Australian Apprenticeship Readiness Quiz

The Australian Apprenticeship Readiness quick quiz helps identify if you might benefit from extra support during your apprenticeship. It's not a formal assessment and won't affect your ability to start training. The quiz has 10 questions and takes about 10 minutes to complete. You can use a calculator if you need one. In Year 12 and wanting an apprenticeship - start looking now!

Finding an apprenticeship or traineeship can feel overwhelming, especially if you're not sure where to start. MEGT, a Group Training Organisation, provides employment and training options for school students and school leavers. Storeperson - a job option for straight after school!

A storeperson receives, checks and examines the inventory of stock that arrives in warehouses and storage facilities where stock is held. Incoming goods are cross referenced against the invoices to ensure there are no discrepancies. Day-to-day activities include:

- unload vehicles, open packages and remove contents

- operate computers to obtain details of location and quantity of items in stock
- label goods with details of storage location
- pack and weigh goods and seal boxes
- operate machines and handle equipment to lift, place and remove goods on high levels
- operate specialised equipment, such as manually and electronically guided order pickers
- check goods off the packing list or invoice
- assist with regular stocktakes.

5. Take a Fitness Test if required
6. Attend Enlistment and Appointment day

What is a Vocational Education and Training (VET) qualification?

The National Careers Institute says that a vocational education and training (VET) qualification is a formal certification awarded by a training provider in recognition of the successful completion of an occupational or work-related knowledge and skills-based educational program. There are eight types of [VET qualifications](#):

- Certificate I, II, III and IV
- Diploma
- Advanced Diploma
- Graduate Certificate
- Graduate Diploma.

All VET qualifications must be listed on the National Register, training.gov.au. Visit the Australian Qualifications Framework [website](#) for more information regarding VET qualifications.

Not sure what is involved in Nursing and the pathways it can take you? Well, [check out the following options here](#):

- Registered Nurse
 - Aged Care - care to the elderly in community settings, residential aged care facilities, retirement villages and health care facilities.
 - Critical Care and Emergency - to critically ill patients and patients with unstable health following injury, surgery or during the acute phase of diseases, integrating new technological equipment into care in settings such as high dependency units, intensive care units, emergency departments or retrieval services.
 - Mental Health - care to patients with mental health illness, disorder and dysfunction, and those experiencing emotional difficulties, distress and crisis in health, welfare and aged care facilities, correctional services and the community
 - Paediatrics - care to children of all ages, including neonates, across a range of health and community settings with an emphasis on assessing children's acute and ongoing needs while taking into account physical, social, cultural and family circumstances
 - Child and Family Health - care to children and their families, with an emphasis on the prevention, early detection of, and early intervention in, physical, emotional and social problems affecting children and their families
 - Practitioner - provide advanced and extended nursing care to patients
 - Surgical - care to patients with injuries and illness that require surgical intervention
 - Medical Practice - clinical care to patients, undertake clinical organisation and practice administration
 - Perioperative - care to patients before, during and immediately after surgery
 - Community Health - health counselling, screening and education to individuals, families and groups in community focusing on patient independence and health promotion
 - Developmental Disability - care to people with intellectual and development disabilities in a range of health, welfare and community settings.
 - Disability and Rehabilitation - care to patients recovering from injury and illness and assist and facilitate patients with disabilities to live more independently.
 - Other (not covered above) - Flight Nurse, Nursing Officer (Defence Forces), Registered Nurse (Infection Control) and Registered Nurse (Remote or Rural Area).

Government allowances for students

ABSTUDY is a Government payment that helps Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students and apprentices with study-related costs such as accommodation, living expenses, travel and some medical costs. To be eligible, you must be enrolled in an approved course and meet the relevant requirements. The amount you receive depends on factors such as your age, study load, income and whether you're considered dependent on a parent or guardian. Use the school holidays wisely - Work experience and/or exploration may be a good option

An important strategy in career exploration is experiencing the job you are interested in. This can be undertaken in many ways:

- Work observation – spending a day or more with someone already in the job at their workplace
- Career interview – developing a list of questions and interviewing someone already in a job you are investigating
- Work experience – spending some time (a week if possible) in the job
- Investigating courses by visiting institutions and talking to them about their courses
- Getting a part-time job or volunteering in a job you are interested in
- Doing a course or workshop that relates to the type of work you want to do.

The school holidays are a perfect time to do some of these activities. If you need help organising an activity, speak to your school Guidance Officer/Counsellor/VET Coordinator for some assistance. You need to talk to them about getting insurance for any workplace related activities such as, Work Experience.



Applying for courses interstate

If you are thinking about applying to a university outside Queensland, you need to apply to the relevant Tertiary Admission's Centre (TAC). Find course information on the TAC websites below. You can have multiple applications running at the same time through different TACs but you need to be sure that you understand and follow the application process as it can vary from TAC to TAC. Year 12 post school information management

In Year 12? You should start a folder (electronic or paper) of information you will need later in the year and early next year. Add to it during the year. Items that could be placed in this folder include:

- Learning Unique Identifier (LUI) number and password for your Learning Account so you can access your Year 12 results early. You will also be required to know your LUI to complete your QTAC application.
- Tax File Number (TFN), which you will need when applying for a HELP loan next year. You also need a TFN if you want to be paid for a full-time or part-time job.
- Unique Student Identifier (USI) A USI is your individual education number for life. Without one, you can't get Commonwealth financial assistance or your qualification or statement of attainment.
- Course, job and tertiary entry information you gather at career markets/expos, institution open days, TSXPO, etc.
- The list of courses you are considering (if you haven't a clue, make an appointment to see your Guidance Counsellor/Officer ASAP!!).
- If you're thinking about Uni, a list of Pathway and Early Offer schemes for the university/ies you are interested in studying at
- Handouts on tertiary entry you are given at Year 12 assemblies, expos and lunchtime talks.
- Information about available scholarships and tips for submitting a great application.
- Additional qualifications you might wish to submit as part of your QTAC application and/or portfolio particularly if applying for EAS
- QTAC access to the online [Year 12 2027 Guide](#)
- Any other information related to your plans for 2027.

Exam stress and top tips to de-stress

[Griffith University offers a range of adjustment factor schemes](#) that may boost your selection rank for entry. These include subject adjustments, Brisbane Community Engagement, Gold Coast and Logan Priority Access, the Educational Access Scheme (EAS), Elite Athlete Support and incremental adjustments for the Bachelor of Medical Science. Some key schemes include:

- Up to 6 adjustment factors for eligible Year 12 subjects (up to 2 per subject) and up to 4 for Griffith's Head Start program.
- 2 adjustment factors through the Brisbane Community Engagement Scheme for eligible students living in Brisbane, Logan, Ipswich or Redlands.
- 2 adjustment factors through the Gold Coast and Logan Campus Priority Access Scheme for eligible local applicants.
- Up to 8 adjustment factors through the Educational Access Scheme for students who have experienced financial or educational disadvantage.
- Up to 6 adjustment factors for eligible elite athletes through QTAC.
- Incremental adjustments for applicants to the Bachelor of Medical Science.

Please note:

- The maximum adjustment factors you can receive across all Griffith schemes is 8.
- Most adjustments are considered as part of your QTAC application.
- Some courses are excluded so check the Griffith website for full details.

Using VET and other alternative qualifications for competitive entry to Griffith University

Griffith University recognises VET qualifications as a valuable pathway into university. If you complete a standalone VET qualification while at school, you may be considered for admission even if you are not ATAR eligible. QTAC can assess your VET qualification on its own or alongside your senior school results when you apply for Griffith courses. Adjustment factors pathway

Adjustment factors can boost your Selection Rank by adding extra rank points based on things like where you live or the subjects you studied. At UniSQ, eligible adjustment factors are capped at 10 selection ranks and are automatically applied by QTAC when your application is assessed. The Bachelor of Biomedical Sciences (Medicine Pathway) has different rules, with a maximum of 5 adjustment ranks available. Subject incentive adjustments are applied automatically but you will need to provide supporting documentation if you want to be considered for the Rural Access Adjustment Scheme.
