Doxology

The concluding doxology is:
"Through him, and with him, and in him, O God, almighty Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honour is yours, for ever and ever. Amen."

by which the glorification of God is expressed and which is affirmed and concluded by the people's acclamation Amen. GIRM 79h.

The word "Doxology" is formed from two Greek words: DOXA which means opinion or glory and OLOGY which means word, discourse or study. As a liturgical word, Doxology has acquired the sense of a hymn of glory to God.

It is a brief prayer of praise which emphasises the Lord Jesus role as mediator in the context of the Trinity, thus turning the prayer into the praise and glory of God.

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Looking at the Readings

The first reading from Isaiah may be inaccurately reduced to subduing the power of rulers of nations. Likewise the Gospel reduced to the issue of paying/avoiding taxes. But taking a synoptic view of the Old Testament reading and the Gospel together it is more than power and taxes. Rather it prompts us to find the right relationships between earthly authority and God's authority and will. Firstly God has called his people by their name, He has established and maintained a relationship of protection, compassion and justice.

Having that right relationship with God we give to God what is God's: praise and thanksgiving, worship and love, peace and justice, service to others and finally true happiness. Jesus neither advocates compromise or a sort of dichotomy between state and church authorities. The separation of powers, whether imposed, negotiated or presumed cannot be autonomous or absolute, or simply public and private There is an interdependence. Each has responsibilities towards the good of the people and the care of creation.

Quote of the Day

"In the same way as Caesar looks for his image on a coin, God looks for his in your soul. "Give back to Caesar what is Caesar's," the Saviour says. What does Caesar demand of you? His image. But Caesar's image is on a coin, whereas God's image is in you. If the loss of a coin causes you to weep because you have lost Caesar's image, would not any damage brought in you to God's image be for you a cause for tears?" St. Augustine sermon 24.

REFLECTION FROM FR PETER

Jesus and the Pharisees... not an easy relationship let alone a mindset bringing understanding. Theirs was a discussion going nowhere! In fact, they were seeking an outcome on lines of a "Caesar Tax"! in reaching a common cause. Jesus is tackled by a tax issue. Heaven forbid in our day and time, the thought of taxes!!! When Jesus is questioned about this, he speaks out against it, he can be charged with sedition and arrested. If he supports the tax, he discredits himself as a prophet in the eyes of the oppressed. With all the two and froing happening in this dialogue, Jesus says... give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God.

STEWARDSHIP

Our third week in stewardship invites out thoughts to the word MISSION. My sense of this word is one taking us in our faith and thought to all we see outside of ourselves. Catholic Mission does this so well. October as a month is one where we are called into MISSION. What does Mission seek from us personally...???

For a beginning I suggest the word MISSION seeks from us an outside view!!! What desire do I seek God is asking of myself? The Second Vatican Council sought to bring me great images of God's presence. For a start the council related... "All the baptised in God's name are in fact on a mission". Envelopes (yellow) are available for you to write names of those you would like remembered during *NOVEMBER MASSES*.


Please place these in the collection plates, or return to the office through the slot next to the door.

The third decree of the Fifth Plenary Council is a challenging but joyful reminder to all Catholics of the mission that has been entrusted to them through their Baptism. As disciples of Christ, the baptised are called to give loving attention to our world – marked by both sin and grace – to prayerfully read the signs of the times in the light of the Gospel, to seek to grasp the meaning of human strivings and to discern God’s will under the guidance of the Holy Spirit (cf. *Gaudium et Spes* nn. 3-4, 11).

READINGS FOR NEXT SUNDAY OCTOBER 29th 2023

First Reading: A reading from the book of Exodus

If you are harsh with the widow or the orphan, my anger will rage against you.

The Lord said to Moses, 'Tell the sons of Israel this, "You must not molest the stranger or oppress him, for you lived as strangers in the land of Egypt. You must not be harsh with the widow, or with the orphan; if you are harsh with them, they will surely cry out to me, and be sure I shall hear their cry; my anger will flare and I shall kill you with the sword, your own wives will be widows, your own children orphans.

"If you lend money to any of my people, to any poor man among you, you must not play the usurer with him: you must not demand interest from him.

"If you take another's cloak as a pledge, you must give it back to him before sunset. It is all the covering he has; it is the cloak he wraps his body in; what else would he sleep in? If he cries to me, I will listen, for I am full of pity."

The Word of the Lord

Response: I love you, Lord, my strength.

Second Reading: A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians

You turned away from idols to serve God and await his Son.

You observed the sort of life we lived when we were with you, which was for your instruction, and you were led to become imitators of us, and of the Lord; and it was with the joy of the Holy Spirit that you took to the gospel, in spite of the great opposition all round you. This has made you the great example to all believers in Macedonia and Achaia since it was from you that the word of the Lord started to spread – and not only throughout Macedonia and Achaia, for the news of your faith in God has spread everywhere. We do not need to tell other people about it: other people tell us how we started the work among you, how you broke with idolatry when you were converted to God and became servants of the real, living God; and how you are now waiting for Jesus, his Son, whom he raised from the dead, to come from heaven to save us from the retribution which is coming.
