We began 2019 with only two committee members to oversee events, which was daunting to say the least. Huge thanks to the outgoing Chair of 2018, Tanya Pittard, who stayed on to help me, the incoming Chair, navigate this incredible responsibility. At the beginning, our lack of ability to encourage and retain volunteers was a great concern. The reduced team with which we started the year was in part a result of volunteer burnout in preceding years, and it was something we grappled with as the months progressed.

Nevertheless, we persisted, and I'm proud of our team and the hardworking folks who gave so much along the way - namely Emily Myer, Liz O'Neill, Tamsin Downes, and Tash Colangelo, upon whom we could always count to ensure the success of our events.

2019 saw a few changes to our usual event line up - the End of Term Barbecues were organised and run by Sprout, we had no bigger Term 4 event (last year's Movie Night), there was the addition of Co-Motion and Art Attak, and much discussion was had around a policy for community members interested in hosting events.

Events in 2019

International Food Night

The International Food Night is the first event on the calendar that brings the BNWPS families together. Financials

We were unable to provide concrete financial information to Council and the wider school community in 2019 about total funds raised, due to the issues faced by the finance department throughout that year. The Winter Magic Market total in particular took some time to ascertain, with confusion around expenditure impacting on the finance department's ability to calculate a final profit amount. Early in 2020 it was announced we had raised \$64,041 across our community events, which represents a fantastic effort from the BNWPS students, staff and families in such a trying year. This amount is indeed a dip from preceding years, which could be accounted for by a number of things, including

inclement weather at the Winter Magic Market, (our largest fundraiser), fewer volunteers, lower Trivia Night attendance, and the absence of a Term 4 event.

In conclusion

It would be no exaggeration to say CET absolutely cannot function without volunteers, either for an hour or a year. It is because of them we can continue to enrich our community with fun events and bump up our school coffers with the money raised. Our deep gratitude goes to every single person who took time out to contribute to the success of the Brunswick North West events, which are absolutely vital for our school's success.
