Numbers 21:4-9

On the way through the wilderness, the Israelites lost patience. They spoke against God and against Moses, 'Why did you bring us out of Egypt to die in this wilderness? For there is neither bread nor water here; we are sick of this unsatisfying food.'

At this God sent fiery serpents among the people; their bite brought death to many in Israel. The people came and said to Moses, 'We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you. Intercede for us with the Lord to save us from these serpents.' Moses interceded for the people, and the Lord answered him, 'Make a fiery serpent and put it on a standard. If anyone is bitten and looks at it, he shall live.' So Moses fashioned a bronze serpent which he put on a standard, and if anyone was bitten by a serpent, he looked at the bronze serpent and lived.

#### **Responsorial Psalm**

(R.) Do not forget the works of the Lord!

Give heed, my people, to my teaching;, turn your ear to the words of my mouth. I will open my mouth in a parable and reveal hidden lessons of the past. (R.)

When he slew them then they would seek him, return and seek him in earnest. They would remember that God was their rock, God the Most High their redeemer. **(R.)**

Yes, God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but so that through him the world might be saved.'



#### The Gospel of the Lord

#### REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA

Today we concentrate on the power of the cross in our lives. It is the ultimate demonstration of the nature of God. Christ gave of himself even to death on the cross. This is characteristic, not only of the man Jesus, but of the Godhead. Creation is the first example of divine emptying; redemption is the ultimate example. Unlike Good Friday when we stand before the stark cross and mourn the death of our innocent messiah, today we stand before the glorious cross and praise God for God's incomprehensible goodness toward us. God's graciousness is poured out indiscriminately, prodigally as only profound love can be given. Such is the nature of our God, and the cross is the symbol of this nature.

Jesus compares the pole in the wilderness on which was fixed the serpent to the cross which becomes the source of our healing. It was through the cross that Jesus conquered sin and death and won for us access to God. It is through the cross that we die to sin and rise to new life in Christ. As painful as life's crosses may be, they serve to transform us. It can be our hope in the midst of pain and suffering and brokenness, because it promises to carry us into new life.

Through the goodness of God, which has been poured out for us, we have been granted eternal life. It is incomprehensible to think that death is the way to life, but that is the message of this feast. The cross, which is a sign of shame and misery, is now a symbol of glory and exaltation.

### Catholic Teaching on the Sign of the Cross

- **Trinitarian Faith**: When Catholics say, "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit," they profess belief in the Holy Trinity—the central mystery of Christian faith.
- Christ's Sacrifice: Tracing the Cross on the body recalls Jesus' crucifixion, affirming His saving work and our redemption through it.
- **Baptismal Identity:** The gesture echoes the words spoken at baptism, reminding the faithful that they belong to God and are called to live as disciples of Christ.
- **Prayer and Protection:** The Church teaches that the Sign of the Cross is both a prayer and a spiritual shield. It sanctifies the moment and invokes divine grace.
