### **Scholarship Value**

The International College of Hotel Management is pleased to offer 4 major Australian Scholarships, for 2019 entry into the Bachelor of Business (Hospitality Management).

The value of each scholarship is A\$22,500 to be paid in the following manner:-

Year 1 A\$7,500 Year 2 A\$7,500 Year 3 A\$7,500

As well as the major scholarships, over the last 20 years ICHM has also awarded additional bursaries to deserving applicants.

### **Eligibility Requirements**

- Citizens of Australia, both resident and non-resident. International students attending schools in Australia who complete a minimum of the last two years of their high school studies in Australia. Students attending Australian International Schools in Hong Kong, Singapore, Vietnam, Manila and Malaysia are also eligible to apply.
- Will complete in 2018 or have recently completed Year 12 or equivalent international schooling.
- Maximum age 22 at time of application.
- Open only to new students seeking entry into Year 1.
- For students whose mother tongue is other than English, refer to the ICHM website for IELTS or TOEFL requirements.

### Step 1: How to apply

Your completed application must contain:

Scholarship application form.

This form is in two parts.

- Cover page found here, please provide your personal contact details.
- Your response to the 4 short answer questions. Note that there are no right or wrong answers. We simply want to find out more about you and your career aspirations.
- Brief Resume (not more than two pages in length).
- A Reference Letter (from either a school teacher, career/university counsellor or employer).
- Copies of your school reports for Year 11 and 12 (to date).
- ICHM application form (unless an application to attend ICHM has already been forwarded).

The Application form can be found in the ICHM Prospectus, or on the ICHM website. Make sure you make copies of your school reports and Reference Letter for both the ICHM Application Form, and also for Scholarship Application.

Note: Do not staple or bind applications. Do not send original transcripts as they will not be returned.

Applications received after the closing date will not be considered for these scholarships.

### **Step 3: Selection Process**

Ten (10) Australian finalists will be invited to an interview in Adelaide, and an economy airfare will be provided to a maximum cost of A\$500 per applicant. Balance to be paid by applicant, or applicants can choose to be interviewed by video conference link.

### **Assessment Criteria**

### For short listing of applicants

School Report 25% CV and references 25% Short Answer Questions 50%

### For finalists

Panel Interview 70% Short listing criteria 30%

Finalists for interviews will be advised by early in November 2018. Where possible, interviews will be conducted during late November/early December 2018 and winners advised immediately thereafter.

Winners will be selected by a panel considering the assessment criteria above and the "person/s most likely to excel at Hotel Management".

### **Conditions of Entry**

These scholarships or bursaries can be applied to the ICHM tuition fees, uniforms or, on-campus accommodation fees (subject to availability).

Students who meet the scholarship eligibility criteria and ICHM entry requirements can apply for a scholarship. Students who have already applied and been accepted by ICHM for these intakes may also apply by completing the Scholarship Application form.

ICHM has two intakes in 2019. ICHM reserves the right to request winners to commence in the second 2019 intake, unless the applicant has been accepted into the first 2019 intake by scholarship closing date.

It is a condition of these scholarships that recipients commence in either the first or second intakes of 2019. Should a recipient wish to defer to a later entry than 2019, they will forfeit the scholarship or bursary amount.

Once a scholarship recipient has commenced their studies at ICHM, unless they have applied to ICHM in writing and been granted a scholarship deferment, any deferral or withdrawal will result in a forfeiture of the remaining scholarship or bursary amount. Even if they return to ICHM at a later date, they have forfeited their scholarship.

ICHM reserves the right to reduce the value of scholarships if there are less than ten applicants in Australia.

ICHM has been approved by the Australian Government as a FEE-HELP provider. This allows students to borrow money from the Government to fund their studies at ICHM; it is only available to Australian citizens. For more information please follow the links on the ICHM website.

The Selection Panel may decide to increase the number of scholarship winners by reducing the scholarship amount.

Payment of the scholarship amount on behalf of the student for Years 2 and 3 of the course will be dependent upon satisfactory academic results and industry placement performance as determined by the ICHM Academic Board.

The awarding of the Scholarship payment each year depends on the student paying the balance of the fees as outlined in the prospectus and by the due date in their invoice. Students failing to pay the balance of fees by the invoice due date will forfeit their right to their scholarship or bursary amount.

The Scholarships are open to new Year 1 students only. Students currently studying at ICHM are ineligible.

Scholarship students failing to comply with the ICHM rules and regulations in relation to personal and ethical behaviour will forfeit their entitlement to the scholarship.

Electromagnetic Exposure Awareness To provide the participant with the knowledge to identify Asbestos types, health hazards, legal requirements and applications.

The purpose of this training is to provide participants with the general knowledge and skills to be able to identify and have an awareness of asbestos within the workplace.

To provide participants with the skills and knowledge to undertake activities related to Elevated Work Platforms under 11 metres. PEER deliver this training in association with the Elevating Work Platform Association of Australia Inc.

To provide the participant with the skills and knowledge to work safely in high temperature zones.

To provide the participant with the knowledge and skills to employ safe procedures for personal working in the electrical/electronic environment. This is a requirement under the Electricity (general) Regulations 1997 whereby "persons required to carry out or help in carrying out electrical work must be suitable trained in rescue and resuscitation in accordance with recognised practices in the electricity industry.

This course provides participants with the awareness of hazards associated with Electromagnetic Radiation Exposure (EMR) associated with radiation from antennas.

HLTAID001 - Provide
Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation

UETTDRRF06B - Perform Rescue from a Live LV Panel To provide 'A' Class licenced participants with the knowledge and skills to upgrade testing procedures for new electrical installations on civil, commercial, industrial, retail and domestic projects in accordance with legislative requirements AS3000: 2007 and OHS Regulations.

This course provides participants with the skills and knowledge in the performance of rescue procedures from live low voltage (LV) apparatus, not including overhead lines and underground cables in the work place. It specifies the mandatory requirements of rescue from a live LV panel and how they apply in the context of transmission, distribution or rail work functions.

This course provides an opportunity for Electrical Workers to gain skills in low voltage electrical rescue and resuscitation. It meets the requirement of Regulation 68 of the Electricity (General) Regulations 2012 which requires that "persons who carry out, or help in carrying out electrical work, to be suitably trained in rescue and resuscitation in accordance with the requirements of the Technical Regulator". To ensure that high standards of response are maintained in the event of an electrical incident, the Technical Regulator require electrical workers to be assessed every 12 months.

This course also meets the requirement of the Work Health and Safety Regulations 2012, which require an electrical safety observer to have current (within 12 months) skills in rescue and resuscitation.

### REFRIGERATION

UEE20111 - Certificate
II in Split Air-conditioning
and Heat Pump Systems \*\*

This qualification is designed for experienced/qualified electricians wishing to install split system Air Conditioners/ Heat Pump systems or split system hot water systems. It covers the installation, commissioning and de-commissioning of single head, split air conditioning and heat pump systems where the maximum plant capacity for each system does not exceed 18 kw cooling capacity.

It does not cover the maintenance, repair, service including diagnostic/fault finding and electrical work or installation of heat pump plant and equipment or commercial refrigeration and air conditioning.

This qualification is offered as a skills 'top up' course, therefore specific prerequisites must be met prior to commencing.





# FOUND YOUR COURSE? HERE'S WHAT'S NEXT

Found your perfect course in here? Now it's time to find it online in the Courses section of the TAFE SA website. Click the green Apply Now button and your application will progress via the South Australian Tertiary Admissions Centre (SATAC). Applying is free so if more than one course has caught your eye, apply for those as well. You'll receive confirmation from SATAC and can then arrange your selected courses in order of preference via the SATAC website.

Information on intake, entry requirements, costs and assistance options is available online for each course, but here's a brief intro.

### **INTAKES**

Courses can either have two intakes a year – Semester 1 for a February start and Semester 2 for a July start – or continuous intakes where offers are made throughout the year allowing you to start any term.

### **ENTRY REQUIREMENTS**

You may need to meet certain selection criteria or Course Admission Requirements (CARs) to be accepted into Certificate IV, Diploma, Advanced Diploma and Degree courses. Check each course online for the most up-to-date info. There are no entry requirements for most Certificate I, II and III courses.

For some courses you may need to submit a portfolio or written assessment, or attend an audition as part of the selection process.

Where there are more applicants than places available, applications are ranked according to previous educational results. The number of places available varies across different TAFE SA campuses.

# RECOGNITION OF PRIOR LEARNING (RPL)

Your existing skills and previous learning can earn you credit. RPL means you won't have to re-learn the course units that cover skills you already have. We take into account life experiences, work, formal and informal training, and previous education. It means you may be able to graduate with a TAFE SA qualification sooner than you think.

# STUDY COSTS AND ASSISTANCE


The cost of a course depends on the number of hours of training, the type of study involved and specialist materials required.

VET Student Loans are available for selected qualifications, while WorkReady, a South Australian Government initiative, subsidises certain qualifications that can potentially meet the state's workforce needs. Both have eligibility requirements, including demonstration of satisfactory reading, writing and numeracy skills

FEE-HELP is a Government loan scheme that assists eligible higher education students enrolled in eligible higher education courses to pay their tuition fees. Eligible students can choose to use a FEE-HELP loan to cover all or part of their tuition fees. For more information visit:

Its importance is also most keenly felt in areas that have traditionally depended on manufacturing, like Detroit, Newcastle and Adelaide.

'Creative industries' is a phrase that has gained a lot of currency over the last few years without being well understood. At its heart, the creative industries refer to a broad range of creative and cultural enterprises including visual and performing arts, game design, digital, social and multimedia, journalism, robotics and automation, film and television, animation and VFX, web design, the humanities, and the GLAM sector (galleries, libraries, archives and museums).

Connecting all of these enterprises is their underlying recognition of creativity as an important cultural and economic resource; creativity in both expression and problem-solving that produces new solutions and new ways of thinking. UniSA is supporting creativity in all its forms with the formation of our new School of Creative Industries, offering degree programs in Media Arts (Film and Television, Visual Effects and Digital Content Creation), Communication and Media, Journalism and the Arts.

Career planning and career outcomes are a key focus of what we do. From day one, week one our students have access to the people and projects that will provide them with the very best outlet for their creativity — and the tools and opportunities to turn that creativity into a career.

South Australia has a long history of leading social justice and social change in this country, actively promoting ideas of social outreach and inclusiveness through creativity. and problems, placing them in industry or providing them with the resources to incubate their own start-ups.

We collaborate with companies operating in South Australia, but have a global reach, including visual effects powerhouse Rising Sun Pictures, advertising maestros Kojo, content creators Mighty Kingdom, dynamic production house Matchbox Pictures, Festivals Adelaide, and the South Australian Film Commission.

From digital animation to poetry, sociological approaches in automation to podcasting, pop music to linguistics, creativity comes in many forms. We are in an age of disruption and the opportunities in creative industries are endless.

When asked what advice she would give to students about finding their passion, Lisa said "Follow your heart and try a lot of things until something clicks."

# SLEEP TIGHT, DON'T LET THE DEVICES BITE

We all know that a good night's sleep is important for our general wellbeing. But the digital era is changing our sleeping habits and Australian children are among the most affected.

UniSA's new Behaviour Brain Body Research Centre (BBB) is investigating the sleeping patterns of young people, with a particular focus on the impact of digital disruption.

BBB is currently working with Resilient Youth Australia Limited (RYA) on ground-breaking research and training, which aims to promote better sleeping habits and driving resilience in young people.

So far, the research has captured a data set of more than 230,000 children

aged between 8-18 years from more than 800 schools across Australia.

It has revealed that 25% of Year 3 students text message at night during the hours of 10:00pm-6:00am, which increases to 83% by Year 12.

Smartphones in the bedroom reduce sleep time, disrupt the body's natural circadian rhythm and facilitate communication during the circadian low, drastically impairing the ability to communicate effectively. And, these factors can ultimately have a negative impact on mental health.

The RYA data also shows that night time texting frequency correlates directly with receiving hurtful texts, responding in anger, losing sleep over worry, and experiencing depressive symptoms.

Sleep loss has serious consequences

need more sleep (8-10 hours vs 7-8 for most adults) and also have a delayed sleep-wake pattern. So this, coupled with device obsession and FOMO (fear of missing out) creates the perfect storm.

Technology makes us more alert and the more alert we are, the more active we are - so surrendering to the circadian sleep cycle becomes problematic. We also know that a weekend of 'recovery sleep' is insufficient to restore optimal performance in teens.


However, the research does show that night time texting may foster social connection, which is critical for psychological resilience.

The negative and positive impacts of smartphones in the bedroom (SpiB) have not been studied together, and BBB is leading a new research project to examine this juxtaposition.

It is not enough to simply be sleep researchers – sleep is only one part of the puzzle. We need sleep and chronobiology, clinical psychology, education and physiology to come together in a multi-disciplinary approach to give us a better understanding of how to sleep smart.

- Reduce caffeine in the evening
- Keep bedroom temperature cool
- Install block out blinds in your bedroom
- Soundproof your bedroom
- Unwind without TV
- Take technology out of the bedroom
- Try to have a consistent sleep/wake schedule
- Avoid heavy meals late at night
- Avoid smoking and alcohol
- 10 Avoid clock-watching





### **NUTTY PROFESSORS?**

Nutrient-rich nuts such as almonds, cashews, pistachios and walnuts are already recognised for their health benefits, but there is mounting evidence that they can also help perception, thinking and learning according to UniSA researchers.



The University has previously completed studies that show tree nuts can improve vascular health and cognitive function in adults, but there is limited research looking at the health benefits in children.

So the question remains, "Can nuts improve a child's cognitive abilities?"

Lead researcher Associate Professor Alison Coates from UniSA's School of Health Sciences is looking to recruit healthy boys and girls aged 8–13 years who are not allergic to nuts and have no sleep or behavioural disorders.

The new study will be asking children to consume 30 grams of almonds five days a week for eight weeks — that's about 23 almonds a day.

The researchers will use brain game tests to compare the children's cognitive ability with a control group of other children on a nut-free diet for eight weeks.

"Less than 10% of Australian children consume nuts regularly", says Assoc Prof Coates, despite the proven health benefits. "Multiple US surveys involving 10,000 adults have already demonstrated a link between regular nut consumption and improved cognitive function, regardless of age, gender, race, education, BMI, smoking, alcohol consumption and physical activity.

"Other European studies looking at the benefits of a Mediterranean diet including mixed nuts — showed better cognitive ability and a lower risk of depression compared with participants on a low-fat diet", she says.

Nuts are a healthy plant food because they are high in essential nutrients, such as B group vitamins, zinc, iron, magnesium and calcium to name a few. And all of these essential nutrients are important for overall brain health. So the message is to enjoy a healthy handful every day!

The defence industry in Australia is big business. In a historic move, The Australian Government is investing \$200 billion to modernise the nation's defence capability.

Investing in a growing workforce is also a key focus, with Australian workers needed to design, install, build, integrate and maintain ships, submarines, aircraft and land vehicles.

Beyond the traditional roles, there is also a need to significantly enhance our capabilities in intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance, space, electronic warfare and cybersecurity, along with service areas such as health care, psychology, communications, logistics and project management.

Australia's shipbuilding enterprise will need a highly skilled workforce to support its operations. Naval shipbuilding programs secured for South Australia alone are expected to create around 5,200 jobs by the mid-to-late 2020s. This includes the Offshore Patrol Vessel, Future Frigate and Future Submarine Programs, and more.

UniSA mechanical engineering graduate, Bradley Toole, is one of the young professionals already tackling the growing need.

During his studies, Bradley completed an internship with Navantia Australia" - a Spanish owned company specialising in the design and construction of high-tech naval vessels with a footprint across the country.

He is now working as an Auxiliary and Propulsion Engineer for Navantia at Osborne in Adelaide's north. This has given him the opportunity to travel to Spain and work with international counterparts.

"It was interesting to work with such a diverse team to achieve the best engineering solutions and to learn from the expertise of a top European shipbuilder, with over 300 years of experience."

"My Spanish colleagues had such a wealth of knowledge, which was passed on to myself and others here in Australia so that we can develop our own capabilities", he says.

Bradley's biggest career highlight to date has been his involvement in the launch of the three highly capable HOBART Class Destroyers being designed by Navantia and built by the Air Warfare Destroyer Alliance. Stories like this are just the start for young people looking to enter the industry and become the new workforce of the 21st century.

UniSA is also growing its defence capability, through strategic undergraduate and postgraduate qualifications in areas such as military systems integration, engineering, industrial design, cybersecurity, artificial intelligence and complex project management; along with enhanced research capabilities and partnering with industry.

Most recently, the University received a \$450 million commercial grant from tech giants Siemens, to prepare students for what has been dubbed the 'fourth industrial revolution' or Industry 4.0 - the current trend of improved automation, machine-to-machine communication, artificial intelligence and continued digitisation of manufacturing. Through this partnership, UniSA students now have access to the latest software for space gear, supercars and warships.

The new Saab Australia-UniSA Defence Technologies Institute will also see defence professionals upskill and build on their existing knowledge at our Mawson Lakes Campus. The partnership will also provide opportunities for student placements, collaborative research projects and co-developed curriculum.

# A PASSPORT TO CAPITAL HILL

There was a time when a law degree was considered a passport to a career in that very arena – the law.

But with thousands of students graduating from Australia's 41 law schools every year, and technology bringing more efficiencies to the legal profession – such as online legal services – the traditional notion of what lawyers do is rapidly evolving.

We are also seeing positive figures around graduate employment. The Australian Government Department of Education and Training's 2017 Graduate Outcomes Survey shows that 74% of undergraduate and 87% of postgraduate law and paralegal students gained full-time employment within 12 months.

One of the reasons for the high employment rate is that a growing number of students are combining law with a range of other degrees, and applying those skills in a diverse range of careers.

UniSA graduate and ABC's Federal Political Reporter, Matthew Doran, studied a double degree in law and journalism.

Matthew provides news coverage across radio, television, online and social media. He works as part of the ABC's Parliament House Bureau team keeping the nation informed on everything happening on Capital Hill, with a special focus on legal and foreign affairs.

He is fascinated by how the law impacts almost every facet of public life, whether it's law and order, consumer rights and protections, business deals or the operation of government.

"I combined law with journalism because my real desire was always to become a journalist and I was just lucky that UniSA opened its Law School when I was in Year 12 offering the only opportunity in



Adelaide to study a double degree that combined both fields," Matthew says.

"Studying law gives you an analytical edge that I've found has helped me to quickly process large volumes of information and distil it into a package the general public can easily digest."

"In television news, it's rare to be given more than two minutes to explain what can be complex government policies. In radio news, there's even less time. And when it comes to an online audience, you still have to make an issue interesting to hold on to an audience. In the same way a journalist has to pick the strongest angle for their story, lawyers and barristers have to pick the strongest arguments for their client's case," he says.

Matthew's law degree has certainly helped him in covering one of the


biggest issues of this term of parliament – the dual citizenship saga, which has claimed the scalps of more than a dozen parliamentarians and has seen the High Court take an unprecedented role in deciding the makeup of the House of Representatives and Senate.

"I think there can be a blinkered view of where a law degree can take you — solicitor, barrister, judge's associate. A law degree opens up so many more avenues and puts you in a good position to perform well in an increasingly competitive job market," says Matthew.

UniSA offers a range of law double degree combinations and was recently ranked in the World's Top 100 for Law in the 2018 Times Higher Education World Subject Rankings.



### WHAT IS UNITEST?

uniTEST is an aptitude test that has been developed to assess the kinds of generic reasoning and thinking skills that underpin studies at higher education and that are needed for students to be successful at this level.

uniTEST is designed for school leavers and will complement our existing selection criteria such as your Year 12 studies.

Flinders University will select applicants based on both their Year 12 results (60% weighting toward the ATAR selection rank) and uniTEST performance (40%).

### WHY SHOULD I SIT THE TEST?

uniTEST will provide you with the opportunity to enhance your prospects of gaining a place in your preferred course at Flinders University.

### **DOES IT APPLY TO MY PREFERRED COURSE?**

uniTEST results can be utilised for entry into most courses offered at Flinders University, a full list of eligible courses can be found at flinders.edu.au/unitest

### IS THERE A COST TO SIT UNITEST?

There is no cost to sit uniTEST.

### WHAT IS COVERED IN THE TEST?

uniTEST is a 95 item, multiple-choice examination which has been designed to evaluate abilities and aptitude over the three core areas of Quantitative, Critical and Verbal/Plausible Reasoning. This reasoning is assessed across the broad domains of mathematics, science, humanities and social sciences.

### **HOW LONG IS THE TEST?**

The test itself will take a maximum of 2.5 hours, you may however need to allow up to 3.5 hours (total time including administration).

### **CAN I PREPARE FOR THE TEST?**

No specific preparation is required for uniTEST.

### **HOW DO I SIT THE TEST?**

uniTEST is undertaken online, under examination conditions.

### **CAN I SIT THE TEST AT MY SCHOOL?**

Many schools have been invited to participate in uniTEST and the majority of those have taken the opportunity to administer the online testing between June and November.

If you would like to sit the test at your school please speak to your Careers Counsellor or Year 12 Coordinator and ask them to contact us at unitest@flinders.edu.au for further information.

### **CAN I SIT THE TEST AT FLINDERS UNIVERSITY?**

It is preferred for uniTEST to be delivered at your school but we understand that this is not always possible. For this reason we may be holding some on campus testing (limited spaces) towards the end of the testing period.

### AM I ELIGIBLE TO SIT THE TEST?

uniTEST is open to any current Year 12 student who will complete an Australian Year 12 qualification this year (including international onshore Year 12 students).

### WHAT IF I DON'T MEET THE ABOVE ELIGIBILITY?

There are a variety of pathways to a Flinders University degree including using a TAFE/VET qualification, Year 12/SACE or interstate equivalent, International Baccalaureate, Principal's Recommendation Program, Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT), Tertiary Studies or our Foundation Studies Program.





### WHAT DO I NEED ON THE DAY OF THE TEST?

You are only permitted to take the following items into the exam room:

- · a bilingual dictionary (for ESL candidates)
- · a pencil
- · water in a clear bottle with the label removed
- Bags are permitted but should be left to the side of the venue, away from your desk.

Items not permitted under any circumstances are:

- · calculators
- food
- mobile phones, mp3 players, laptops, PDAs
- · pencil cases
- packets of tissues
- books

### WHAT HAPPENS AFTER I'VE COMPLETED THE TEST?

Once you've completed the test your answers will be submitted to the Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER) who will carry out the marking process on behalf of Flinders University.

### WHEN WILL I BE ADVISED OF MY RESULTS?

You will receive an email from ACER advising that your results are available, once all tests have been marked. This usually happens in early to mid-December; around the same time as your Year 12 results being released.

### **HOW ARE UNITEST RESULTS REPORTED?**

You will receive a scale score out of 100 for each of the 3 sections in the test, along with a total scale score.

### WHY ARE MY SCORES SCALED?

Scores are scaled to take into consideration year-to-year differences in test difficulty.

### WHAT DOES THE PERCENTILE RANK MEAN?

A percentile rank indicates how you performed in relation to all other candidates who sat uniTEST in the same year, regardless of the course applied for. A percentile rank is given to enable

you to gauge your performance relative to all others who took the test in the same year. A higher percentile figure indicates higher performance and vice versa.

### WHAT HAPPENS IF I PERFORM POORLY IN THE TEST?

It will be of little consequence if you perform poorly in uniTEST as Flinders University will only consider your highest selection rank when offering you a place. If your ATAR selection rank (inclusive of any adjustment factors) is higher than the combined uniTEST/ATAR selection rank, this will be considered as priority in the first instance.

You cannot be disadvantaged by participating in uniTEST.

### WHEN WILL I BE ADVISED IF I HAVE AN OFFER?

The South Australian Tertiary Admissions Centre (SATAC) will, on behalf of Flinders, make you an offer. If you are successful you will be offered a place in the January offer rounds. You will be able to check it online at SATAC as well as receiving an email notifying you of your offer.

### IF I GET AN OFFER CAN I DEFER?

If you do decide to defer, commencing domestic students can defer most Flinders courses until the following year. For further information see www.flinders.edu.au/defer

# IF I DEFER AND DECIDE TO CHANGE MY PREFERENCE CAN I RE-SIT UNITEST?

You are only allowed to sit uniTEST once and cannot re-sit in subsequent years. Your result however will be valid for your change of preference providing the course is on the list of eligible courses.

### **HOW LONG WILL MY RESULT BE VALID FOR?**

uniTEST results remain valid for a period of 2 years. If you decide to change course mid-year; your uniTEST result may be considered in determining a place in your newly preferred course.

### WHAT YOU WILL STUDY

You will learn from academic staff and current industry professionals in an intense learning environment. This gives you the opportunity to develop skills in a range of areas suitable to your interests and skills, such as 2D and 3D animation, game art, and entertainment design with CDW Studios. You will complete a range of other electives, including opportunities to work with a number of our partners in game art, animation and visual effects while working in a collaborative environment. Based on industry practices, this environment enables you to put your skills and creative intelligence into practice in real-life 'pipelines'.

At the completion of the degree, you will have a collection of your creative achievements (e.g. short films, animations, graphic novels and games) for a professional portfolio. You will have the opportunity to learn from and work with industry leaders, which will help you to gain employment in the arts, entertainment and communication industries. Graduates may also pursue entrepreneurial ventures in the media industry.

As a student in the honours stream, you will devise, develop and deliver a major project in digital media in your fourth year.

### ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS Bachelor of Creative Arts (Visual Effects and Entertainment Design) (Honours):

Direct-entry applicants (SATAC code: 224131/224171) are required to submit a written statement, CV and a portfolio.

Bachelor of Creative Arts (Visual Effects and Entertainment Design) (VET pathway) (SATAC code: 224161): Only open for students transitioning with a VET qualification such as the Advanced Diploma of Screen and Media, including Specialising in Game Art or CGI and Visual Effects; Diploma of Screen and Media; or the Diploma of Digital and Interactive Games. No written statement, CV or portfolio is required.

### ADMISSION PATHWAYS

Students who have not been successful in gaining entry to this degree can study appropriate topics in the first year of the Bachelor of Media Arts (SATAC code: 224731) and apply for transfer at the end of their first year of study.
