As FNQ Principal of the year in 2022, Mark is also recognised in the State system as a leader in an award-winning school. Mark prides himself on 'connection before curriculum', and knows the power that positive, productive relationships can hold for our young people.

Mark Allen is a multifaceted individual with diverse interests and accomplishments. As a Cycling Australia Luminary recipient, he developed the Bikebus program, a free government-endorsed program aimed at getting children and their families to ride to school, fostering connections, improving confidence, and promoting good health. The program even set a Guinness World Record for the most kids in a Bikebus with 639 riders at Trinity Beach State School. Additionally, Mark's musical talents were inspired by his mother, Mary-Anne, who led the first-ever musicals between Saint Augustine's and Saint Monica's. Mark and his brother participated twice in the Cairns to Cooktown bikeride, a week-long event that involved rough dirt roads and self-discovery on wild Cape York.
