Looking at the Readings

The change of seasons is always an opportune time to marvel at the magnificence of the natural world of which we are a part. Its colours, its textures, its smells all reflect the limitless imagination of the creator. Perhaps the most marvellous feature of the world is the interconnectedness of all the elements of which it consists. Somehow the spirit of the creator is manifested through each and every aspect of this universe. And we are part of it all. The universe may be as a grain in the balance or a drop of morning dew, but each grain and each drop contains within it the possibilities of the future.

Offering hospitality is a profound social act. When we offer hospitality, we invite another into our world, into our lives. We shift our attention from our own cares and concerns to the needs and comfort of the other. By the act of hospitality we transform strangers into friends and intimates, just as Jesus did with Zacchaeus. The hospitality that Jesus offers dissolves all constraints. Relationships disregard the biased measures of propriety, forging bonds of reconciliation and issuing everyone an invitation to intimacy. The hospitality that Jesus offers recreates the world from one of insider versus outsider to one of universal inclusivity. Sinners become friends, the lost are found, and all are restored to the rightful place as children not merely of Abraham but of God. Liturgical JottingsContemplative Prayer

Liturgical prayer and solitary or private are distinctive, but necess-arily connected and complement-ary where one form enriches the other. Solitary prayer may included formal texts eg Hail Mary, Our Father etc but tends to be informal, subjective, intimate, specific, free-flowing, flexible and spontaneous.

Contemplative prayer has become a specific form of personal prayer. The New Testament, Western and Eastern writers and throughout Christian history provide a wealth of insights into contemplative prayer that cannot be covered here. Contemplative prayer brings the person to an awareness of the presence of God and unites God and the contemplative in a sense of finding ones' true self in relation to God. Contemplation may also bring sense of unity with creation and human activity.

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REFLECTION FROM FR PETER

Jesus moves through Jericho and into Zacchaeus' life plucking him from his hiding place 'up a tree'. Literally its Zacchaeus who is ripe for his own discipleship. Noticing Zacchaeus with the urgency of his call adds to the vitality of the encounter. Despite the goings on with the crowd, Jesus is able to see Zacchaeus and calling him by his name.

Against Zacchaeus' troubled past and reputation Jesus is able to see through this and suggests he receives hospitality from Zacchaeus as a way of moving Zacchaeus beyond his situation. On his way home he publicly professes his financial dealings in front of the crowd, speaking in a present tense, suggesting his determination in giving to the poor and making his restitution to anyone he has defrauded, was not going to be a one off personal enthusiasm, rather an ongoing view over and above the law. This could well fit into a category of many today with financial dealings often exploiting the vulnerable.

The story of Zacchaeus does bring a challenge to our personal belonging through Parish and community, maybe it has something to do with my dealings with others, my personal identity as to my view on wealth? Or is it a me against another?

The other part of this story, is to a personal transformation. It could be to the 'personal tree' I wish to climb in my conscience perhaps? A basic understanding to Zacchaeus is his vulnerability. He brings a degree of reconciliation by recognizing his short comings to his people.

Ours is a time of seeing where humanity can rise up and above its own self worth, and where human justice is the ingredient we seek in a church and commercial world for doing out transactions with God's unconditional mercy in our minds.



READINGS FOR NEXT SUNDAY NOVEMBER 6th 2022

First Reading

A reading from the second book of Maccabees

The king of the world will receive us into life eternal at the resurrection.

There were seven brothers who were arrested with their mother. The king tried to force them to taste pig's flesh, which the Law forbids, by torturing them with whips and scourges. One of them, acting as spokesman for the others, said, 'What are you trying to find out from us? We are prepared to die rather than break the Law of our ancestors.'

With his last breath the second brother exclaimed, 'Inhuman fiend, you may discharge us from this present life, but the King of the world will raise us up, since it is for his laws that we die, to live again for ever.'

After him, they amused themselves with the third, who on being asked for his tongue promptly thrust it out and held out his hands, with these honourable words, 'It was heaven that gave me these limbs; for the sake of his laws I disdain them; from him I hope to receive them again.' The king and his attendants were astounded at the young man's courage and his utter indifference to suffering.

When this one was dead they subjected the fourth to the same savage torture. When he neared his end he cried, 'Ours is the better choice, to meet death at men's hands, yet relying on God's promise that we shall be raised up by him; whereas for you there can be no resurrection, no new life.'

A reading from the second letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians

May the Lord strengthen you in everything good that you do or say.

May our Lord Jesus Christ himself, and God our Father who has given us his love and, through his grace, such inexhaustible comfort and such sure hope, comfort you and strengthen you in everything good that you do or say. Finally, brothers, pray for us; pray that the Lord's message may spread quickly, and be received with honour as it was among you; and pray that we may be preserved from the interference of bigoted and evil people, for faith is not given to everyone. But the Lord is faithful, and he will give you strength and guard you from the evil one, and we, in the Lord, have every confidence that you are doing and will go on doing all that we tell you. May the Lord turn your hearts towards the love of God and the fortitude of Christ.

Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

He is not a God of the dead but of the living.

Some Sadducees – those who say that there is no resurrection – approached Jesus and they put this question to him, 'Master, we have it from Moses in writing, that if a man's married brother dies childless, the man must marry the widow to raise up children for his brother. Well, then, there were seven brothers. The first, having married a wife, died childless. The second and then the third married the widow. And the same with all seven, they died leaving no children. Finally the woman herself died. Now, at the resurrection, to which of them will she be wife since she had been married to all seven?'

Jesus replied, 'The children of this world take wives and husbands, but those who are judged worthy of a place in the other world and in the resurrection from the dead do not marry because they can no longer die, for they are the same as the angels, and being children of the resurrection they are sons of God. And Moses himself implies that the dead rise again, in the passage about the bush where he calls the Lord the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob. Now he is God, not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all men are in fact alive.'
