This course reflects the role of individuals working in a range of technical production jobs in creative arts industry environments. It provides the skills to apply solutions to a defined range of unpredictable problems, and analyse and evaluate information from a variety of sources. It serves as a foundation to the five specialist streams of Production and Design at WAAPA: Design, Costume, Lighting, Props & Scenery and Stage Management. It develops the skills to provide leadership and guidance to others while working in a cohesive team environment across each of these disciplines.

Successful completion of this course over the two years will provide you with a Certificate IV qualification and an Academic Transcript which can be credited toward a pathway into further university study or one of the pathways below.
