INTERACTION WITH WORLD

PERCEIVERS prefer to keep their options open, like to be able to act spontaneously, and like to be flexible plans made.






What careers utilise these skills?

An important step towards VCE and VCAL preparation is knowing which subject or VET courses to select. Chance are, you have faced that "What do you want to do with your career? question from family and friends. The answer may be something that you are still figuring out.

That's okay but be mindful that soon you will need to select which subjects you would like to study next year. It is likely these subjects will influence what you choose to do beyond Kilbreda.

Before making your subject choices, take the time to consider a few factors that could make the task easier.



Courses and Pathways

When planning your senior years of school study, it is important to choose courses that interest you and motivate you to work hard as well as meeting any course prerequisites you might want to undertake in tertiary studies. When making your course choices, it is also really important to remember that you don't have to have a particular career in mind at this stage – but it is good to have a general idea of your future direction so that you can make choices that will compliment your interests and give you a good background for further studies and/or employment. The more you investigate possible future options now the more satisfying your future pathways are likely to be.

VTAC – The Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre http://www.vtac.edu.au is a wonderful resource to assist you with future planning.

To enter into a university course you must complete the prerequisite subjects and achieve the required scores. The standard VCE score requirement is a 25 raw study score. Even with an ATAR of 99.95, you will not be able to study a course if you have not completed the prerequisite subjects or achieved the required scores. Every course will require the completion of VCE ³/₄ English (this can include English, Literature or English Language).

In Victoria, University of Melbourne and Monash University have the strictest entry requirements. As a general guide, if you satisfy the prerequisite subjects for these universities, you will satisfy the requirements for other universities in the state.

MY FUTURE CAREER

You can check the entry requirements for all Victorian courses using the **VTAC Course Search.** The VTAC Course Search is an online tool for researching tertiary study options. From late July 2021, it will list all the VTAC courses that commence in 2022. Most of these courses will be available in 2023 and 2024 too – but some might close, and new ones will become available. Course Search allows you to search by your interests to find related courses. Each course entry provides an overview of the course content and information about eligibility and application requirements.


