| | Vowel letters a, e, i, o, u, and sometimes y |

The 4 SMART Spelling Rules

1. In most words - just add the suffix

2. When a word ends in e drop the e and add the vowel suffix

3. When the second last letter makes the sound

"a" "e" "i" "o" "u"

double the last letter

and add the vowel suffix

4. When a word ends in the graph y change the y to i and add any suffix except /ing/

Plural Rules

Changing nouns to more than one

1. Usually just add s.

One chair — Five chairs

One dog - Three dogs

Words that end in sh, ch, tch, s, ss, x, z, $zz \rightarrow add$ es.

One dish – Many dishes One watch - Seven watches

Exception: quiz - quizzes

3. Words that end in f or fe → drop the f or fe and add ves.

One knife - Several knives One calf — Eight calves

Some exceptions: chiefs, reefs, roofs (American), chefs

4. Words ending in $o \rightarrow add$ es.

One potato - Lots of potatoes A hero - Many heroes

Some exceptions: pianos, solos, radios, kangaroos, memos, studios, photos, videos

5. Words ending in y

5a) If the y is a graph → drop the y and add ies.

One lolly - many lollies One family - Many families

5b) If y is the last letter of a digraph \rightarrow just add s.

One day - Many days One key - A bunch of keys

6. Use the same word.

One fish — Many fish One sheep — Lots of sheep

7. Use a different word.

One foot – Two feet One mouse - Many mice
