What are the pathways?

You usually have to study health promotion or public health at university. Prerequisite subjects, or assumed knowledge may include English, mathematics, biology, chemistry and/or physics.


Every year, ANU offers 25 talented schoolleavers the opportunity to fulfil their potential by actively participating in the very best that ANU has to offer.


If you're in Year 12 and want to apply to the the courses at the universities on this list, you must sit the UCAT this year.

What is the UCAT?

The University Clinical Aptitude Test (UCAT ANZ) is a computer-based test used by the UCAT ANZ some Australian and NZ universities for admission into their medical, dental and clinical science degree programmes. IT is used in alongside other admissions processes such as interviews and academic qualifications.

The test helps universities to select applicants with the most appropriate abilities and professional behaviours required for new doctors and dentists to be successful. It is

It is also an opportunity to stand out from other applicants and demonstrate your aptitude for a demanding programme of study.

2025 Changes

The UCAT ANZ test is changing in 2025. The Abstract Reasoning subtest will be withdrawn from the test. The new test format will comprise 3 cognitive subtests (Verbal Reasoning, Decision Making and Quantitative Reasoning), and the Situational Judgement Test.

How should I prepare?

- Preparation materials for will be available in early March 2025.
- The Preparation Plan will be available in early March to create a personalised study plan.
- Familiarise yourself with test functionality by looking at the <u>Tour</u> <u>Tutorial</u>.
- The <u>Question Tutorials</u> are really useful before you move onto the <u>Question</u> <u>Banks</u>, and finally progress to the timed Practice Tests (available in March).
- Practise using the <u>onscreen calculator</u> and get used to the <u>timings of each</u> section.
- Find out how <u>UCAT ANZ is scored</u>.

- the technologies used.


