Multicultural Group

Refugee Week

5.33% of our student population are refugee status. We celebrated by hosting a student led activity for our communitylearning to speak S'Gaw and Po Karen, Karenni, Burmese and Thai. Some teachers learnt how to play the traditional Karen harp (see Mr Thomas learning from Pawter) and we had lovely lvy and Sophia do some karaoke at break time with Felix dancing. KOORI YARNING

The school sits on Bunurong Land and recently partnered with Werribee Secondary College to host the Department of Education Wyndham Network Yarning Circle. Over 100 students from the network participated in the session, starting with a Welcome to Country by Bunurong traditional owner Mark in the schools newly developed outdoor Gathering Circle. The space was created in partnership with Rotary Club and built by the Project Based Learning team, led by teacher Chris Palatsides and 10 students.

Students participated in workshops by Aboriginal Wellness Foundation, Kirrip Aboriginal Cooperation and Koling wada-ngal Aboriginal Corporation, allowing an environment in which every Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander student had the opportunity to achieve their potential and feel strong and connected in their cultural identity.
