Introduction - MAGIS 2019

The John XXIII College Magis Gifted and Talented Program continued to grow significantly in 2019 with three major areas of focus for the year - increasing student participation in key gifted and talented competitions, involving more staff in the program, and creating significant and authentic leadership opportunities for Magis and Altiora members.

Success was achieved in each area of focus. Record numbers of students represented the college in Da Vinci Decathlon, WADL Debating, Optiminds and World Scholar's Cup, whilst all other areas retained their levels. It was also pleasing that a large group attended Academy Conferences' Julie Arliss Philosphy Day for the first time. The second aim - enhanced Staff assistance was also a highlight in 2019, the numbers growing from 12 in 2018 to 30 this year. Warmest thanks to everyone involved - names are listed at the end of this chronicle, but I would specially like to mention here Principal Mr Rob Henderson, Vice Principal Mrs Kath Negus, and Deputy Principal Mrs Jess Bouwman for their great support for the Magis program, Ms Alison O'Connor for again assisting at the Magis Camp, Ms Lisa Martella for her assistance with publicity, Mr Sam Tout for his excellent work creating the Magis videos, and 2019 Coach of the Year Ms Kirralee Dawon for her superb coaching of debating and World Scholar's Cup teams, as well as as assisting on both the Sydney and Yale tours.

The third area of focus was student leadership opportunities. In addition to the great work of Magis Captain Rory Hewson and his committee, developments included involvement of talented students particularly by their giving keynote addresses at Magis Academic Breakfasts, coaching and mentoring student teams in areas like debating and World Scholar's Cup, chairing and judging John XXIII College competitions including Public Speaking and Creative Writing, and presenting talks at the Magis Camp - see details in the relevant sections of the book.

Outstanding team performances this year have included a year 7 debating team winning the Christchurch division of WA Debating League undefeated, Year 7, 8 and 10 teams qualifying for the Tournament of Champions in Yale, splendid wins by year 9 and 11 teams in sections of DaVinci Decathlon, the Year 7 Optiminds team made the WA State fFnal, and consistently strong performances in all other interschool competitions. Excellent performances by individuals are highlighted in reports on each event.

Congratulations and thanks to everyone involved in Magis this year. We look forward to a great year in 2020 with several significant innovations to the program.





Most teams were very competitive, with the outstanding result coming from the Year 7 team of Meg Derbyshire, Wesl;ey Soares, Maya Mintz and Hannah Johnson which won their division undefeated before losing in the WA finals. Several teams narrowly missed winning their division, whilst in somer cases a mixture of forfeits and byes deprived teams of opportunities. The outstandin year 12 team only actually had two debates because of this. WADL is revising their organisation next year adding an extra round of competition and altering times so that novice debates begin earlier.

It was wonderful this year to have great support from teachers who came along to act as managers or coaches for the 11 teams. 






















Jesuit Debating Championship

WORLD SCHOLAR'S CUP GLOBAL ROUND

John XXIII College sent three teams to the WSC Global Round in Sydney this year, and all three performed very well, each qualifying for the Tournament of Champions at Yale University in November. Yvie Rigg, the Junior team captain was the highest scorer overall for our junior team, whilst Bella Pether who captained the seniors was their top performer.

More than 2100 students competed from 28 different countries at the magnificent Sydney International Conference Centre (ICC),

John XXIII won 63 medals - 36 gold and 20 silver. The Year 8 team producing the top performance overall with 23 medals (16 gold, 7 silver), whilst the Year 7's won 13 gold and 4 silver, the senior team winning 7 gold and 9 silver.

Standout performances were **Yvie Rigg** with 7 gold and 2 silver medals, and 10th place over in debating against over 1200 students, and the superb effort by the **Year 7's** in finishing 7th out of 400+ junior teams in the Team Writing Challenge.







John XXII College performed very creditably at the World Scholar's Cup Tournament of Champions at Yale University and returned with all five team members receiving medals, a total of 7 gold medals and 9 silver competing against over 1000 of the best students around the world, representing 60 different countries. Congratulations to the Junior team of Yvette Rigg, Ann Cullity and Spencer Burchett, and the seniors Bella Pether and Eve Cullity, on representing the college so well. Yvie Rigg was the outstanding individual performer with 7 medals including four gold, and had the distinction of winning a major trophy for third place overall in the debating, an excellent achievement against scholars from all over the world. 
