Round 1 SPX Black (105) defeated by Forest White (7/106)

Captain Max Lynn won the toss and decided to have a bat. With a competitive total of 105 on the board when the last wicket fell, we knew we had to bowl very well.

Some very tight bowling was backed up by smart fielding, leaving Forest at 0-25 after 10 overs, but we needed wickets. Lachlan Richmond (3-21) struck with his very first ball. More wickets to Connor Jory and Lachlan Mitchell but the Forest team were looking solid at 5-92. Having opened the bowling, Riley Meares (2-7) struck in the 26th over with a sharp catch to Max at point before cartwheeling the middle stump of the new batsmen, 7-93 after 26 overs. The Forest boys clawed their way back into it and with the scores all tied, traffic on Warringah Rd had stopped as people tried to watch the last few balls. A massive appeal for LBW was turned down before the batsmen scampered through for the winning run with an over to spare!

Round 2 SPX Black (4/136) defeated Peninsula Kingfishers (5/134)
