

Change of Preference

What are preferences?

Preferences are simply the courses you're applying for listed in the order you'd like to study them.

When you submit an application, you'll typically add your dream course as your first preference, some similar options next, and one or more backup options at the end.

Listing the maximum number of possible preferences on your applications is usually a good idea. This will give you the best opportunity to receive at least one offer - or maybe more.

But did you know that your preferences aren't set in stone, even after your've submitted your application?

YOU CAN CHANGE YOUR PREFERENCES

Once you submit your application, universities will often allow you to change your preferences, allowing you to re-order the existing courses on your list or even add and remove courses.

Why change your preferences?

There are lots of reasons you might like to change your preferences - here are just a few:

- Your ATAR was better than you expected
- Your ATAR wasn't as good as you had hoped for
- You've had a change of heart about the best course or university for you
- You've discovered a course you didn't know about when you applied
- The prerequisites for a course on your list have changed
- The course you applied for has been dropped or changed
- You didn't put your preferences in the right order the first time


If you do decide to change your preferences, make sure you're doing it because you want or need to - and not because your friends are, or your parents think you should.

The process of changing your preferences is relatively simple. Here's an overview of the steps you'll need to follow:



Important dates

Most universities and Tertiary Admissions Centres (TACs) provide plenty of opportunities for you to change your preferences. After submitting your application and before you receive your first offer, you can usually log into your application and adjust your preferences.

Note that change of preference might only be available during certain periods, and that each offer round may have separate cut-off dates.

This information is correct at the time of publication (November 2025), but sometimes dates change for various reasons - so we recommend double-checking the cut-off dates for your chosen universities or courses directly with the TAC or institution.

Note: UTAS send out their main round of offers to Tasmanian students mid-December and to students in all other states/territories in January. If you don't receive an offer, UTAS can provide you with advice on alternative pathways to study.

Limits and fees

Each TAC and university has different application processes, and this includes change of preference. Here are the preference limits and fees you might need to keep in mind:

TAC	Preference Limit	CoP Limit	CoP Fee
UAC	5	Unlimited	Free
VTAC	8	Unlimited	Free
QTAC	6	Unlimited	First 3 free, then \$70 for each subsequent CoP
SATAC	6	Unlimited	Free
TISC	6	Unlimited	Free

There are some other important things you should know too:

SOME COURSES CAN'T BE ADDED AFTER CERTAIN DATES

If a course has an early closing date, you might find it can't be added to your preferences once this date has passed.

COURSE PLACES MIGHT FILL AFTER THE FIRST OFFER ROUND

If enough offers are accepted to a course in the first offer round, it won't be available in subsequent rounds.

NOT ALL COURSES ARE AVAILABLE FOR OFFERS IN EACH ROUND

Each university is able to decide when they want to make offers for their courses, and not every uni will make offers in every round.

RECEIVING AN OFFER CAN LIMIT YOUR OPTIONS

If you receive an offer to a course, you may not be able to remove it from your preferences in subsequent rounds.

Change of preference FAQs

Have questions about change of preference? We have the answers.

WHAT IF I MISS THE CHANGE OF PREFERENCE DEADLINE?

If you miss the change of preference deadline for the main offer round, you might have the chance to change them again before the next offer round.

Keep in mind that some institutions (like SATAC) only have **one** change of preference deadline for all offer rounds for courses starting in Semester 1.

DOES THE ORDER OF MY PREFERENCES REALLY MATTER?

Yes! You can only receive one offer in each round, and it will be to the highest course in your preferences that you're eligible for - so make sure you put your most wanted course right at the top.

WHAT IF I DON'T RECEIVE ANY OFFERS?

If don't have an offer by the last round, it definitely doesn't mean you have to give up. There are lots of alternative pathways into your dream course. We recommend speaking with the university to discuss your options and ask for advice on what to do next.

DO I NEED TO CHANGE MY PREFERENCES?

If you're happy with your preferences, then stick with them.

If you receive a higher ATAR than expected, don't immediately rush off and change your preferences just because you can apply for a "better" course – stick with the course you actually want to do! And remember, there's no such thing as "wasting" a good ATAR.

CAN I ACCEPT AN OFFER, THEN CHANGE MY PREFERENCES AND WAIT TO SEE IF I RECEIVE ANOTHER IN THE NEXT ROUND?

In most cases, this is totally fine (**note**: if you are applying through **TISC**, **do not accept or defer your offer** and use their 'automatic safety net' instead).

If you do end up accepting a different offer, just make sure you withdraw from the first one before any important deadlines.
