








Uncle Archie Roach



A STATEMENT BY AMOS AND EBAN ROACH ON BEHALF OF THE ROACH FAMILY

We are heartbroken to announce the passing of Gunditjmara (Kirrae Whurrong/Djab Wurrung), Bundjalung Senior Elder, songman and storyteller Archie Roach.

Archie passed on Saturday 30th July, surrounded by his family and loved ones, at Warrnambool Base Hospital after a long illness. We thank all the staff who have cared for Archie over the past month.

Archie wanted all of his many fans to know how much he loves you for supporting him along the way.

We are so proud of everything our dad achieved in his remarkable life. He was a healer and unifying force. His music brought people together.

A private ceremony will follow.

We ask that the media please respect the family's privacy.

Archie's sons, Amos and Eban Roach, have given permission for Archie's name, image and music to be used, so that his legacy will continue to inspire.



Community Understanding and Safety Training (CUST)

The Community Understanding and Safety Training is a key commitment in the Marrung Aboriginal Education Plan, Victoria's ten-year plan to support improved outcomes for Koorie learners across early childhood, schools, skills and training and high education.

The purpose of the training is to increase understanding of Koorie culture, history, and experience to ensure a strong foundation for culturally inclusive practices. Training also aligns with the Framework for Improving Student Outcomes, including the state-wide priority 'a positive climate for learning'.

Our Koorie Education Workforce have been working very hard to deliver this training both onsite in-person and online for schools. The training has led to a greater awareness of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives which assist school staff to consult with parents/carers of Aboriginal students, the Local Aboriginal Educational Consultative Groups (LAECGs) and other members of the Koorie community in developing the curriculum (i.e. Traditional Owners, Elders).

A big thank you to all members of the KEW team for their continued commitment to supporting our families and schools through the delivery of the CUST training.
