Other General Rules – Direct from the student diary

Courtesy:

- Students are expected to treat staff and fellow students with courtesy at all times and to consider the dignity and rights of others. This includes Canteen staff, visitors etc. This includes appropriate language, and willingness to assist others without being requested to do so.

- Plagiarism
- The presentation of another's work as your own. It is considered a serious academic offence and will not be tolerated at St Patrick's College. Sources, printed and electronic, must be declared in your documentation. Any student who is discovered plagiarising any work from any type of resource will be notified and a letter sent to his parents. Any evidence of plagiarism will incur an 'N' result for the piece of work.
- Punctuality
- Students are expected to arrive punctually to all classes and move quickly between classes. Students will have 5 minutes to move between lesson


