ago, a generous farmer donated a truck load of tomatoes. Day after day for the next weeks we had them for breakfast, for lunch (two courses), for dinner in every way imaginable. One wit joked that we would get them for sweets next. We did!

The tomato arrived in Spain and Europe after a long journey in the ships of the early explorers, all the way from the Aztecs and other parts of South America. This humble vegetable was initially treated with suspicion, considered poisonous, then just a decoration, and now it is enjoyed in so many dishes cross the world, another gift of God's unfolding creation. I wonder who it was who was game enough to taste the first one!

The humble tomato is an interesting example of creation and the ingenuity of those who have made it such a versatile companion in our diet. It began life, scientists tell us about seven thousand years ago as not much more than a berry and look at how many shapes, sizes, colours and tastes it offers now. Domesticating this little berry took persistence and ingenuity, weeding, feeding, cross pollinating, not giving in to failure until this fruit is grown in just about every country in the world. It is a reminder that we have a part in the ongoing act of creation even now. And thank God for that!

The tomato is not just a great vegetable, it also calls us to be part of the unfolding creative enterprise as well. Around the same time each year we till the soil and enrich it, plant the seeds and begin the wait. Everyone seems to have expert advice on how to grow tomatoes! There is a time for everything, Scripture reminds us. I know that there is nothing better for people than to be happy and to do good while they live. That each of them may eat and drink and find satisfaction in all their toil—this is the gift of God. Ecclesiastes 3

So we give thanks for this staple of our diet, for its variety and the joy it brings. We give thanks to those who planted the tomatoes and tended to them in the summer months. And when it is time to make use of their plenty; the ripe ones and green ones, the small and the large, we gather to bottle them, dry them, make salsas, pickles and sauces. Many people who gather together at this time to process this vegetable can attest to the wonderful sense of community that process brings. We give thanks for the joy of the humble tomato.

We give thanks for its steady evolution, for its versatility and flavour, the fruits of God's unfolding creation and our part in it. Thank God for their abundance and their variety and how they bring us together. We can take so much for granted, ignoring the wonder and beauty of creation around us. We see it in the beautiful vistas and the stunning sunrises or sunsets and let the other wonders pass us by, and we miss the humble, the ordinary which are also signs of God's grandeur and love. As Jesus said, 'unless we become like little children..." So perhaps that means looking at the world through their eyes, allowing ourselves to be amazed and thankful for the little things of life.
