5 reasons to apply for scholarships

If you're planning on tertiary eduction next year, we've put together 5 reasons why you should apply for scholarships - there are lots of benefits you could enjoy.





Ease the financial burden

Of course, the financial benefits of scholarships are one of the top reasons students apply. They're a great way to help you pay for your education and leave you with less debt once you graduate. Look at applying for scholarships as an investment in yourself and your future.

Scholarships could cover the costs of one or many things, such as:

- Tuition fees
- Accommodation or other living expenses
- Books, technology, and other essential supplies
- Travel

Plus, you won't have to pay the money back (unlike other financial support options like student loans). Remember to always check the terms and conditions before signing up. You may have to fulfil certain obligations, such as maintaining a certain grade point average (GPA), writing a letter of thanks, or participating in certain programs. But otherwise, the money you receive is all yours.

Boost your study experience

There are academic benefits associated with many of the scholarships you could earn, especially the really prestigious ones. These are open things like mentoring or access to educational programs, which could help you achieve and maintain a higher GPA.

Some scholarships also include access to internships or other work experience programs, or even the chance to travel and study overseas. Any opportunities to expand your knowledge and experience beyond the classroom could help you to get the most out of your university experience (and boost your resume too). The financial benefits of receiving a scholarship may mean you wouldn't have to get a part time job to support you while you study, or that you'd need to work fewer hours. This means you can dedicate more time to studying, writing assignments, signing up for additional programs, or looking for extracurricular opportunities.

Get an edge in the job market

The fact that you've applied for scholarships could show that you're forward thinking and proactive - two skills that are highly sought after by employers. Listing that you were the beneficiary of a scholarship on your resume could help to make you a more appealing candidate for potential employers too.

Scholarships that provide you with specific skills through some form of work experience, such as an internship, could make you a particularly desirable employee. If you're lucky and put in 100% during your internship, you could even be rewarded with a job offer from the company.

Scholarships can also be a really great way to meet professionals and network with people already working in the field you're interested in. Spending time with industry leaders could even lead to a job offer or other opportunities.

Learn to believe in yourself and your abilities

Completing scholarship applications is a great exercise in developing an appreciation of your strengths and qualities, as well as teaching you how to sell yourself. It's a good opportunity to look back on all the great things you've done and achieved over the years and remind yourself of your capabilities. By the time you've completed and submitted a few scholarship applications, you'll probably know yourself a lot better, and hopefully value yourself a whole lot more too.

There are literally *thousands* of scholarships on offer. While some of them are offered to students with outstanding academic achievements, there are plenty of other scholarships for different criteria such as:

- Financial disadvantage





- First nations students
- LGBTQIA+
- Refugees
- Rural students
- Women

Don't let the misconception that scholarships are only for the academically gifted put you off finding and applying for scholarships - there are opportunities out there for everyone.

You have nothing to lose

Yes, applying for scholarships requires some of your valuable time and a bit of effort. But the rewards could make it all worthwhile; and if you don't apply, you'll never know if you could have been successful. Plus, remember all the benefits associated with just applying:

- Learn (and appreciate) more about yourself
- Improve your researching skills
- Hone the art of creating great applications
- Practise skills that will be useful when applying for jobs

How to include participation in a competition on your resume

If you're still in school and haven't had a job before, it can be tricky to know what to put on your resume to look appealing to potential employers. • Optionally, write a brief summary of what the competition involved and what you learned from it.

However, the path to a career in medicine can be competitive and complex, requiring some careful planning and foresight.

You could explore areas like psychology, social work, sport and fitness, or medical technology. These careers also offer opportunities to contribute meaningfully to your community.

Understanding rites of passage: A guide for students and parents

Have you ever wondered why certain life experiences feel more significant than others? Throughout history, societies have marked the transition from childhood to adulthood through meaningful ceremonies or experiences called 'rites of passage'. Today, while formal ceremonies might be less common, these transformative experiences remain valuable for young people navigating their journey into adulthood.

What makes a rite of passage?

A true rite of passage involves three distinct stages:

- First comes **separation**, where young people step away from their familiar environment. This could mean physically leaving home or symbolically marking a change, such as moving into their own space.
- Next is the **liminal** or '**threshold**' stage, where they face challenges and new experiences that push them beyond their comfort zone.
- Finally, there's **incorporation**, when they return to their community with new skills, confidence, and responsibilities.

Why they matter today

In our modern world, the transition to adulthood often feels unclear and undefined. A well-structured rite of passage can provide numerous benefits for young people. It creates a clear 'before and after' moment, helping them understand they've moved into a new phase of life with different expectations. These experiences also build essential life skills that aren't typically developed in traditional educational settings, such as independence, problem-solving, and self-reliance.

Most importantly, rites of passage boost self-efficacy – the belief in one's ability to handle challenges and achieve goals. When young people successfully navigate challenging experiences, they gain lasting confidence in their capabilities.

Creating your own rite of passage

While formal programmes do exist, many families choose to create their own meaningful transitions. The key is ensuring the experience includes genuine challenges and results in permanent positive changes. Here are some thoughtful ways to structure a meaningful rite of passage:

International solo travel

Planning and executing an overseas trip, managing budgets, navigating foreign transport systems, and communicating across language barriers provides numerous growth opportunities.

Major physical challenge

This include things like training for and completing a significant physical feat, such as a marathon, longdistance cycle, or multi-day hike. The months of preparation combined with the final achievement can create a powerful transformative experience.

Community impact project

Looking for an option that lets you give something back? Designing and leading a substantial volunteer initiative requires planning, leadership, and sustained commitment over several months.

Creative or performance achievement

The more creatively-minded might try taking a major role in producing a theatre show, musical performance, or art exhibition, including both the preparation and public presentation.

Professional experience

Undertaking a structured internship or work experience programme that involves real responsibilities and meaningful contributions to an organisation is a great way to boost confidence and explore future options.

Making the experience meaningful

When planning a rite of passage experience, consider these essential factors:

- **Timing is crucial** the young person should feel ready and willing to take this step. Forcing the experience too early or too late can diminish its impact.
- The challenge must be **authentic and meaningful to the individual**. What's challenging for one person might be comfortable for another, so consider personal comfort zones when planning.
- There should be **clear changes in rights and responsibilities afterwards**. This helps cement the transition and makes the experience more meaningful.
- The young person should have **agency in choosing and planning their experience**. This investment in the process makes it more meaningful and increases the likelihood of genuine personal growth.

Whether you choose a formal programme or create your own experience, the key is ensuring it provides genuine challenges and opportunities for growth. Remember, the goal isn't just to complete a task but to facilitate a meaningful transition that builds confidence, independence, and life skills. Immigration is about how people move between different countries to live, work, or study. It covers everything from helping people get visas and citizenship, to making sure countries have fair rules about who can enter and stay.

This pathway might be right for you if you're interested in understanding how immigration policies impact individuals and communities, or if you enjoy advocating for the rights and wellbeing of others.

What do careers in this pathway involve?

People in this field need to understand different countries' laws and requirements, while also considering how immigration affects communities, jobs, and culture. They might work for government departments, law firms, or organisations that support people settling into new countries.

With more people than ever moving around the world for opportunities, immigration professionals play an important role in helping make this process fair and organised.

What are some important human skills for this pathway?

- Social awareness
- Communication
- Decision-making
- Adaptability
- Collaboration

What are some of the tasks involved?

• Prepare and file documents





- Provide advice to clients
- Review and evaluate paperwork
- Conduct interviews
- Coordinate with service providers
- Advocate for clients
- Monitor compliance with regulations
- Research and analyse policy data
- Prepare policy proposals

What kind of work environment and conditions can I expect?

Many careers in this pathway involve working indoors, usually in an office environment. This means there is plenty of opportunity for flexible or working from home arrangements. There are a few roles that may involve some work out in the field for those who prefer to get hands-on.

Most workers in this field work either full-time or part-time, with some casual roles available too. Selfemployment is relatively uncommon outside of advisory roles.

The Clusters in immigration

Guardians

Guardians are vital in this pathway to ensure the ethical and legal processing of immigration applications.

Linkers

As a Linker in this pathway, you might be connecting immigrants with legal services, community resources, and support.

Coordinators

Coordinators are very common in this pathway, responsible for managing all kinds of immigration procedures, from application to settlement.

Informers

Another common Cluster, Informers in this pathway educate immigrants on legal requirements, cultural norms, and opportunities.

Makers

Makers in this pathway handle the administrative tasks that support immigration processes.

Innovators

Innovators are uncommon in this pathway, but can help to develop new immigration policies and support services for improved integration.

Where can an immigration pathway take me?

Interested in a career in immigration? There are many roles you might like to consider – here are just a few.

Entry level roles

These jobs can be started with little or no training or experience, and are great as a stepping stone towards more senior roles in the pathway.

Social Security Assessor

Evaluate applications for government benefits and support payments, determining eligibility by reviewing financial information, medical documentation, and personal circumstances.





Border Enforcement Officer

Monitor and control the movement of people and goods at international borders, airports and seaports to prevent illegal immigration, smuggling, and other border security threats.

Document Assessor

Examine and verify the authenticity of passports, visas, identity documents, and supporting paperwork submitted with immigration applications.

Mid-level roles

Once you have some further study or experience under your belt, you might like to consider moving into one of these roles.

Customs Broker

Help businesses navigate international trade by managing the paperwork, duties, and regulations involved in moving goods and employees across borders.

Visa and Citizenship Processing Officer

Review and assess applications for visas and citizenship, ensuring all documentation meets legal requirements and deciding on whether to grant or deny applications based on immigration laws and policies.

Migration Agent

Provide advice and assistance to people seeking to migrate or obtain visas, helping them understand their options, prepare applications, and navigate complex immigration laws and procedures.

Senior level roles

These jobs will require extensive further education or many years of experience, but are also highly rewarding.

Policy Analyst

Research, analyse, and develop government policies and programs by gathering data, consulting with stakeholders, evaluating outcomes, and making recommendations for improvements or new initiatives.

Regional Biosecurity Manager

Oversee biosecurity operations across a designated geographical area, managing teams of inspectors and officers and ensuring compliance with biosecurity regulations.

Chief Migration Officer

Lead strategic planning and policy development for government immigration departments or large organisations.

Similar pathways

If these careers aren't quite right for you, you might like to explore some other similar pathways instead.

Government

Manage policies, enforce regulations, provide public services, and promote citizen welfare.

Social Work

Support individuals and communities to improve their well-being and overcome challenges.

Tourism and Travel

Explore new destinations, plan itineraries, provide exceptional customer service, and promote cultural exchange.

How can I build experience in this pathway?





If you're still in high school and want to find out if a career in immigration is right for you, here are some activities you can do:

- Study immigration laws to understand visa processes
- Research case studies to understand immigration issues
- Take a virtual tour of an immigration office

We recommend studying these subjects in high school:

- English
- Legal Studies
- Geography
- Civics

Here are some suggestions of places you might like to try and find work experience:

- Non-profit organisations that provide legal aid to immigrants
- International human rights organisations
- Government agencies responsible for immigration and customs enforcement
- Language schools or community centres that offer classes for immigrants
- Research institutes or think tanks specialising in immigration policies and studies
