### St. Andrews Cathedral – St. Pius X College

A hard-fought innings by him alongside Liam Hunt and Spida McConnell gave the Pius boys a glimmer of hope. SPX Yellow vs St Augustine's Green

St Augustine's Green – 6 for 151 at the end of the 30<sup>th</sup> over. SPX Yellow – all out for 92 in the 26<sup>th</sup> over. St Augustine's win by 59 runs

After a wash out the week before against the St Augustine's White side, "*Ground Hog*" day returned for SPX Yellow with a match against the second of the St Augustine's side , *Augustine's Green* at Nolan's oval North Manly.

The team arrived to a Nolan's ground to be greeted with the usual condition of long grass in the outfield and a layer of morning dew several centimeters think to cover the whole pitch and outfield. This was always going to be a bat first decision for the toss and unfortunately as the home team, our opponents called correctly to bat first and bowl later that morning once the sun had poked itself through the cloudy skies.

SPX bowling trio of Darcy Keenlyside and Declan Carroll went about their usual craft in bowling excellent line and length to open the bowling innings, with Darcy dislodging the off stump bail of the Augustine's opener in the 5<sup>th</sup> over. With confidence growing in the SPX bowling contingent , the red kookaburra ball was slowing getting wetter and softer and attempts to dry it between overs was futile. With a wet and soft ball to contend with, the Augustine's batting pair commenced its batting master class of the day , with their number three batsman particular savage on the SPX spin bowling and seamers. It was a chanceless innings by the Augustine's batter who retired not out at 55 and with the score at 1 wicket down for a 115. With a further 11 overs to come and the possibility of having to chase a score around 170 / 180, the SPX bowlers knuckled down to slow the scoring and retire the St Augustine's innings at a score of 151.

The highlight of the SPX bowling was Xander Buckingham's figures of 3 overs, 1 maiden 2 wickets for 9 and considering this is Xander's first season of cricket, his development over the summer months is a credit to the work he puts in each week at training. Other bowling notables were Lachlan Jurcevic with 3 overs, 2 wickets for 17; Darcy Keenlyside with 3 overs 1 wicket for 6; and Antony DiMauro 4 overs 1 wicket for 19.

With a batting target that was never going to be easy on a slow outfield, the SPX top order batsmen battled hard to try and develop partnerships to keep ahead of the scoring rate and also try and hit shots over the infield given the long grass. The lone survivor of the top order was the teams "*Mr. Consistency*" in Lachlan Jurcevic who retired not out at the 15<sup>th</sup> over with the SPX score at 4 for 60. *Ground Hog* day unfortunately saw another middle order collapse by SPX Yellow with the tail enders also sacrificing their wickets for an unlikely win. With SPX Yellow bowled out for 92 in the 26<sup>th</sup> over, the boys came off knowing it wasn't their best effort of the year in either batting, bowling or fielding, with extras again providing 24 extra runs to the St Augustine total.

Notable batters for SPX Yellow were Lachlan Jurcevic with 29 and Andrew May with 10 as no other SPX Yellow batter reached double figures on the day.

With most of the boys disappointed at the effort, and all in agreement it was their poorest showing of the year, each agreed there was much work to do yet to guarantee a place in the finals and that hard work would commence at training on Thursday.

Sometimes though it's not your day and you have to respectfully applaud the St Augustine's batter who returned later in the St Augustine's innings to finish 71 not out.

The boys will regroup and come back stronger next week.
