A reading from the book of Numbers

21:4-9

On the way through the wilderness, the Israelites lost patience. They spoke against God and against Moses, 'Why did you bring us out of Egypt to die in this wilderness? For there is neither bread nor water here; we are sick of this unsatisfying food.' At this God sent fiery serpents among the people; their bite brought death to many in Israel. The people came and said to Moses, 'We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you. Intercede for us with the Lord to save us from these serpents.' Moses interceded for the people, and the Lord answered him, 'Make a fiery serpent and put it on a standard. If anyone is bitten and looks at it, he shall live.' So Moses fashioned a bronze serpent which he put on a standard, and if anyone was bitten by a serpent, he looked at the bronze serpent and lived.

But God raised him high and gave him the name which is above all other names so that all beings in the heavens, on earth and in the underworld,

PEACE WITH CREATION SEASON OF CREATION 2025

Today we concentrate on the power of the cross in our lives. It is the ultimate demonstration of the nature of God. Christ gave of himself even to death on the cross. We stand before the glorious cross and praise God for God's incomprehensible goodness toward us. God's graciousness is poured out indiscriminately and prodigally, as only profound love can be given. Such is the nature of our God, and the cross is the symbol of this nature. It was through the cross that Jesus conquered sin and death and won for us access to God. It is through the cross that we die to sin and rise to new life in Christ. As painful as life's crosses may be, they serve to transform us. It can be our hope in the midst of pain and suffering and brokenness, because it promises to carry us into new life. Through the goodness of God, which has been poured out for us, we have been granted eternal life. It is incomprehensible to think that death is the way to life, but that is the message of this feast. The cross, which is a sign of shame and misery, is now a symbol of glory and exaltation.

SEASON OF CREATION

As part of our response to the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor, we will be collecting cleaning products for refugees and asylum seekers who are supported by the Brigidine Asylum Seekers Project (BASP) on the weekends of 20th/21st September and 27th/28th September. Thank you in advance for your generous support. In the latest BASP Newsletter we read that the ban on granting permanent protection to around 900 people who were transferred back to Australia from Nauru and PNG has put them in an uncertain predicament. Since resettlement arrangements with New Zealand, the USA and Canada are either finished or suspended, they have nowhere to go. The majority are recognised refugees and many are in desperate circumstances.



SAFEGUARDING SUNDAY Today we mark Safeguarding Sunday, a day when we pause to focus on our responsibility to protect and care for the vulnerable in our midst. In the Bible, we find a clear and strong message about justice, compassion, and speaking up for those who cannot speak for themselves. We are called to be a safe, welcoming and hope-filled Church. In our everyday lives, let's be mindful of those around us who are vulnerable or marginalised; those who are the 'silent' ones in our society, the ones without a voice! Today, God may be calling you to stand up for them. Whether it's through prayer, support, or direct action, we are invited to participate in God's work of justice.
