The basics of studying medicine

Dreaming of becoming a doctor? You're not alone - medicine is often seen as one of the world's most respected careers (and typically comes with a nice paycheck too).

If you want to study medicine at university, understand that this journey takes years of dedication after high school. But with the right preparation, you can make your medical dreams come true.

Here are some important things you should know before you even submit an application:

IT CAN BE VERY COMPETITIVE

But don't let that stop you. We need lots of doctors (even more so than just a few years ago), so if you've done the work and are prepared, then you'll stand a good chance.

PREPARING YOUR APPLICATION CAN TAKE TIME

If you're in Year 12 now, then you need to get your preparation underway fast. If you're in Year 10 or 11, start thinking about it now so there's not as much to prepare in Year 12.

You can expect to undergo testing, interviews, submit essays, and more, all on top of the normal university application process.

YOUR DEGREE IS JUST THE FIRST STEP

Graduating from a medical program is great, but you'll still need to undergo years of training before you can practice on real patients without supervision. Medical school is followed by an Internship (usually one year), then a Residency of one or more years.

After that there's even more training, experience, and exams - you could also do your Fellowship and/or PhD and become a qualified GP, Physician, Surgeon, or Specialist.

Medicinae ac Chirurgiae Doctoranda (Doctor of Medicine and Surgery). The same level of award as an MD, used exclusively by the Australian National University.

Bachelor of Clinical Sciences and Doctor of Medicine.

University Clinical Aptitude Test for Australia and New Zealand. A test used as part of the admission process to many undergraduate medical programs. [See more here.](#)

GAMSAT

Graduate Australian Medical School Admissions Test. A test used as part of the admission process to many graduate medical programs. [See more here.](#)

Multiple Skills Assessment. Interview style used as part of the admission process to the Joint Medical Program (JMP) at the University of Newcastle and University of New England. [See more here.](#)

Casper

Computer-based Assessment for Sampling Personal Characteristics. A test used as part of the admission process to some medical programs. [See more here.](#)

PQA

Personal Qualities Assessment. A test used as part of the admission process to the JMP. [See more here.](#)

TAC

Tertiary Admissions Centre. Most applications to undergraduate medical programs in Australia are made through a TAC. [See more here.](#)

GEMSAS

Graduate Entry Medical School Admission System. Most applications to postgraduate medical programs in Australia are made through GEMSAS. [See more here.](#)

Study terms

ATAR

Australian Tertiary Admission Rank. A number between 0.00 and 99.95 that indicates your position relative to all the students in your age group. Used by universities in Australia to select students for admission to courses.

GPA

Grade point average. A calculation of your overall academic performance during university study, typically measured on a 4- or 7-point scale in Australia and a 9-point scale in New Zealand. Note that GPA calculations can differ from university to university.

NCEA

National Certificate of Educational Achievement. The main qualification for secondary school students in New Zealand.

WAM

Weighted average mark. Another way universities can calculate your overall academic performance, typically measured as a score or percentage out of 100. Note that WAM calculations can differ from university to university.

UE

University Entrance. The minimum requirement for school leavers to be eligible to apply to university in New Zealand. [See more here.](#)

EFTSL / EFTS

Equivalent Full-Time Student (Load). A standardised measure of average study load in Australia and New Zealand. 1.0 EFTSL represents one year of full-time study. Typically used to determine eligibility for government funding and support.

NCEA Rank Score

A score based on your best 80 credits at Level 3 over a maximum of five approved subjects. Used by some universities in New Zealand to select students for admission to courses.

Your study options

While they may have slightly different names, all medical degrees approved by the [Australian Medical Council](#) are equivalent for the purposes of commencing practice as a doctor.

This means that no matter which university you graduate from or what degree appears on your testamur, you'll be qualified to start your internship.

Completing an approved degree in Australia will also allow you to qualify for registration in New Zealand, and vice versa.

YOUR FIRST OPTION...

Is to commence one of the 5 to 7-year undergraduate entry or combined degrees once you finish school. There are currently 23 programs in Australia and 2 in New Zealand that offer this direct option.

If you don't make it into one of these programs (and remember, there are limited places), don't worry - you can still become a doctor.

THE SECOND PATHWAY...

Is to complete any undergraduate degree, then apply for a postgraduate medical program. Your first degree could be in any field, depending on the requirements of the postgraduate program you're considering.

This pathway also allows you to try out other careers before committing to medicine, and have a Plan B to fall back on.



The pathway to becoming a doctor

1

Finish high school. You'll probably need to complete prerequisite subjects such as English, Mathematics, Biology, and Chemistry.



2

Study either a direct entry medical program, or a separate undergraduate degree plus a graduate medical program.



3

Receive provisional registration and work as an intern for a minimum of 12 months. You will complete a variety of training in different areas.



4

Congratulations - you're now a doctor! You can either start practising general medicine, or choose a specialisation and train further.

The assessment process

The assessment process is different for undergraduate programs and postgraduate programs, and we mainly focus on undergraduate programs in this guide.

There are different components used by each university, and each of these has a different weighting in their individual assessment process.

Understanding the assessment process is vital for success, so once you've chosen some potential programs, do your research and learn about each component they use and what you need to do.

Some of the programs require you to apply directly to the university as well as (or instead of) applying through your state's TAC, and there are a range of deadlines. Other programs wait for results release day and then invite applicants for interviews in December and January.

Be aware that application deadlines are typically very strict for medical programs, and you may not be able to apply or change your preferences after the on-time application deadline.

ALL DIRECT ENTRY PROGRAMS REQUIRE AN ATAR OR NCEA UE

The minimum requirements vary between programs. The lowest score to actually receive an offer may be higher than the posted minimum requirements, depending on the quality of the applicants and other factors.

18 OF THE PROGRAMS REQUIRE A UCAT SCORE

Usually these interviews are in the form of a Multiple Mini Interview, but the structure and questions can vary. You can find out more about interviews later in the guide.

THERE CAN BE OTHER REQUIREMENTS TOO

You may also need to participate in other tests, like the Casper or psychometric testing. Some programs ask you to submit an essay, statement, or other documentation as well.

The UCAT

Some of the programs require you to sit the [University Clinical Aptitude Test](#) (or UCAT ANZ) before you can apply. So what exactly is the UCAT?

Basically, it's a test that determines whether or not you have the right abilities and qualities to work as a doctor. Your UCAT results are used in combination with your academic results (and occasionally other test results) to determine whether you'll progress to the next stage of applications (usually the interview stage) or receive an offer.

The test runs for two hours and is computer-based. In 2026, there are four sections to the UCAT:

- Verbal Reasoning
- Decision Making
- Quantitative Reasoning
- Situational Judgement

Make sure you read the entry requirements for any course you're interested in to see if you'll need to take the UCAT, as you will need to sit it before applications close.

Interviews

Being a good doctor doesn't just come down to your academic achievements, but your human skills too, like communication, adaptability, empathy, and ethics. Universities are also interested in knowing your motivation for studying medicine. These are all assessed as part of an interview.

The most common interview formats used by universities in Australia and New Zealand are Multiple Mini Interviews (MMIs) and panel interviews. They can both be conducted either in-person or online.

The exact format of interview and the kind of questions asked will vary from university to university. We recommend you read any information provided to you from the university carefully so you know exactly what to expect and how to prepare.

MULTIPLE MINI INTERVIEWS

As the name suggests, MMIs typically involve a series of separate 'mini' interviews, where you'll spend 5-10 minutes at a 'station' with one interviewer before rotating onto the next.

At each station, you'll be presented with a scenario or task and asked to respond to or complete it. Each station has a different theme or topic, and the scenario or task may or may not be related to medicine or health.

PANEL INTERVIEWS

Panel interviews (sometimes called structured interviews) are a more traditional style of interview, similar to what you might encounter when applying for jobs. They involve one or more interviewers asking you a series of questions.

The questions in panel interviews are typically more straightforward than in MMIs, but can occasionally include scenario questions too.

INTERVIEW PREPARATION TIPS

- Practice answering questions with friends or family and ask them to give you feedback on your presentation skills.
- Prepare real examples of things you've achieved or overcome, the skills they helped you build, and other reflections on your experiences.
- Learn about the specifics of the university you're applying to - if they have a strong focus on rural health, for example, you can definitely expect questions about that in the interview.
- Dress like you would for a job interview, even if the interview is online. Making a good first impression can ensure you start on the right foot.

Creating a Plan B

You're probably not going to want to hear this, but every year students with brilliant school results, UCAT scores, and interview performances miss out on getting into medicine.

Some of the programs have thousands of applicants for a handful of spots. Take the University of Sydney for example - they receive thousands of applicants each year for just 30 places. You can do everything right, and still not get in this time around. Which is why having a Plan B is a great idea.

Your Plan B will most likely be an alternative path to medicine, such as through a graduate program. But we also recommend that your Plan B includes career options other than 'doctor', because there are so many more amazing careers out there to explore.

WHAT SHOULD YOU STUDY IF YOU DON'T GET IN TO MEDICINE?

Many students who don't receive an offer to their preferred medical program think they should choose a degree in Medical Science, Clinical Science, or Biomedicine to maximise their chances of making it into a graduate medical program.

But these courses are often filled with other highly talented students who also just missed out on medicine, potentially making it harder to achieve a good GPA. And if you don't eventually enrol in a graduate medical program, you need to be sure you're going to be happy with a career in one of those alternative fields instead.

Luckily, many graduate medical programs (i.e. ones you can only get into once you already have a degree) don't put limits on the type of degree you can have. This means that you can apply with a Bachelor of Social Science, Nursing, Arts, Engineering, Accounting, or IT.

So if there's something else you're interested in, use that as your backup option instead, even if it's not related to medicine. That way you'll have a solid Plan B with good job prospects (just in case).

Understanding fees and places

In Australia

There are three types of places for domestic medical students in Australia: Commonwealth Supported Places (CSPs), Bonded Places (BPs), and Full Fee-Paying Places (FFPs).

Public universities are usually not able to offer FFPs for domestic undergraduate students. This means that as a domestic undergraduate student you generally won't be able to access a FFP, other than at a private university (such as Bond) or in a postgraduate degree with no CSP allocations (such as Macquarie's MD).

It's also worth considering that the Australian Government has guaranteed an internship place for all graduates with a CSP or bonded place, so if you graduate from one of these programs, you'll be well on your way to working as a doctor.

COMMONWEALTH SUPPORTED PLACES

These are places where the government pays part of your fees. Nearly all domestic undergraduate medical places are CSPs.

It won't cover all of the fees, but it will cover a lot of them and you don't have to pay it back. You could also get a loan to cover the remaining fees (called a HELP loan - read more about them on the next page).

To enrol in one of these places you need to be eligible, which means you need to be an Australian citizen. Some people from New Zealand or on Permanent Visas can also be eligible depending on other criteria.

BONDED PLACES

28.5% of all CSPs in medical degrees are required to be **bonded places**. They're designed to encourage more graduates to work in regional or rural areas.

If you agree to the bonded place, you'll need to work in a regional, rural, or remote location for a period of 3 years within 18 years of finishing your degree. If you don't, you may have to pay back the subsidised portion of your course fees on top of what you already owe or have paid.

Bonded places are usually offered once all unbonded places have been filled.

FULL FEE PAYING PLACES

In some rare circumstances, you may be offered a full-fee paying place.

Medical programs offered by private universities or universities that don't receive government funding make some or all places full-fee paying.

If you are offered an FFP, the total cost of your degree will typically be higher than if you were offered a CSP - but you're still eligible for a HELP loan to temporarily cover the cost.

We always recommend to check with your chosen university for their individual fee program before you enrol.

In New Zealand

In New Zealand, each university sets their fees individually. There are only two kinds of places: domestic and international.

DOMESTIC FEES

In NZ, the government subsidises the fees of domestic students, so you'll generally pay a lower rate than international students.

Domestic students include:

- NZ citizens and permanent residents
- Australian citizens and permanent residents

HECS AND FEE-HELP

HELP is a loan scheme from the Australian government that you can use to pay for your university fees. HECS-HELP is available to students in CSPs, while FEE-HELP is available to students in FFPs.

The **HELP loan limit** for medical students is \$186,544 (as of March 2026). The limit is combined between all HELP loans, so if you need to study more than one course, they all count towards the same limit.

Once you start earning over \$67,000 before tax each year (as of March 2026), part of your wage will automatically be taken by the government to start repaying your HELP debt.

STUDENT LOANS

New Zealand citizens can apply for a **Student Loan** to help cover the cost of their course fees. The maximum you can borrow (as of March 2026) is \$35,000 per 1 EFTS (about 120 points or credits).

Once you start earning over \$24,128 before tax each year (as of March 2026), part of your wage will automatically be taken by the government to start repaying your loan.

Closing dates

The majority of undergraduate (school-leaver) programs close on the same day as general state-based university applications (i.e. through UAC or VTAC). This is normally around the end of September. Some programs have not finalised their application dates yet, but we will be updating this guide throughout the year.

Programs with direct application options may have dates which open earlier and close later, but as the universities may change these dates at their discretion, we recommend checking directly with the university when you go to apply.
