> Pathway to Engineering

The Monash Bachelor of Science can be used as a pathway into graduate Engineering at Monash. If you love science and also have an interest in engineering, keep your options open and be on track to earn both a Bachelor of Science and a Master of Professional Engineering.

Students keen on studying science but also hoping to keep engineering as a possible career option, can choose up to **four** Engineering Foundation units to study as electives in the second and third year of their science degree. Students can choose from one of the <u>five engineering masters</u> <u>specialisations</u> select the Engineering Foundation units that relate to the discipline/s they are interested in, and that will enable them to fast track their Masters.

In the final year of their science degree, provided the entry requirements are met, students can apply for graduate entry into the Master of Professional Engineering. The successfully completed Engineering Foundation units can be credited to the Master of Professional Engineering and students can commence their Masters in either the start or midyear intake and be on track to complete their engineering masters in 2.5 years instead of 3 years.

Westpac Young Technologists Scholarships

Psychology Degrees in Victoria in 2023

Psychology is a popular field of study in Australia and is taught at universities in every state and territory. With diverse workplace settings and areas of expertise, psychology can be a highly rewarding and satisfying career choice. Psychologists who complete postgraduate studies in specific areas of psychology may be eligible to receive area of practice endorsement from the Psychology Board of Australia. **Find out more at Australian Psychological Society (APS) - Careers in Psychology**

<u>Students are reminded that, for the most part, the only VCE prerequisite subject for</u> <u>university entry is an English</u>. Students should verify this at <u>VTAC</u>. *Please note that after completion of an APAC accredited undergraduate degree, a further minimum of three years education and training in psychology is required to register as a psychologist in Australia.*

Bachelor of Physiotherapy through the ACU Guarantee

ACU has just recently announced that the <u>Bachelor of Physiotherapy</u> at its Ballarat Campus will now be taking applications through the <u>ACU Guarantee</u>.

Offers will be made during the second round on Friday 22 September 2023.

The ATAR for Physiotherapy is 86.90 for Ballarat – if students apply for this course through ACU Guarantee and are successful, the ATAR requirement is removed completely, along with the English prerequisite.

> Bachelor of Educational Studies

The **Bachelor of Educational Studies** has been designed for domestic <u>and</u> international students who are passionate about becoming teachers, but do not achieve the entry requirements to go directly into their desired pre-service teaching degree.

Although the 3-year **Bachelor of Educational Studies** allows students to gain a qualification to work in education-related fields other than teaching, it is also designed as a pathway for students who wish to consider future study in teaching in Early Childhood and Primary Education. Eligible students who successfully complete their first year of study (subject to meeting certain progression and nonacademic requirements) may apply for transfer into the <u>second year</u> of the Bachelor of Education suite. Students who complete the three years of study may be eligible to progress to a postgraduate Initial Teacher Education qualification.

Difference between an Apprenticeship and Traineeship

What's the Difference between an Apprenticeship and Traineeship? Which one should a student apply for? Both apprenticeships and traineeships offer a structured pathway into a career of choice. However, there are <u>three key differences</u> – range of occupations, completion time and legal requirements.

The Three Key Differences

As indicated above, there are three key differences between apprenticeships and traineeships. Each of these should be carefully considered when deciding which is the right option.

Range of Occupations

While traineeships are available on a broad range of occupations, apprenticeships are offered on skilled trades only. For example, you can complete a traineeship in a diverse set of fields including:

- Business (e.g., business administration, marketing, accounting)
- Technology (e.g., information technology, telecommunications, digital media)
- Trades (e.g., plant operator, warehouse operation, hairdressing).

Apprenticeships are also offered across a broad range of industries, including:

- Building and construction (e.g., carpentry, bricklaying)
- Electrical (e.g., electrician, electrical fitter)
- Engineering fabrication (i.e., boiler maker/ welder)
- Engineering manufacturing (i.e., fitter and turner)
- Horticulture (e.g., parks and gardens)
- Plumbing (e.g., plumbing and gas fitting or drainage).

Completion Time

Apprenticeships are a full-time commitment and are awarded after a <u>fixed period of time</u>. For example, an Electrical Apprenticeship will generally take four years, however this can be shortened by up to 6 months, depending on circumstances.

Traineeships can be <u>full-time or part-time</u>. Because traineeships are competency-based, completion is dependent on achieving and demonstrating a level of competency in all the required modules. In general, a traineeship is usually completed within one to two years, but it may take more or less time depending on the role, employee and number of hours worked. On the other hand, apprenticeships are awarded after a set timeframe, which for most trades, is four years.

Legal Requirements

When a student signs up for an apprenticeship, the level of commitment made by both them and their employer is different to a traineeship. As an apprentice, upon signing the contract, their employer is committing to employ the student for the full term of their apprenticeship – and if they sell the business while the apprentice is working towards completion, the new owner must continue with the training contract. After the probationary period is up (usually 90 days) the contract can be cancelled, but all parties (apprentice and employer) must agree.

As a trainee, the employer must keep the trainee on for the term of their traineeship, however, either party can cancel the contract before it's complete (mutual agreement is not needed). In addition, if the business is sold, the new owners are not obliged to continue your employment.

Both apprenticeships and traineeships provide a fantastic way to learn on the job – and as an added bonus, one gets paid for it too!
