They do not practise what they preach.

Addressing the people and his disciples Jesus said, 'The scribes and the Pharisees occupy the chair of Moses. You must therefore do what they tell you and listen to what they say; but do not be guided by what they do: since they do not practise what they preach. They tie up heavy burdens and lay them on men's shoulders. but will they lift a finger to move them? Not they! Everything they do is done to attract attention, like wearing broader phylacteries and longer tassels, like wanting to take the place of honour at banquets and the front seats in the synagogues, being greeted obsequiously in the market squares and having people call them Rabbi.

'You, however, must not allow yourselves to be called Rabbi, since you have only one Master, and you are all brothers. You must call no one on earth your father, since you have only one Father, and he is in heaven. Nor must you allow yourselves to be called teachers, for you have only one Teacher, the Christ. The greatest among you must be your servant. Anyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and anyone who humbles himself will be exalted.'

Reflection by Greg Sunter

This week's gospel is a lesson on leadership. The gospel writer has Jesus offering a very strong criticism of the religious leadership of his day as exemplified by the scribes and Pharisees. He accuses them of not practising what they preach - a rather familiar criticism often levelled at politicians, teachers and church leaders in our own society today. When the criticism is used today it often implies that if the person fails to practise what they preach then what they have to say carries little weight. But rather than totally rejecting the scribes and Pharisees, Jesus cautions his listeners to take notice of what they have to say - as their teachings were always grounded in scripture and tradition - but not to follow their example of behaviour.

gospel Throughout Matthew's we encounter criticisms of the scribes and Pharisees. This example is of the same nature: they were too caught up with rules and obligations and did not approach life with compassion and concern for the Individual. The community for whom Matthew's gospel was Intended was struggling with being both Jewish and Christian. They were coming to realise that to be followers of Jesus' way they needed to cast aside some of the attitudes and behaviours of their Jewish tradition. That applied particularly to the model of leadership that they had Inherited from Jesus: a model of leadership through service, not power and authority. This gospel passage makes it. very clear for that original community as well as ourselves that true leadership is provided through service to others and through humble action. Unlike Pharisees of Jesus' time, Christian leaders are called to do away with the trappings of power and prestige and, instead, be of service to those whom they would lead.





Visiting the Family

Just about all my ancestors are buried alongside each other in a quiet spot in a country cemetery. It suits them. Here they are, these rather quiet, shy people who shunned publicity or the spotlight – these quiet workers who came in poverty but made their mark. This spot seems just about right for them – a long way from their native Ireland but tucked away under a gum tree in Australia in the farthest corner of the cemetery. Some had long lives, my great grandfather died at a hundred and eight, the oldest man in the colony at that time. On the other hand my brother died at eighteen, and the other two before their time and my nephew did not even make ten years old. My mother died before I got to know her. My sister is at rest there - she looked after the family when our mother died and her husband who brought a lot of joy to our family. And here is my father, that rather stern man with his extraordinary sense of duty and commitment to continuing the legacy he had been given. There are others too with just a few words to describe who they might have been. So I visit them.

I know that they are not there but I am always reminded on my visits of the final words of the burial service: In peace let us take our brother/sister to his/her place of rest. So here they are at rest, in peace.

They deserve that – to be in peace and at rest. The few words on their graves do not really describe who they were, what they were to others, what they contributed to their communities, their families. But when they are gone, who will remember them but us? Who will pray for them but us? Who will give thanks for their lives, for them and for who they were? I know we don't need to go to the cemetery to do that, but there is a connection there, a time to remember and give thanks.

I appreciate that today more and more people do not believe in an afterlife but rather 'that this is it.' I don't believe that. I have no idea what an afterlife looks like, feels like, is like. And neither does anyone else really, including those who deny that an afterlife exists.

Nevertheless, in the words of John: Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. (1 John 4). If that is so, why would that end at death?

Why would all that finish when our life changes? Why would God who planted within us this life force we call love just cut it off when life changes? Much of our life is about forming relationships that last, relationships that give meaning and purpose to our lives. Why would that just stop at death? It's more a question posed by songwriter Nick Cave, "When will I awaken to your love?"

Life is about how we love and how we have found love. Love is the very thing that gives life its meaning, its satisfaction, its direction, its purpose. We are better people when we love, more authentic, more true to who we are and what we are meant to be. We find purpose and fulfilment in genuine love. Yes, there are people for whom finding love in life is difficult, some who do not enjoy its comfort, security, its challenges and that reminds us that part of our purpose in life is to bring that love to others. That doesn't mean that some of us don't face death with fear or uncertainty, despite the depth of our faith. Why wouldn't we as we face the unknown.

Do I need to go to the cemetery? Probably not but when I do, I visit those who have gone before. Someone remembers them, someone prays for them, someone appreciates what they did. Did their life matter? I visit them to tell them that it did! I am here because of you, because of what you did, because of who you were.

The words of the final ceremony of burial have special significance:

As we go our separate ways, let us take leave of our brother/sister. May our farewell express our affection for him/her; may it ease our sadness and strengthen our hope. One day we shall joyfully greet him/her again when the love of Christ, which conquers all things, destroys even death itself.

I guess that is why I visit my relatives.

Something to Think About

If you were in charge of the world, what rules would you create? Why would these rules be important?

The Story

Jesus referred to the religious leaders as hypocrites - people who said one thing and did something different. Jesus criticises them for showing off, acting important, taking the best seats, and having people call them by fancy titles. Jesus encourages his listeners to be humble, to put others first, and to place God before all else.

The Scriptures

A Reading from the Holy Gospel according to Matthew

23-1-12

Jesus said to the crowds and to his disciples:

"The Pharisees and the teachers of the Law are experts in the Law of Moses. So obey everything they teach you, but don't do as they do. After all, they say one thing and do something else. They pile heavy burdens on people's shoulders and won't lift a finger to help them. Everything they do is just to show off in front of others. They even make a big show of wearing Scripture verses on their foreheads and arms, and they wear big tassels for everyone to see. They love the best seats at banquets and the front seats in the meeting places. And when they are in the market, they like to have people greet them as their teachers.

But none of you should be called a teacher. You have only one teacher, and all of you are like brothers and sisters. Don't call anyone on earth your father. All of you have the same Father in heaven. None of you should be called the leader. The Messiah is your only leader. Whoever is the greatest should be the servant of the others. If you put yourself above others, you will be put down. But if you humble yourself, you will be honoured."

Group Activity

All About Me

You will need: "All About Me" template for each child, colouring pencils or markers. Option: collage paper to make clothes, wool for hair etc...

- 1) Ask children to think about how they would describe themselves e.g. I like to help people, I love animals, I am friendly.
- 2) Invite children to draw or write one characteristic in each of the bubbles.
- **3)** Then ask children to add a face, clothes, hair, shoes and so on to the figure of the person so it looks like them.
