Anointing of the Sick 5 The Rite of "Commendation of the Dying" consists of a short scriptural text that may be softly repeated two or three times. Example: "Who can separate us from the love of Christ?" or "To you Lord, I lift up my soul." Then the Word of God is proclaimed by one who is present or the priest. The Rite has 13 plus more in the appendix to choose. A long or short litany of the saints follows with the response: "pray for him/her". Then a Prayer of Commendation may be said if death is very near. Five choices are given or other prayers may be used or added. Finally there are prayers after death and prayers for the family and friends. "For the solace of those present the minister may conclude these prayers with a blessing or with a symbolic gesture, for example, signing the forehead with the sign of the cross and/ or sprinkling with holy water." p188 © Diocese of Sandhurst 2022

Looking at the Readings

In our struggles to be faithful disciples, we frequently must endure periods when we feel abandoned by God. When we have been intent on serving God with genuine devotion, such times are particularly trying, for one would expect that God would not withdraw consolations. When this happens, the broken heart and the strained spirit cry out to God in complaint: How long? Why? We have all been worn down by life, tempted to give up, too weary to go on.

Faith in God is a gift for which we pray. It enables us to accomplish marvellous feats; with it we can move mountains. As unprofitable servants, we do not earn it; we have no right to claim it as our own. We are the ones from whom faithful service will be expected. We will be sent to plough the fields and tend the sheep. We will be called to serve at table.

The faith that is ours has been mediated to us through the community. We have heard about God and about Jesus from others, from our parents and families, from our teachers and those who preach, from those with whom we work and play. Faith comes from God, but through the mediation of the community. Timothy received faith from his mother and grandmother. It was strengthened in him through the imposition of Paul's hands and through his preaching of the word of God. <u>REFLECTION FROM FR PETER</u>



The phrase 'from little things big things grow' has become familiar more so from the television program 'all creatures great and small'! The familiar story used by Jesus of the small seed producing into the large tree (mulberry tree) is one where an answer is given'increase our faith". In light of this parable, we could do well by asking ourselves'How is my faith increasing?' Being in a semi - rural environment as is ours, where we have seen fields produce, trees bring forth growth, so we can translate this into the field of God's Word and how we sow this into our motivation in faith.

A further impression from this Gospel story is an image Jesus uses of an up rooted mulberry tree. It is believed these trees grow up to seventy meters high with a root system which is invasive. For those who have coped with root damage to homes and plumbing systems would appreciate the first century Palestinian law prohibiting the planting of mulberry trees near cisterns and buildings. Coming back to the point of increasing faith is to be likened with the disciples as they and we build at times in our own labouring as followers of Christ.

This Sunday is the last in a Season of Creation. It's been a season quite unique and different to other seasons, given the intensity of rainfall. Water levels around the Goulburn Valley are at a high. There is suggestion here as to what increase water levels rise to? Increase in faith and increase in water raises a thought as to one's personal openness to the increase of life in our efforts of building the life of God's Kingdom.

This year's theme for the Season of Creation is around "listening to the voice of Creation". So as I bring this season to a close for this coming Tuesday, the feast of St Francis of Assisi, the patron of creation some of the following quotes and thoughts maybe helpful in you bringing this season to a close, by taking a few moments to read reflectively and with imagination

. What kind of world do you want to leave for the one's coming behind, to the children growing up?

. Everything is related, as human beings we are interconnected on a pilgrimage. What is your understanding in this?

. Let us keep on singing amidst our struggles, fears, joys and hopes. What is your place in this and for the ongoing presence of our earth our common home?

ECUMENISM Archbishop of Canterbury U.K Justin Welby, he was the one who preached the homily at Queen Elizabeth's funeral. He is soon to undertake a tour of Australia. Archbishop Welby is the 105th Archbishop of Canterbury, having held the position since 2013. He is the senior Bishop of the Anglican communion throughout the world.

PRAYER "Changing the world, one million Rosaries at a time". International Catholic pastoral charity and pontifical foundation, Aid to the Church in Need, is inviting parishes, schools and families to join in the annual prayer initiative. "A million children praying the rosary".
