Value: \$2,500 - \$3,500

Open/Closing Dates: December 1, 2019 – March 31, 2020

If you are planning to go on exchange and want to reduce the price of your program, you can apply for a scholarship for our standard programs departing between October 2020 – March 2021.

Fourteen partial scholarships are available each year, for year and semester applicants only. Short program applicants are not eligible for a scholarship. There are:

- 3 Language Scholarships
- 3 International Affairs Scholarships
- 3 Community Involvement Scholarships
- 2 Australian Ambassador Scholarships
- 3 Digital Video Scholarships

All scholarships are open to students in years 8-11.

- Applications can only be submitted by a person over 18 years of age.
- Applications must be completed by either: the Parent or authorised Guardian of the child; or an authorised Social Worker, GP, School Principal, Counsellor.
- Applications must be endorsed by both the Parent/Guardian of the Child AND the nominated sponsor, i.e. Social Worker, GP, School Principal or Counsellor. Children must be between the ages of 5 and 18 years of age at date of application.

When you're still at school it's the ideal time to have a crack at work experience. It could help you decide what careers really interest you, as well as which ones to rule out. Which in turn could help you choose which subjects and courses you'll need to study. You'll learn new skills and get insight that could help you both at school and down the track. It's never too early or too late to try out different roles and gain more experience. So whether you're still at school or studying at university, organising a work placement is a smart move.

Some of the main benefits include:

- Pinning down your personal career goals by sampling different industries and jobs without the commitment of a permanent contract.
- Gaining first-hand experience of an industry. In addition to having the right qualifications, this could be a competitive advantage over other applicants when you're applying for jobs.
- Improving your knowledge and skills.
- Building up a network of contacts, which could be great for references, recommendations, and potential job opportunities.

You'll get to

- see how the working world works
- experience how people work together

- find out if an industry or job is as you imagined, and decide if it's the right fit for you

Give perspective to your schoolwork

- understand how important good English, maths and tech skills are at work
- find out how things you've learnt about at school are put into practise

Learn and grow

- get the opportunity to test drive and improve your communication, teamworking, planning, organising, timekeeping, and problem-solving skills, for example
- teach you to cope in new environments and settings
- find out how to work co-operatively with people you don't know
- build your confidence and independence

Add it to your resume

- work experience could make you more appealing to potential employers
- counts as experience on job applications
- demonstrates you're motivated and keen to learn
- you'll have examples to use during interviews
- could put you ahead of other applicants

Where to find work experience

If you're tempted to get some work experience, speak to your school, TAFE or university. As work experience is often included as part of your studies, they may have a program already in place that could get you into some work experience.

Alternatively, you could contact organisations you'd like to work with directly and see if you can score your dream opportunity. Large companies and organisations, your local council and local businesses in your area are good examples of places to start your search.

During high school most of the work experience you'll undertake will be unpaid. Don't see that as a negative, you'll be receiving training, mentoring and exploring your interests and suitability for careers and industries in return.

Volunteering with community or local organisations can count as work experience too, and if you are enthusiastic, reliable and willing to learn, it could lead to more work experience opportunities and potentially job offers.

Job Spotlight

Sommelier

What do they do?

Sommeliers (also known as wine waiters) are experts in wine. They study everything there is to know about wine from the grapes, regions, and preparation methods to which pairings work well with certain foods.

Sommeliers work in fine dining restaurants, hotels, and the retail industry. From serving choosing and serving wines, to writing about wines, becoming a wine buyer, or working for vineyards as a sales representative.

A love of wine, a good nose and excellent palate could make you the perfect candidate to be a sommelier.

Duties:

- Selecting and buying a wine list for a specific business
- Pairing food with a wine that will compliment or enhance the flavours
- Updating wine lists in line with menu change
- Maintaining inventory
- Educating other staff members about the wine list and how to choose, store and serve wines
- Engaging with customers, finding out their likes and budget then helping them decide which wines best fit their needs
- Testing the quality of wines before serving (in case they are corked or flawed)
- Serving wine to the customers, using the correct corking, tasting and pouring techniques, glassware and decanting methods
- Making sure the customers are happy and providing them with more details or other options throughout the course of their meal if necessary
- Continuing to study wines, taste new producers, blends, vintages, and regions
- Attending industry events

Skills required:

- Amazing customer service and knowledge of products (wines, spirits and other beverages)
- Teamwork – working with business owners, chefs and other wait staff to ensure the best overall service
- Excellent communication and people skills
- Attention to detail
- Passionate

Pathways

Obtain work experience or VET qualifications within the hospitality or viticulture industries.

Get your responsible service of alcohol license.

Learn a lot about wines and beverages.

Obtain qualifications within the industry such as the 4 levels of:

- *Introductory Sommelier*
- *Certified Sommelier*
- *Advanced Sommelier*
- *Master Sommelier*

Average salary for a Certified Sommelier is \$60,000 per year (Source: seek.com.au)
