

Liturgical Jottings

Symbols of the Ascension While the event and mystery of the Ascension of the Lord are expressed through the readings, prayers and hymns of the feast, they fall short of expressing the marvellous actions of God and the yearnings of our hearts and minds. We also employ the arts, signs and symbols. Years ago the Paschal Candle was extinguished after the Gospel: a sign of risen Lord ascending into heaven Now the candle is extinguished at Pentecost, the end of Easter Season. Incense is a sign of our prayers raising up with Christ to heaven. Art depicts Christ rising and seated on the throne surrounded by angels and saints, hands often outstretched both reaching upwards into heaven and embracing the world in prayer.

Looking at the Readings

Today's Gospel ends in the temple at Jerusalem, just where the Luke's Gospel begins. Zechariah was serving in the temple when he received the message that he will have a son, John (1:5-20). The Apostles, after witnessing Jesus' "withdrawal" into heaven, returned to Jerusalem and "were continually in the temple giving thanks to God." (24:51-53). Jesus spent his last week in the temple before his death, Peter and John performed their first miracles in the temple. The First Reading starts in Jerusalem (1:1-12) and ends in Rome (Ch 28). Luke symbolises the journey of Christ and the Apostles from Jerusalem then to go out to all nations (Lk 24:47) and to the ends of the earth (Acts 1:8).

The Ascension is more than a historical event, it is a mystery of faith and an extension of Jesus' ministry to bring forgiveness of sins and to admit us into the sanctuary of heaven. We express this in images and rituals: the glory of Christ in heaven, our participation in his new life through Baptism and Eucharist.

Today we rejoice with all peoples the hope of heaven, the guarantee of new life and the commandment to go out into the world with confidence.

Ouote of a Saint on the Ascension

"On this day has ascended to heaven the new and spiritual bread, and all the mysteries have been revealed in your Body, raised like an offering. Blest be this bread, O Lord! As light falling from heaven, he was born of Mary, like a divine seed, fell from the cross like a ripe fruit, and was raised to heaven as one raises the first fruits." St Ephrem, deacon and doctor of the Church (d. 373)

Prayer for the Day

Lord Jesus, you came to your own people and gave to all who welcomed you power to become children of God. In your merciful love watch over the Church and through her ministry bring salvation to the meek and lowly. May we avoid the snares of the impious, and come to rejoice in glory with your saints.

<u>REFLECTION FROM FR PETER</u>

The feast of the Ascension celebrates the end of Jesus' earthly work and a return he makes to God his Father. Luke's Gospel describes Jesus' rising into heaven. While we in faith make sense of Jesus' earthly ministry as continuing his mission. This coming week sees us in our Church deepening God's call for us to be in a week of NATIONAL RECONCILIATION (which began last Thursday with SORRY DAY). **"Be Brave. Make Change"** is the theme we follow. As with the Ascension we are left with matters in faith to carry out. This year our week of National Reconciliation invites we be brave in our work places, home life, with people close to us.

It's a tradition the week between the Ascension and Pentecost Sunday (next week) we see how the importance of CHRISTIAN UNITY is a source of life in welcoming people from other faith traditions with our own. Christian Unity was a principle strongly encouraged from the Second Vatican Council referred as an ECUMENICAL COUNCIL.

Ours is a time to see others in community mindful of their faith background in all they bring and contribute.

So there is bit going on It's also COMMUNICATIONS SUNDAY ! Listening with the ear of the heart, is the call from Pope Francis. In light of the Ascension and in our anticipation of Pentecost, we seek a closer communication God brings into our prayer and faith works this week. Pope Francis makes a point of seeing WORDS lead to listening and IMAGES leading to wonder.

This week is one where the words used and images we see giving relationship for our community to see who we are Sisters and Brothers of God in and through the Holy Spirit our life force in faith. Listening to the voice of the Holy Spirit is always ground breaking. Reconciliation is a voice coming from within. Listening to this voice moves one from the "I" to the "WE", in a moving out to others. In the busyness of our lives this coming week gives us time to put aside a little of our technical devices and to listen from the heart where God is calling us to be

READINGS FOR NEXT SUNDAY 5th JUNE 2022

First Reading

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak different languages.

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech.

Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome – Jews and proselytes alike – Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

Second Reading

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

People who are interested only in unspiritual things can never be pleasing to God.

Your interests, however, are not in the unspiritual, but in the spiritual, since the Spirit of God has made his home in you. In fact, unless you possessed the Spirit of Christ you would not belong to him. Though your body may be dead it is because of sin, but if Christ is in you then your spirit is life itself because you have been justified; and if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, then he who raised Jesus from the dead will give life to your own mortal bodies through his Spirit living in you.

So then, my brothers, there is no necessity for us to obey our unspiritual selves or to live unspiritual lives. If you do live in that way, you are doomed to die; but if by the Spirit you put an end to the misdeeds of the body you will live.

Everyone moved by the Spirit is a son of God. The spirit you received is not the spirit of slaves bringing fear into your lives again; it is the spirit of sons, and it makes us cry out, 'Abba, Father!' The Spirit himself and our spirit bear united witness that we are children of God. And if we are children we are heirs as well: heirs of God and coheirs with Christ, sharing his sufferings so as to share his glory. **The Word of the Lord**
