Looking at the Readings

Lenten readings are renown for their length. Today we have a good example in the long passage about the cure of the man born blind. The Lectionary offers a shorter version, but it would be more beneficial to choose the longer version. John the Evangelist took great care in writing this passage, we should take great care in reading it. We may reread it a few times because we will discover that it is not just a report of a miracle but a discourse on the coming to faith. We may also read it at different levels and progress with the blind man in understanding the real purpose of the miracle.

On the first level it is an account of giving sight to a man born blind. Restoring sight to one who has lost it is one thing, but to give sight to one who has never had it is quite a different matter, we hear that it was never done before. The account is rather brief, four verse of 41 verses.

On another level are the reactions of bystanders who see the wonderful works of God, the Pharisees, and the "investigators" who question everything: the cure itself, the man and his parents and Jesus himself.

On the deeper level there is the movement from ignorance to knowledge, from darkness to light and from sin to wholeness. For the reader enters the narrative for he/she must answer the question on where they stand in their faith and may recognise Christ as "The Light of the World" (v5).

Pope Francis Message for Lent 2020

It is good to contemplate more deeply the paschal mystery through which God's mercy has been bestowed upon us. Indeed, the experience of mercy is only possible in a "face to face" relationship with the crucified and risen Lord "who loved me and gave himself for me" (Gal 2:20), in a heartfelt dialogue between friends. That is why prayer is so important in Lent. Even more than a duty, prayer is an expression of our need to respond to God's love which always precedes and sustains us. Christians pray in the knowledge that, although unworthy, we are still loved. (#2)

Gospel Sequence

Each of the three cycles for the Gospels of the third, fourth and fifth Sundays of Lent have their own themes: Year A; Baptismal instruction, Year B on the Death and Resurrection of Christ and Year C: repentance. Year A we read about the Samaritan at the well where Jesus taught about the life giving water; this week about the blind man washing his eyes in the pool, Jesus proclaims: "I am the light of the world." And next week the Raising of Lazarus to life when Jesus said: "I am the Resurrection": all instructing us on baptism.

FR PETER'S REFLECTION

Last week we heard from the readings that spoke of seeing as God sees. To not live in blindness rather to walk in the light of Christ. Presently across our Shepparton communities in faith discussion is taking place around creating ... A winter night shelter! This is taking up the call of meeting the one who is homeless and where some relief can be offered. All too often many are living in the darkness of being without shelter. We might say ... 'Why is this so?'

The Gospel offers reflection upon the darkness and the light, through the one who is cured of blindness. Humanely we hear of many experiencing the darkness of homelessness across our communities. How this happens we can never be sure. To accompany this issue of many doing it "rough" might bring consideration to their hope of coming into the light of welcome and presence.

Let's take a look into this episode of the man with blindness and Jesus. Then blind man is immediately judged. This could have been a natural reaction and was associated more with the man's wrongdoing as to why he was blind. Ailments such as blindness were causally linked with sinfulness according to the Jewish mind. Jesus' response was on the line of not blaming anyone for his condition, rather more that the works of God might be revealed in him.

Like the hope for the winter night shelter happening in the colder months, so the outcomes might be through some coming into a new sight of being welcomed and not judged. The reactions of Jesus to the blind man's hopes brought confusion of attitude among those Jesus thought were on side with him. For us in this outcome, a broken outcome (the man's blindness) is somehow offered to be a moment where God is revealed, while seeing through the struggle to where God acts through Jesus.

For us in this week of Lent is seeing moments where God encounters us. Hopefully we find our moment where we might change in view or opinion to the sight giving us purpose and presence.

STEWARDSHIP THOUGHTS

Many of us say we believe in God. We try and see where God wants us to be in our Parish and Church life. It's when things go against us we can question God and maybe see where our ways in trust go. To live with gratitude is to see God who meets us and where through our giving we deepen our presence for God.

READINGS FOR SUNDAY - 22nd MARCH

First Reading - A reading from the first book of Samuel - 16:1. 6-7. 10-13

In the presence of the Lord God, they anointed David king of Israel.

The Lord said to Samuel, 'Fill your horn with oil and go. I am sending you to Jesse of Bethlehem, for I have chosen myself a king among his sons.' When Samuel arrived, he caught sight of Eliab and thought, 'Surely the Lord's anointed one stands there before him,' but the Lord said to Samuel, 'Take no notice of his appearance or his height for I have rejected him; God does not see as man sees; man looks at appearances but the Lord looks at the heart.' Jesse presented his seven sons to Samuel, but Samuel said to Jesse, 'The Lord has not chosen these.' He then asked Jesse, 'Are these all the sons you have?' He answered, 'There is still one left, the youngest; he is out looking after the sheep.' Then Samuel said to Jesse, 'Send for him; we will not sit down to eat until he comes.' Jesse had him sent for, a boy of fresh complexion, with fine eyes and pleasant bearing. The Lord said, 'Come, anoint him, for this is the one.' At this, Samuel took the horn of oil and anointed him where he stood with his brothers; and the spirit of the Lord seized on David and stayed with him from that day on. *The Word of the Lord*

Second Reading - A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians - 5:8-14

Rise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you.

You were darkness once, but now you are light in the Lord; be like children of light, for the effects of the light are seen in complete goodness and right living and truth. Try to discover what the Lord wants of you, having nothing to do with the futile works of darkness but exposing them by contrast. The things which are done in secret are things that people are ashamed even to speak of; but anything exposed by the light will be illuminated and anything illuminated turns into light. That is why it is said: Wake up from your sleep, rise from the dead and Christ will shine on you.

GOSPEL - Shorter form - John 9:1. 6-9. 13-17. 34-38

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

The blind man went off and washed himself and came away with his sight restored.

As Jesus went along, he saw a man who had been blind from birth. He spat on the ground, made a paste with the spittle, put this over the eyes of the blind man and said to him, 'Go and wash in the Pool of Siloam' (a name that means 'sent'). So the blind man went off and washed himself, and came away with his sight restored. His neighbours and people who earlier had seen him begging said, 'Isn't this the man who used to sit and beg?' Some said, 'Yes, it is the same one.' Others said, 'No, he only looks like him.' The man himself said, 'I am the man.' They brought the man who had been blind to the Pharisees. It had been a sabbath day when Jesus made the paste and opened the man's eyes, so when the Pharisees asked him how he had come to see, he said, 'He put a paste on my eyes, and I washed, and I can see.' Then some of the Pharisees said, 'This man cannot be from God: he does not keep the sabbath.' Others said, 'How could a sinner produce signs like this?' And there was disagreement among them. So they spoke to the blind man again, 'What have you to say about him yourself, now that he has opened your eyes?' 'He is a prophet' replied the man.

'Are you trying to teach us,' they replied 'and you a sinner through and through, since you were born!' And they drove him away.

Jesus heard they had driven him away, and when he found him he said to him, 'Do you believe in the Son of Man?' 'Sir,' the man replied 'tell me who he is so that I may believe in him.' Jesus said, 'You are looking at him; he is speaking to you.' The man said, 'Lord, I believe', and worshipped him.
