It was back to Nolan's Reserve for SPX Yellow for its round 3, under 15's match against its rivals St Augustine's College Brookvale.

With three teams in the under 15 MWJCA competition for St Augustine's, expectations were high for both clubs to finish somewhere near the top of the table.

With grey skies, light rain and thunder greeting the teams as they arrived, expectations of a full game were low and the possibility of a start at all was also a concern. Following a wait of some 45 minutes, match conditions were safe to start for a reduced 24 overs per team game. The toss was an important one to win for both sides as the pitch remained heavily waterlogged and bowling was only possible from one side. With a lucky call from St Augustine's, SPX Yellow were sent into bat in what was expected to be trying and difficult conditions.

With an unchanged line from last week, SPX opened with its reliable openers Lachlan Jurcevic and Flynn Pavely. Lachlan continued his stellar form from the first few games and both openers looked to steady

starts on a very slow and sticky pitch. The first wicket fell for 27 for SPX Yellow, with the teams other inform batter Victor Mosmann looking to also build another solid innings. Victor's innings was cut short this week by a stunning catch by St Augustine's to dismiss Victor for his first single digit score of the season. Unfortunately, this was the catalyst for an all too common middle order collapse, despite SPX going to the drinks break of the innings at the 12 over at 3-53. With a score of 120 firmly in their eyes, SPX Yellow struggled to form any good partnerships following the enforced retirement of Lachlan Jurcevic, however Declan Carroll did provide strong resistance at the end with a well compiled score.

The close of the innings at the 24th over saw SPX Yellow at 7-89, well short of its expected par score of 120 and keen to also try and make early inroads into the St Augustine's batting. Lachlan Jurcevic again led the batting with a 22 retired not out, followed by Eamon Boyle on 16 and Declan Carroll on 10 not out.

As luck would have it, the St Augustine's batting opened with sunlight peeking through the clouds and the pitch considerably drier than the early morning. SPX Yellow opened with its strike bowling pair of Darcy Keenlyside and Nikolai Dimantha, with Nikolai making the first breakthrough thanks to a wonderful catch at gully by Eamon Boyle from a ball smashed by the St Augustine's opener. With a sharp catch and bowled taken by Charlie Woolf, SPX Yellow had clearly taken the ascendency in the game by having the St Augustine's 2 for 33 at the drinks break at the 12th over.

With what was now looking like a close finish and nervous batting by St Augustine's, the match could have turned on the 16th over which saw Augustine's hit 15 from the over to take them back to a more comfortable run chase. However, this SPX team is made of sterner stuff, and with a good tactical bowling change from the 17th over, it was clear this game would go to the last over. With the second last over bowled by Flynn Pavely who took a wicket and assisted in a run out, the final over went to our clutch bowler Victor Mosmann to protect a 7-run lead with six balls to bowl.

Again, the confidence of SPX Yellow was tested with a boundary from the third ball of Victors over, however again the boys had a steely look in their eyes to scrap through to the end. The final test for the boys and Victor came with the teams tied at 89 runs each with one ball left to bowl. With the SPX Yellow fielders all up protecting the single, Victor bowled an off stump yorker which made it to the keeper Charlie Woolf, who calmly threw the ball back to the bowlers end to affect the run out and see the match tied.

Best of the SPX Yellow bowling was Lachlan Jurcevic with 2/9 off three overs, Nikolai Dimantha 1/9 from 3 overs and Charlie Woolf with 1/10 from 3 overs.

On reflection neither side deserved to lose and for SPX Yellow, they can take a moral victory knowing they had to bat in tougher conditions in the morning to accumulate its runs. It was an exciting finish for all the players and parents who sat through the early rain and showed the scrappy fighting qualities of a good SPX team that has already shown improvement from the beginning of the season.
