THE MOST HOLY TRINITY REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate Painting the Picture of God

The Feast of the Trinity of God comes about because Jesus painted a picture of the most intimate communion of Divine Life between Himself, the Father, and the Holy Spirit. This is a relationship and yet the most perfect unity.

God is Divine pulsating, shimmering light dancing in threefold exchange of love. In fact, the best name for God is 'Being-in-Love'. What does this mean for us?

How often have you heard: 'You are made in the image and likeness of God'? If God is threefold Being-in-Love, then you and I are made to live in relationship – not in solitary. We are totally on the wrong track if we think that the ultimate good is to be self-sufficient. It will turn out to be a Hellish choice. When we live as much self-giving as is possible, we are closest to Divine Life. In fact, we are Divine Life pulsating into a particular time and place through us.

Each time we bless ourselves, a bit of a Catholic routine, we are invoking the threefold exchange of love and calling its power into our life. Be careful, there will be consequence! You could become more God-like!

We could pause for a moment, slowly make the Sign of the Cross which recalls our baptism: 'In the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit', and promise to image that Name in our lives.

June 15 - June 21: Refugee Week Finding Freedom – Diversity in Community



The theme of Refugee Week this week is *finding freedom* – *diversity in community*. It responds to the public attitude to refugees both in Australia and in

the world at large. In a time of economic hardship, political upheaval and expanding wars, refugees and their search for a secure and free home receive only irregular attention. They are often seen as competitors for support, housing, employment and education in a fragile economy. They are also often demonised for their difference and imagined threat to security.

In response to refugees many nations have imitated Australia in refusing them entry, detaining them, or banishing them to inhospitable places. The United States, built on the contribution of refugees, has now led the

world in its hostility to them and long-standing immigrants. It has initiated a campaign to send millions of people back to nations where they may face poverty and imprisonment. Many of them have lived and built a life and family over many years in the United States. The effects of this treatment on them cannot be calculated in numbers only. Its real measure is the pain of refugees at the loss of a resting place, of hopes for children and of freedom, and the shame of citizens at what Governments do in their name.

When power, prejudice and self-interest override the respect due to each human being, the most vulnerable members of society are everywhere left defenceless in the face of closed borders, xenophobia, the withdrawal of funding, rejection, punishment and imprisonment.

In the face of this grim scene the theme of Refugee Week is both a call for compassion and a badge of hope. It reminds us that refugees seek freedom and that nations are at their best when they build diversity in community. This is the humane vision enshrined in the United Nations Convention on the status of Refugees and the subsequent Protocol, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, and in the body of international law and agreements. Underlying these documents is the conviction that each human being is precious regardless of race, religion, behaviour and wealth, and so must be respected in in the laws and conduct of each nation.

In the Christian Gospel the unique value of each human being and the respect due to each person are nonnegotiable. At the centre of Christian faith is God's costly love of sinners. We are invited to embody this love in our relationship to one another, especially to people most in need. The early Christians in the Roman Empire embodied this faith in ways that drew their neighbours to Christ's message. In a world where people who fled from war in other towns routinely found the gates shut against them, Christians welcomed and fed them. Where Christian faith is strong, such stories of a practical love that scorns harsh laws will always be told. They are told in many Catholic communities in Australia and invite us to reach out to people who are different, especially to those who have fled from persecution in their own lands.
