



Q A	Is there going to be a dog roaming around the school as it pleases? No, there will always be very thorough planning and supervision related to all of the dogs movements.	<ul> <li>Q What if my child is allergic to dogs?</li> <li>A This information will be collated by the school and your child can be included on many different levels without being at risk.</li> </ul>	Q A	What if my child is scared of dogs? Fear is something that will be respected and acknowledged as very real. We hope to discuss this with anyone who needs to.
Q A	How do I let the school know about some concerns specific to my child? All families will be given the opportunity to give us information that we will need to be aware of and plan for.	<ul> <li>Will the dog be too distracting for my child's learning?</li> <li>A This program, when done well, has proven to have far more positive impacts on learning than negative.</li> </ul>	Q A	Is this dog just for the kids with high needs? The school wellbeing dog will become a very familiar member of our entire community, not just for specific individuals or cohorts.
Q A	Where does the dog live? The dog lives with a primary carer who is usually a staff member at the school. School announcements will inform you of these details.	<ul> <li>Q How is having a dog at school good for my child?</li> <li>A When connection is built authentically between human and animal we see reduced anxiety, lowered heart rates, increased social and emotional development and more.</li> </ul>	Q A	Can my child play or interact with the school dog? We will be looking to create as many possibilities to create connections between any interested students and the school dog, however, this may take some time.
Q A	How often will the dog be at school? The school dog will start out attending 1-2 days per week and may build up to a maximum of 3-4 days per week.	<ul><li>Q What if the dog bites someone?</li><li>A In our policy manual we have a strict protocol that will deal with any such issues should they arise.</li></ul>	Q A	Is the dog at risk of too much stimulation at school? If the school dog is living a really balanced work life, aligned with the Dogs Connect training model, we believe a healthy state will be sustained.
