Apprenticeships and Traineeships

The term 'Australian Apprenticeships' covers both apprenticeships and traineeships. They start when an employer creates a job and decides to use this pathway for employing and training staff.

- They are available to anyone of working age with eligibility to work in Australia.
- There are no specific school levels, certificates or other qualifications needed to start one.
- They offer opportunities for you to train, study and earn an income at a variety of Vocational Education and Training qualification levels in many occupations and can be full-time, part-time or school based.

Get your drivers licence!

If you are interested in applying for an apprenticeship, especially in the construction or automotive industry, you will usually need a drivers licence. Consider applying for your learner driver licence when you become eligible (16 years of age). Once you turn 17, have 100 hours or more of supervised driving experience and pass the practical driving test, you will be issued a provisional licence. This licence allows you to drive unsupervised. Visit the Department of Transport and Main Roads website to find out more about obtaining a driver's licence. Leaving this until the end of Year 12 may put you at a disadvantage when applying for apprenticeships.

Vocational Education and Training (VET) providers - do you need one?

When you take on an Apprenticeship or Traineeship, you are required to complete an off the job training program. VET training providers deliver off the job training and will issue you with a nationally recognised qualification. When you sign up for an Apprenticeship or Traineeship you and your employer will agree on a VET training provider. What is a School-Based apprenticeship

A school-based apprenticeship or traineeship allows you to start your training while you are still at school and will contribute credit towards your Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE). When you finish school you and the employer usually agree to continue on with you taking up a full time apprenticeship contract. ADF GAP year opportunities

You can apply for the 2026 Australian Defence Force (ADF) Gap Year and experience life in the Navy, Army or Air Force without committing to a longer period by 'signing up'. An ADF Gap Year is a way to have an adventurous year, gain valuable skills and work experience and get paid for it. There are many roles to choose from for your 2026 Gap year experience including administration, cabin crew, artillery operator, driver, engineer and more. You must be an Australian citizen, aged between 18 and 24 years on admission and have completed Year 12 (required passes vary by job). Some principles of career decision making

The High Five Principles of Career Development are wise concepts to consider when researching career options and making career decisions. Read the information below and consider discussing them with someone for more insight.

- 1. **Change is constant** The world of work is always changing. You also change as you develop personally and experience life. Don't be afraid of change; accept it and use it as an opportunity.
- 2. **Know yourself and follow your heart** A most important skill in career management is self-awareness knowing your interests, abilities, values, aspirations and the things/people that influence you. Start your job ideas list with jobs you would most like (dream jobs) even if they are currently unrealistic. This can get you started and lead to other jobs you hadn't thought of.
- 3. **Focus on the journey** It's good to have goals, both short and long term. However, you should not be so focused on them that you miss opportunities that may emerge along the way.
- 4. **Learning is ongoing** Learning doesn't stop just because you finish your course and get a job. Just as change is constant so is the need to keep up to speed with new technologies, new methods of practice and emerging trends in your career field.
- 5. Access your allies These are the people who can help and support you during your career journey, your school guidance officer/counsellor, teachers, your family and friends, sport coaches and others within your social network. You can learn much from other people's experiences.

2025 Premier's Coding Challenge

The Premier's Coding Challenge is an annual, statewide initiative for all Queensland students in Year 3 to Year 10. The Challenge aims to encourage an interest in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) in Queensland students. In 2025, students are tasked with creating an app, game or website that drives positive change in the world by addressing 1 or more of the <u>United Nations Sustainable Development Goals External link</u> (SDGs). This is a great opportunity for students to tackle real-world issues that matter to them.

Students can work individually or in pairs to create an app, game or website and submit a short video explaining their entry. Find out more about the categories on the <u>get started page</u>. <u>Aspiring (Unpublished)</u> is a writing competition for the children's and young adults' markets. You are eligible if you:

- Have not been published in book format within this section's genre, or
- Have less than two books published within this section's genre in any form, print to eBook. This includes trade, partner and self-publishing. or
- Published with more than two books in print and eBook format in another genre where the entrant is not the sole creator responsible for that section. This includes trade, partner and self-publishing.

The Australian Bureau of Statistics have released the Labour Force Data for January 2025:

- unemployment rate remained at 4.0%.
- participation rate remained at 67.2%.
- employment increased to 14,616,400.
- employment to population ratio increased to 64.5%.
- underemployment remained at 6.0%.
- monthly hours worked increased to 1,976 million.

These calls can range in length from 15 to 30 minutes and generally include similar questions as job interviews (e.g., "tell me about yourself", "what attracted you to this role", "what are your strengths" etc.). VET qualifications required for two thirds of employment growth

The Jobs and Skills Australia Labour Market Update for the December 2024 quarter, shows almost two-thirds of employment growth in the past 12 months came from occupations with Vocational Education and Training pathways. Employment growth was also sound, overall, with the unemployment rate stable at around 4% and the participation rate around the record high. What is a Blue Card and do I need one?

The Blue Card system in Queensland is used to monitor those who work with young people. Its aim is to reduce the risks of harm to young people by creating a safe and non-threatening environment. So yes, you will need a blue card if you are paid for your work or are a student enrolled in a tertiary course (including certificate, TAFE and university courses) and need to do a practical placement. Students studying a VET (Vocational Education and Training) course such as Certificate III or Diploma, in which they are required to do a work placement involving young people (under 18 years of age) are required, by law, to have a Blue Card. The Registered Training Organisation (RTO) conducting the VET course (a school or outside organisation) is responsible for applying for Blue Cards on behalf of the students doing a course. Tuckwell Scholarship applications for study in 2026 reminder

The Australian National University (ANU) Tuckwell Scholarship Program is one of the most transformational undergraduate scholarship programs in Australia. Recipients receive:

- \$26,7500 per annum (2025 rate) (increasing annually) for the length of your undergraduate degree program (studying full-time), to cover on-campus residential costs, books and general living expenses.
- from 2024, a one-off payment of \$1,500 relocation grant for first year Scholars.
- guaranteed access to ANU-approved student accommodation.
- travel allowances to assist with your move to Canberra and to support two annual return journeys (e.g. airfares) between your home and the University for each year of your degree.
- an allowance to help cover the transport costs for your parents to attend <u>Commencement</u>
 Weekend at the start of the program, and
- an <u>ANU Sports Centre membership</u>.

Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR)

All states in Australia call their Year 12 tertiary entry score an *Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank* (ATAR). The ATAR is a number between 0 and 99.95 (highest) with increments of 0.05.

The Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA) provides all Tertiary Entrance data (your Year 12 final results) to QTAC who then calculates individual ATARs.

If you are applying for interstate courses, through the relevant Tertiary Admissions Centre (TAC), the relevant TAC can get your ATAR directly from QTAC. You can learn more about ATARs and how to obtain an ATAR statement from the MyQCE portal.

You will need to register with QTAC in August, requesting them to calculate your ATAR as it's not an automatic process. This is a SEPARATE registration from your QTAC course application.



Senior External Examination registrations open for 2025

Year 12 students are eligible to sit Senior External Examinations if they can't study the General subjects offered in Queensland because the subject is not taught at their school or there is a timetable clash. The external examination subjects available are Arabic, Chinese, English, Indonesian, Korean, Latin, General Mathematics, Modern Greek, Polish, Punjabi, Russian, Tamil and Vietnamese. The examinations are held in October and November.

You will need the permission of your school to sit these exams. Your school will register you for the exams with the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA). Registrations to sit external exams close on 30 April 2025. Read the information on the QCAA website and see your school Guidance Counsellor/Officer for more information.

myQCE gateway for students and parents

Bachelors or Bachelors Honours - and the difference is

Bachelor Degree / Bachelors Pass

This is the main undergraduate award/qualification offered in higher education. It provides a broad theoretical understanding of the underlying principles/knowledge and concepts relating to a specific or general body of knowledge. It prepares students for entry to particular professions, vocations and/or postgraduate study. It typically takes 3 years full-time study to complete however, it can take up to 5 years for more complex courses.

Bachelors Honours

A Bachelor Honours Degree may also be incorporated in a Bachelor Degree, typically as an additional year. The purpose of the Bachelor Honours Degree qualification is to qualify individuals who apply a body of knowledge in a specific context. They can undertake professional work and is a pathway for research and further learning. A Bachelor Honours Degree is typically 1 year of study following a Bachelor Degree.

Higher-Level Apprenticeship Dual Bachelor of Engineering Science

This 6-year dual qualification pathway provides you with 2 qualifications: the Certificate III Electrotechnology Electrician (UEE30820) and the Bachelor Degree of Engineering Science. You will commence both qualifications at the same time. After gaining the trade licence at the end of Year 4, you will focus on completing the degree program. Click here for more information.

Medical Schools in Australia

Queensland students interested in gaining entry to a medical course can apply to medical schools throughout Australia. The <u>Australian Medical Council website</u> has a list of <u>Australian medical schools</u> with links to each school. There are three major entry points for medical courses in Queensland. These are:

- Direct entry from Year 12 (Bond University and James Cook have this type of entry)
- Graduate entry after completing an undergraduate degree (Griffith University and the University of Queensland have this type of entry)
- Provisional entry for high achieving Year 12 students (Griffith University, University of the Sunshine Coast and The University of Queensland have this type of entry)

University Clinical Aptitude Test ANZ (UCAT) 2025

Some undergraduate health courses, ie undergraduate medicine and dentistry, require you to sit the <u>UCAT ANZ</u> as a compulsory entry requirement for Australia and New Zealand Consortium universities. You are required to sit the UCAT ANZ 2025 test (between 1 July and 5 August 2025) if you are intending to apply for entry in 2026 to a relevant course or programme.

UCAT ANZ results cannot be carried over from one year to the next. For example, results from UCAT ANZ 2025 can only be used to apply for courses commencing in 2026. Some pathways to medicine/dentistry/clinical sciences will not require the UCAT ANZ. For some universities a different test may be required. Before booking a test, you should check the entry requirements for each course or programme on the university website/s which you intend to apply to.

The UCAT ANZ test is changing in 2025. The Abstract Reasoning subtest will be withdrawn from the test. The new test format will comprise 3 cognitive subtests (Verbal Reasoning, Decision Making and Quantitative Reasoning), and the Situational Judgement Test.
