Australian Geography Competition 2021

The Australian Geography Competition is a contest for Australian secondary school students, assessing their geographical knowledge and skills.

In 2021, the Competition will be held in schools between Thursday 18 March and Wednesday 31 March. It consists of multiple-choice questions testing geographical knowledge and skills. Outstanding students at each age level win prizes which include book vouchers and special certificates, and medals for first in Australia.

International Mathematical Modeling Challenge (IM²C)

The International Mathematical Modeling Challenge (IM²C) is a new team-based mathematical competition for Australian secondary students.

Operating in teams, comprising up to four students from the same school, participants must work collaboratively to solve a problem (set globally) by devising and applying an original mathematical model.

Constrained to a period of five consecutive days, teams unpack the given problem, hypothesise, test, and develop a working solution, before preparing and submitting a report on their solution to the

Australian judging panel. The best two solutions then progress to compete against the other participating countries on an international level.

The IM²C exists to support the real-world application of learning, build proficiency, encourage collaboration, and challenge students to use mathematics to make a real difference to the world around them.

This year the competition will take place between 8 March – 30 March in Australia.

University Disability Services

For many high school students living with disabilities or ongoing health issues, the thought of heading off the university could seem like a massive challenge.

Justice and Solidarity

However, universities these days (as well as most other tertiary education providers), recognise some of the issues that you might be facing. You'll find that they offer a range of services that could help you to transition more easily into university life and succeed once you're settled in.

What help do university disability services offer?

Different universities might offer different services, so it would be well worth your time <u>researching</u> <u>what's available</u> at all the campuses you're interested in studying at. Then, we recommend that you make contact with the teams working in those departments, ask them more questions, or even arrange to meet them.

Examples of some of the services offered around Australia include:

- Accessibility options
- Adjustments to assessments
- Special arrangements during exams
- Provision of specialised equipment and technology
- Advice, advocacy and on-site support

Who is eligible for help from these support services?

Anyone who has a disability or chronic health condition may be eligible to apply for help from these university services. Lots of them also apply if you're the main carer of someone with a disability or long-term health issue.

Learning disabilities, mental health issues and injuries are also often included in the eligibility categories.

The best thing to do is contact universities directly. They'll be able to tell you if you'll be eligible for assistance, what services and provisions may be offered, and how to make sure you can access them.

The Transition to Work employment service helps young people aged 15-24 into work (including apprenticeships and training) or education.

Transition to Work participants receive intensive, pre-employment support to develop practical skills to get a job, connect with education or training, find local job opportunities and connect with relevant local community services.

To participate in Transition to Work you must be:

- Between 15-24 years old
- Either:
 - o an Australian citizen, or
 - a holder of a permanent visa, New Zealand Special Category Visa, or Nominated Visa (including Temporary Protection Visa or Safe Haven Visa).

- Excellent researching, IT and multi-media skills
- A team worker who's a decisive leader and can manage resources effectively

The job:

Your duties as a Curator will vary depending on where you're working and what type of role you choose to do, but on an average day you could expect to be:

- Finding and buying new collections
- Identifying and recording items, then researching them
- Exploring different ways to exhibit or preserve them
- Arranging restoration works

- Working with the public, doing presentations or answering questions
- Designing exhibitions or installations
- Writing grant applications and fundraising, keeping to a strict budget
- Managing staff and volunteers
- Preparing labels and cataloguing items and writing detailed records
- Creating educational and promotional material
- Collaborating with other museum professionals such as security staff, marketing, educators and outreach workers

Lifestyle Impact: Low

- Part Time opportunities: Good around 33% of curators work part-time (source: joboutlook.gov.au)
- Average hours for full-time workers: 42 hours a week (source: joboutlook.com.au),
- Curators salary (average) \$85,000* per year (Source: seek.com.au) *salaries vary between industries, your role, and depending on your skills and experience
- Future career growth: Moderate (Source: joboutlook.gov.au)
- Working in this field, there could be opportunities to travel, get out and about and work on site or go on buying or research trips. Some of your work could also be done remotely and online, meaning that you could work some of the time from home.

Curators are most in demand in these locations:

This is a small profession, and at the moment a large proportion of Curators are employed in the ACT, although there are opportunities to be found Australia-wide – even in some of the more remote parts.

How to become a Curator in Australia

You'll need a relevant bachelor's degree or postgraduate qualification if you'd like to work as a Curator.

You can tailor your qualification to reflect your areas of interest such as arts, science, technology, natural history, cultural heritage, history, anthropology or archaeology for example, majoring in a relevant field.

Step 1 – Choose high school subjects that reflect your interests and will help you to meet any university course prerequisites. You'll need English to demonstrate you've got the necessary communication skills. IT could come in very useful too.

Step 2 – Complete relevant tertiary qualification e.g.: Bachelor of Art History and Curatorship at ANU Bachelor of Art History and Curating at Monash Bachelor of Arts Major Archaeology at USQ

If you choose to do Zoology for example and there's no major that you think will qualify you to work as a curator; then follow your passions and if you're still keen to pursue this career after you graduate, you could look at completing a postgraduate qualification. <u>Graduate Certificate in Art Curating at USYD</u> <u>Graduate Diploma of Museum Studies at Deakin</u> <u>Master of Art Curatorship at the University of Melbourne</u> Master of Art Curating at USYD Master of Arts (Curatorial & Museum Studies) at Adelaide Uni

Vocational Qualifications could also be a pathway into a university degree if you'd like to test the waters first. Your studies could count as credits towards your degree (you'll need to confirm with the universities though).

<u>Certificate IV in Arts Administration</u> <u>Diploma of Visual Arts</u> Remember, you may have the option of studying some courses online.

Step 3 – Volunteering or getting relevant work experience is a great way to network and give your resume a boost. Once you have gained the necessary qualifications, you could also look at internships as a way of getting your foot in the door.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

What do Curators do?

Curators spend their days immersed in their passions. In this job you could be researching works of art, cultures or relics. Telling stories about collections that are both interesting and educational to your audiences. Finding and creating exhibitions as well as deciding on the themes and ideas that will introduce them. You might also have to do presentations and market your collection in other ways.

Some admin duties will be involved too. This could be anything from cataloguing items and applying for funds and grants, to budget reports and staff management.

What industries employ curators?

Curators can work in lots of industries including hospitality, tourism and conservation. However, the majority are employed in the Arts and Recreation Services, Public Administration, Safety as well as Education and Training. (Source: joboutlook.gov.au)

Do I need to go to university to become a Curator?

Yes, you'll need a formal undergraduate or post graduate qualification in a related field to make you eligible to apply for positions as a Curator.

Curated exhibitions are most commonly found in galleries and museums, but you could also be working with displays in a range of other locations. Zoos and aquariums, your local council building, hospital, or university. You might be working on projects in any number of public spaces such as parks, gardens or historical sites, retail areas, or hospitality venues. You could even be setting up exhibitions in disused shop fronts, abandoned storage areas, at the beach or in a residential home, it really depends on your role.

What are 3 things I can do right now to help me become a Curator?

If you're at high school and you'd like to find out if a career as a Curator is right for you and start learning skills and gaining experience, here's a few things you could try:

- 1. Study exhibitions in detail, look at the lighting, interactive elements, information available. Talk to curators and start to develop your own ideas and style.
- 2. Ask school if you can be the curator of an exhibition and make a portfolio of your work.
- 3. Volunteer at your local exhibition spaces, sign up for any experience days and workshops, ask them for a work experience placement.
