Liturgical Jottings

The Senses - Taste

"Taste and see the goodness of the Lord" (Psalm 33:9) is the response in three consecutive Sundays (19, 20 & 21) in Year B that accompany the Gospel of Jesus teaching on the body of Christ (John 6). This psalm response occurs another 17 times during the three years. The verse is a metaphor for experiencing our God. We taste the elements of bread and wine in the Eucharist and received the goodness of the body and blood of Christ.

The taste of salt has been mostly dropped from our liturgies. Salt placed on the tongue was once used in our Catechumenate and Baptism rites to signify healing, preservation and the seasoning of wisdom. Salt is now an option in blessing of holy water. The salt is blessed and signifies purification of water (Elisha - 2 Kings 2:21) and to preserve the people from attack of the enemy. (2011 Roman Missal, appendix II)

Focus on the Readings

To understand the wisdom of God and to see the futility of riches are two activities that highlight the dichotomy we face in life about earthy and heavenly things. The three readings today are rich in imagery to bring insights in our relationship with God. God's wisdom is priceless in comparison with gold and silver that are like sand and mud. God's wisdom and love are our riches (Wis 7:11).

A camel passing through the eye of the needle is ludicrously displayed in many internet image searches. Hopefully the cartoonist may help us reflect on the meaning of Jesus words. He disassociates wealth from blessing and even proposes it as a hindrance to attain eternal life. His teaching disappoints the first man when Jesus asks him to replace earthly treasure with heavenly treasure. He also confuses the disciples who must ask him for an explanation.

Both the man seeking the way to eternal life and the disciples questioning their own futures speak up for us today because we carry in our hearts the query about the meaning of our life and our destiny. Thomas asked Jesus where he is going and how can we get there and received the answer: "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life." We join the disciples on the road to Jerusalem following Christ. The journey to Jerusalem began with Christ's predication of his death and he reminds his disciples the cost of following him includes persecution.

God of wisdom, whose word probes the motives of our hearts, with you all things are possible. Let worldly treasure not keep us from Jesus who looks on us with love. Free us to leave all things and follow him. Amen. *Opening Prayer 28th Sunday ICEL 1995*

Memorial of the Week

Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli (St John XXIII) was born 25 November 1881 in a village in Lombardy to a sharecropper family. Ordained a priest he was a scholar, diplomat and pope (elected 1958). He convened the Second Vatican Council on 11 October 1962 and died 3 June 1963. Pope Francis canonised him in 2014. His feast day is taken from the date of the opening of the Council.

REFLECTION

It's good to see the unfolding of the fifth Plenary Council in the history of our Church in Australia. Quite monumental and one I'm hopeful will see a rejuvenation of the Church from this first assembly to the second assembly in July 2022. I've enjoyed watching the morning proceedings, the livestreams and reactions from the members and their gatherings. If there has been one continual theme emerging from this past week it would be on this line ... the Church in this country needs a new sense of what it means to be "Church" in our time. A reaction striking a chord with me was one of the delegates saying ... 'People tend to view the Church where sacraments get dispensed rather than being a place for community and sharing of life'. In an increasing consumer way of society, the parish may be seen more as a 'service

provider with parishioners being servant recipients'. Given the lockdowns and where regular gatherings are not allowed may be causing many to see ... 'does the Church matter?' do I see myself and ourselves making a willing return when restrictions cease?

Interesting observations to make! I feel this first assembly has 'tread water', testing itself to the eventual hope - filled outcomes many are wanting to see change and happen. Change doesn't always sit comfortably, as human beings by nature we like stability. The Plenary Council at this time is asking The stability we once knew is no longer! An image helping me understand this goes by way of a dancing movement. you see, the partners take steps to be in harmony, sometimes it's two steps back, one forward, some steps go side to side, the pair go back and forward. My year 10 social dance Instructor taught me this from school days...

One of my favourite scripture images holding me through this first week of the Plenary Council is that of the disciples of Jesus being called to put out into the waters that are deeper. Having tried to fish in the shallower of waters (where it is safer) Jesus says... its by getting out into the deep some surprises are in store! The Plenary Council between this past week and the second assembly in July 2022, might just be having us asking ... can we get into the deeper waters of our own personal reflection of where the Church needs to be and going into the future?

It's been a good week of discernment and I feel from my limited observations the Spirit is calling for a new looking forward and for you and I to be trusting where we are going in this time of seeking and where a new catch is waiting for us!!!



Gospel

Mk 10:17-27

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Go and sell whatever you have and come follow me.

Jesus was setting out on a journey when a man ran up, knelt before him and put this question to him, 'Good master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' Jesus said to him, 'Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: You must not kill; You must not commit adultery; You must not steal; You must not bring false witness; You must not defraud; Honour your father and mother.' And he said to him, 'Master, I have kept all these from my earliest days.' Jesus looked steadily at him and loved him, and he said, 'There is one thing you lack. Go and sell everything you own and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.' But his face fell at these words and he went away sad, for he was a man of great wealth. Jesus looked round and said to his disciples, 'How hard it is for those who have riches to enter the kingdom of God!' The disciples were astounded by these words, but Jesus insisted, 'My children,' he said to them, 'how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God.' They were more astonished than ever. 'In that case' they said to one another, 'who can be saved?' Jesus gazed at them. 'For men' he said, 'it is impossible, but not for God: because everything is possible for God.'
