Apprenticeships and Traineeships

Aquaculture Apprenticeship Spotlight

Do you want to work in the outdoors? Do you love the water and environment? If all these apply to you, you might like to consider a career in aquaculture. And one of the best ways to get there is by doing an aquaculture apprenticeship.

What is a career in aquaculture?

A career in aquaculture involves the cultivation and management of aquatic organisms, such as fish, shellfish, and aquatic plants, for commercial purposes. It is a multidisciplinary field that combines aspects of biology, ecology, business, and environmental management. There are many different roles in this field, including farm hands, boat operators, managers, divers, technicians, biologists, and more.

What skills do I need for a career in aquaculture?

Aquaculturists need an understanding of aquatic organisms, their biology, and management techniques. You'll need to have good problem solving skills to address challenges related to water quality, disease control, and production efficiency. As part of your job, you'll probably be expected to operate a variety of machines and equipment. Being adaptable to the changing conditions and regulations of the industry is also very important.

Why should I consider an aquaculture apprenticeship?

Apprenticeships are a great way to get your foot in the door with an employer and start building valuable skills. There are often lots of opportunities to continue working with your employer after your apprenticeship is complete, and even advance your career down the track. As part of an aquaculture apprenticeship, you will be doing real work for an employer while completing study with a TAFE or RTO. An aquaculture apprenticeship usually takes 2-3 years to complete, depending on whether you work and study full- or part-time. Here are some qualifications you might want to look into:

- <u>Certificate III in Aquaculture</u>
- <u>Certificate IV in Aquaculture</u>
- Diploma of Aquaculture

<u>Aquaculture Diver Skill Set</u>

There are tons of benefits to an apprenticeship, rather than just work or study alone, including:

- Getting paid while you learn unlike uni, you can work and study without having to take on an insane work load.
- The opportunity to get hands-on experience, not just endless reading.
- The potential to connect with an employer and continue working with them after your traineeship is finished.
- Your qualification will be nationally recognised, meaning you can go anywhere with it.

Just like searching for a job, there are lots of places you can go to find an apprenticeship. You can start your search on sites like <u>SEEK</u> and <u>Indeed</u>. Take a look on social media like Facebook or LinkedIn to see if any local businesses are hiring. How to Ask People About Their Jobs

Is there a job out there you think you would absolutely love? It can be hard to know exactly what a job is like unless you can get hands-on experience. Maybe you can't find anything suitable near you, or maybe you'd just like some assurance before jumping into a work experience placement. But you can do the next best thing – ask other people about their jobs!

Why should I ask other people about their jobs?

Getting advice on a career you're interested in is always a smart move. You can find out a lot you might not know, like pathways into the career, the ups and the downs, daily tasks, industry insights, and a whole lot more.

Then, you can use this valuable info to help steer you in the right direction. Think about what you learned and weigh up your options – is this still something you'd want to do, or has your perspective changed? It can also help you think about things you can do right now to get closer to your goal.

It's always helpful to get more than one perspective too (if possible). Talk to as many people as you can.

What should I ask?

Here are some questions that you might like to ask to get the most out of the experience:

• What does a normal day look like?

- What's your favourite (and least favourite) part of your job?
- How did you get this job?
- Is this what you wanted to do when you were younger?
- Do you have any advice for someone looking to get into the industry?

It's important to consider how well you know the person you're asking, and remember there are some things that could be inappropriate to ask (for example, asking how much money someone makes).

Some final tips

Take notes – you don't want to go to all this trouble only to forget everything a few days later. Ask follow-up questions – if there is something you don't quite understand, it's better to ask for clarification than to be left unsure. This is also a great way to show you've been actively listening.

Keep in touch – send the person a letter or email thanking them for their time and effort. This could be your chance to make a valuable connection for the future.

<u>3 Tips to Find Life Balance as a Student</u>

Life is a balancing act, and high school students need to become master acrobats in order to navigate their menagerie of tasks and roles. Between school, study, work, chores, family, friends, and maintaining a social life, there's a lot to keep track of each week.

It's easy to fall out of balance – the evidence shows that most working adults in Australia only get <u>around three and a half hours</u> of non-work-or-sleep time each day (and women get around 30 minutes less than men). If you want to see how you compare <u>check out this article from the ABC</u>.

What happens when you're not in balance?

It's easy to write off life balance as a luxury or something airy fairy. But having a good balance in your life could not only make you happier and healthier, in the long run you could accomplish more and do better.

The impacts of lack of balance in your life could include:

• <u>Burnout</u>

- Loss of motivation
- Lack of 'thinking' time
- Mental health issues
- Physical health issues

Signs you could be out of balance

If you generally feel happy, contented, healthy, and well rested, then you're probably already doing a pretty great job at the whole balance thing. Of course, there'll be times when you don't feel great, like exam stress, or trying to juggle multiple assignments, working extra shifts to earn more cash, or periods of illness – that's normal.

If you often feel tired, low, or that every day is a struggle, then it could be time to reassess your priorities and manage your time a bit better. If you don't feel like the problem is going away, or if you have any concerns about your mental health, then please see a professional.

Here's a few things to look out for:

- You wake up tired
- You find it hard to get to sleep
- You often get sick
- You're missing your friends/family/hobbies
- You no longer enjoy school or study
- You often feel anxious, stressed, or miserable
- Boredom is an issue for you

How to get back in balance

There's no one-size fits all solution to finding balance in your life. The amount we need to work, rest, and play depends on how you operate – in other words, you need to find the right balance for your life, not what you think you're supposed to be doing.

If you're not feeling in balance, then there are a couple of things you can try:

Tip 1 – Work out where you are

Make a list of what really *needs* to get done (homework or revision), what you would *like* to get done (less urgent), and what you *want* to do (perhaps exercise or seeing friends). For example, you might include:

- Sleep
- School
- Chores laundry, house cleaning, gardening, washing the car, taking the bins out, washing up, cooking
- Homework/revision/other study
- Paid work or volunteering

- Sports and other extra-curricular commitments
- Hobbies
- Social time spent with family and friends
- Life admin this includes things like eating your meals, essential shopping, washing yourself, paying bills, reading emails
- Time spent on your phone or other device you can find out your average daily screen time on an <u>Android</u> or <u>Apple</u>

You don't have to go into that much detail, but the more you work out, the more wiggle room you might find. Then think about the number of hours you spend doing these things and jot them down.

You could use the <u>Life Balance Worksheet</u> to help you keep track.

Tip 2 – Work out where you want to be

Once you've worked out how you're spending your time, the next step is to think about how you would like your week to look. You've got 168 hours in a week.

If you sleep the recommended 8 hours a day, go to school 9am-3pm 5 days a week, travel an hour for school (there and back), and allow an hour for eating & an hour for other life admin each day, that leaves you with **63 hours** a week to spare. This number is just an estimate – work out your number then use that for the rest of the calculations.

Now you need to work out what your priorities are.

Go back to the list you made in step 1 and decide which of the *optional* activities you have listed is most important.

Then, on the same list, allocate hours to the things you *want* or *need* to do and tally them up. If you get to 63 (or your number of 'spare' hours) and there are still things on the list, then you'll need to think about what matters most – so work out which activities you don't need as much and work out a way to do less of them.

If you find you have loads of free time left – great! You don't have to fill every minute or schedule every hour. But if there's a club you've been itching to join, or a skill you've been wanting to learn, perhaps now is a good time to give it a go.

Tip 3 – Build a plan to help you get there

When you've got to this point, congrats! That's a huge hurdle out of the way. Now you have to make the changes in order to address the balance problems and lead the life you want. Here are some tips that could help you to achieve your end goals:

• Use a planner, calendar, diary or app to write down your new timetable; it could help you stay in check and create new habits instead of slipping back into the old routine.

- <u>Set goals</u> and then break them down into manageable milestones and give them dates.
- Incorporate time limits into your schedule. If you want to play games or go through social media, do it. Just set an alarm to remind you it's time to hop off. Got lots of study to do? Set a timer, and if you haven't got it done, speak to your teacher about an extension or some help.
- Speak to your family. If there's high expectations of you at home, working out exactly what needs to be done and figuring out a schedule could really help.
- Work out which activities on your list you can get rid of on a daily or weekly basis. If you volunteer but it's taking up too much time, ask if you can help out on a more casual basis. If you're doing lots of extra-curricular stuff, is it time to drop something for a bit?
- Be flexible some days or weeks you might have less school work or other commitments, some days you might feel more exhausted, so it's always OK to change your schedule around.
- Take breaks.
- Get enough rest and look after your body.
- Unplug from social media and other screens from time to time (after a little while, you seriously won't miss it).
- Practice mindfulness, which includes being grateful, being present, helping out around home or with friends, or spend more time making better connections with people who make you feel good.
- Be active.
- Learn to say "no" (nicely).
- Ask for help if you need it.

Getting balance in your life is well worth it and is a great skill to use throughout life.

<u>5 Tips for Open Day Success</u>

Open days are heaps of fun, and apart from the food and coffee, they're totally free. You'll be able to explore your future education options and get a first-hand experience of what each institution has to offer. But with so much going on in a single day, how can you make sure you get the most out of the experience? In this blog, we have some tips for open day success you might like to read. Let's get started.

Be prepared

You might be fed up of hearing the words "get organised", but honestly, a little bit of preparation can make a huge difference to how your open days go and what you get out of them.

There are bound to be conflicting dates for open days, and we don't recommend trying to get to more than one a day. Spending some time studying the university websites and reading about the <u>courses</u> you're interested in could help you decide which open days are the must-dos.

Once you've decided which ones you'd like to go to, make sure that you register, then add the dates and directions to your calendar or reminders.

Next, you could print out or download the open day programs. Highlight any info sessions, workshops or other events that you don't want to miss. You won't be able to cram every single talk and info session into your itinerary, so prioritise sessions that align with your interests. Research some parking options or organise your public transport routes and timetables before the day.

Consider taking a friend or family member along for support, second opinions, seat saving, and re-caffeinating duties.

Use the time between information sessions and tours to speak to lecturers and students, check out clubs, or get a feel for accommodation options, cafés, shops, and the local area in general. You may have to find your way around campuses or around the city to attend different sessions. So wear comfortable clothes and shoes, and make sure you have a way of finding out where you are and where you're going (Google maps is perfect for this).

Talking is good

There'll be loads of people on hand to help at open days, including staff, researchers, and current students. They're not there for decoration – they'll be ready and willing to answer your questions and help you to choose the best options for you.

Try and find the lecturers and faculty staff you might be thinking about studying with and ask them about the courses you're interested in, as well as any options you haven't come across that might suit you.

Here's some example questions that might help you out:

- Are there any prerequisites or assumed knowledge for this course?
- What are the core units/modules?
- What are the majors I can choose from?
- How is the course taught and assessed?
- How satisfied are current students with the course?
- How many hours of teaching are involved each week?
- What are job outcomes like for graduates?

- What opportunities are there for work experience placements or internships?
- Is it manageable to have a casual or part-time job and study full-time?
- Are there scholarships I can apply for?
- Are there any overseas studies opportunities?
- If I'm struggling, are there any learning support services available?

• If I don't get the ATAR I need, what alternative pathways could get me into this course? Talking to current students is the best way to learn what university is *really* like. They'll be able to tell you about their first-hand experiences and provide some insider tips (from where to get the best coffee to finding the best accommodation and the ultimate money saving hacks). Between students and the administrative staff, you can probably find answers to all your questions about uni life. Here's some example questions:

- What facilities are located on campus and in town?
- What sort of student support services are available?
- Are there part-time job opportunities available for students?
- What sort of financial help is available if I run out of money?
- How do HELP loans work?
- What types of accommodation are available?
- What's the most popular accommodation option?
- What are some of the events throughout the year I could look forward to?
- What do you think are the best things about this uni/course?
- Did you make any rookie errors that I could avoid?

Don't be shy; there's no such thing as a silly question. Having a list of pre-prepared questions is a great way to guarantee you remember them all on the day.

Explore

Open days allow you to explore where you'll be studying and really familiarise yourself with the campus and facilities, as well as the surrounding areas and the city it's located in. Lecture theatres, labs, libraries, and other learning spaces will all be open for you to view.

You might even get to participate in some activities or workshops that'll give you a hands-on learning experience using the technology and facilities available.

Sign up for a campus tour if it's on offer; a guided walk let you take it all in without worrying about getting hopelessly lost.

Between all the scheduled bits and bobs you might attend, you can also get a peek to see if the uni has cafés, bars, restaurants, gyms, sporting facilities, internet access, computer labs, or any other areas that you might be able to use.

Compare

If you're pretty certain you already know the uni you would like to go to, we still recommend attending a couple of other open days too. This way, you'll have something to compare your preferred choice to. Either it'll confirm your first choice, or it could open your eyes to possibilities you hadn't considered.

If you're not sure, then after you've been to a couple of open days you'll have the information you need to make an informed decision about which unis and courses to apply for.

You could create a checklist of the most important aspects of uni to you. It's a simple way to compare the differences between unis.

You'll be spending a few years and significant amount of money on your uni education, so it's important that you feel comfortable with your choice.

Have fun

Most importantly, open days are a great day out, so enjoy yourself.

What is it Like to Work in a Movie Studio?

Movie studios are places where workers come together to bring stories to life on the big screen. Movie studios have various departments and teams, such as writers, directors, producers, actors, and technicians, who work collaboratively to make films. They handle everything from developing scripts, casting actors, and designing sets, to shooting scenes, editing the final product, and marketing films to the public.

Each movie studio is different, but they do tend to have some things in common:

- 1. Lots of collaboration movies are only made with the effort of lots of different people working together.
- 2. A high-tech environment filmmaking and post-processing technology is always advancing, and you'll get access to the latest and greatest.
- 3. Working closely with people face-to-face interaction and effective communication are still important parts of the movie industry.

Key Outcome

Provide entertainment through film

The main outcome of a movie studio is to write, produce, and shoot films to entertain the public.

Key Tasks

- Write scripts and develop story ideas
- Direct actors and guide performances
- Manage production logistics and schedules
- Design sets, costumes, and props
- Shoot and capture scenes on camera
- Edit footage and refine the final product
- Coordinate post-production tasks (e.g. sound and visual effects)
- Market and promote films to reach audiences
- Collaborate with various departments and professionals

Industry

You can find movie studios in the arts and recreation services industry

Movie studios are generally found in the arts and recreation services industry. There are a few different kinds of movie studios including major studios, independent studios, animation studios, and genre-specific studios.

Work Environment

You can expect flexible hours and on-site work

Flexible hours | *Work on-site* | *Jobs more common in metro areas* | *Strong job growth* Movie studios often operate on extended hours to accommodate various aspects of production (such as scenes that must be filmed at night, etc.). Different departments within the studio might have varying schedules and working hours based on their specific roles and responsibilities.

While some aspects of the work in a movie studio can be done remotely or from home, many tasks require on-site presence and collaboration, particularly during the production phase. Movie studios are found far more commonly in metropolitan areas, so there may be limited opportunities for work in regional and rural locations.

The Career Clusters you'll find in a movie studio

People from all Clusters are needed for a movie studio to run successfully, and there are a variety of roles for people in any Cluster. In many roles, you might find yourself performing tasks across multiple Clusters.

Where do Makers work in a movie studio?

Makers in a movie studio work behind the scenes, collaborating with directors, designers, and artists to fabricate props, sets, costumes, and special effects that contribute to the visual and immersive storytelling experience on the big screen. They also operate and maintain the physical and technical equipment used in filmmaking.

- Camera Operators
- Set Builders
- Prop/Costume Makers
- Special Effects Technicians

Responsibilities of a Linker in a movie studio

Linkers are the people in a movie studio who scout for talent and suitable locations for filming, bringing together the necessary people and places to begin the production process. They are also responsible for creating positive buzz for upcoming movies to build excitement, as well as organising press events and interviews.

- Talent Agents
- Location Scouts
- Marketing Managers
- Publicists

What do Coordinators do in a movie studio?

Coordinators play a crucial role in managing timelines, budgets, and logistics, allowing the creative teams to focus on their artistic work. They are responsible for organising auditions, liaising between departments, negotiating contracts, allocating resources, and ensuring production meets required deadlines and budgets. They might also handle paperwork and other administrative duties.

- Directors
- Production Managers
- Casting Coordinators
- Administration Assistants

Where you'll find Informers in a movie studio

Informers contribute their knowledge to enhance the storytelling, technical execution, and overall quality of a film. They guide and educate the production team on aspects of the film that can include historical accuracy, diversity and cultural sensitivities, and regional and linguistic accuracy. They might also provide advice on any legal requirements and copyright processes and issues.

- Script Consultants
- Special Effects Consultants
- Historical/Cultural/Language Consultants
- Lawyers

The role of Innovators in a movie studio

Innovators in a movie studio are responsible for developing and designing scripts, production techniques, and technical aspects of films. They use their creativity in combination with cutting-edge technology to enhance a film's quality and experience and provide the talent that brings characters to life on our screens.

- Script Writers
- Actors
- Set/Prop/Costume Designers
- Sound Engineers
- Visual Effects (VFX) Designers

What do Guardians do in a movie studio?

Guardians prioritise the safety of cast and crew, ensure the physical security of workers and equipment, and oversee compliance with industry regulations and guidelines. They ensure that necessary measures are taken to prevent accidents and protect other workers in the studio. In a busy and stressful work environment, Guardians also help to maintain the health and wellness of other staff.

- Safety Coordinators
- Stunt Coordinators
- Security Officers
- Health and Wellness Advisors

How do we expect working in a movie studio to change in the future?

The COVID-19 pandemic accelerated the adoption of remote work and virtual collaboration tools in the film industry. While things have mostly gone back to normal, there is increased flexibility in certain areas of pre- and post-production, allowing for collaboration across distances.

The growing popularity of streaming platforms and on-demand content has already altered the industry landscape. Movie studios may increasingly prioritise producing content specifically for streaming platforms, impacting distribution models and creative decision-making. There is also a greater emphasis on diversity and inclusion, both in front of and behind the camera. This shift will lead to more inclusive stories, diverse representation, and increased opportunities for underrepresented groups within movie studios.

And of course, continued advancements in technology, such as virtual reality, augmented reality, and artificial intelligence, could revolutionise certain aspects of filmmaking, including production techniques, visual effects, and immersive storytelling.

Job Spotlight

How to become a Costume Designer

Costume Designers design and create costumes for actors in film, television and on stage. They enhance authenticity and encourage imagination by creating costumes accurate to individual settings and time periods. Costume Designers also design costumes for fancy dress and specific events (e.g. Halloween) and costumes sold in retail outlets.

Are you creative with an eye for detail and work well under pressure? A career as a costume designer could be perfect for you.

About you:

- Artistic with good colour and design sense
- Knowledge of fashion, pattern making and sewing
- Works to strict deadlines and thrives under pressure

The job:

- Work with customers or directors to determine the style of costumes and budget
- Research to ensure you get the details right
- Take accurate measurements and prepare materials for production
- Undertake or supervise the creation, alteration, and repair of costumes

Lifestyle Impact: Low

- Part Time opportunities: Moderate around 28% of Costume Designers work part-time (source: labourmarketinsights.gov.au).
- Average hours for full-time workers: 46 hours a week, which is just above average (source: labourmarketinsights.gov.au).
- Costume Designers' salary (average) \$53,500* per year (source: ato.gov.au). *Salaries vary depending on your skills and experience.

Costume Designers are most in demand in these locations:

Demand for Costume Designers is highest in Victoria and New South Wales. Most work in the Professional, Scientific and Technical Services, and Manufacturing industries.

How to become a Costume Designer in Australia

A degree isn't essential for entry to this career, but some formal training may be preferred by employers unless you have an amazing resume and portfolio of your works.

Step 1 – Study English, Maths, and any creative classes that inspire you at high school.

Step 2 – Get relevant work experience by volunteering at your local theatre or film company.

Step 3 – Choose and complete a relevant qualification. Consider VET pathways. Examples include:

- Bachelor of Fine Arts (Design for Performance) from NIDA
- <u>Bachelor of Fine Arts (Production)</u> from the University of Melbourne
- Certificate III in Apparel, Fashion and Textiles
- Diploma of Live Production and Technical Services

Step 4 – Find an internship or mentor and gain further work experience. Make useful industry contacts and keep an up to date portfolio of your works.

Step 5 – Continue to build on your skills through professional experience and short courses.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

How long does it take to become a Costume Designer?

Becoming a costume designer could take 4 to 5 years after leaving high school if you do a degree. Otherwise you could start in a junior role as soon as you leave school and work your way up.

Where do Costume Designers work?

Costume designers work as part of a team for theatre and film companies, television stations, and video production houses – often working alongside the director, make-up artists, set designers and other creatives. You could find yourself working on set, backstage, in an office, or in a workshop.

Do I need to go to university to become a Costume Designer?

No, you don't have to go to university. But relevant qualifications and lots of work experience could fast track your career and open up more opportunities.

Is Costume Design a good career to aim for?

If you love the creative arts and would like a career that could be flexible and varied, costume design could be a rewarding career for you.
