It was back to the home ground for SPX Yellow for this week's round 7 game against Cromer in the MWJCA under 15's. With very hot and uncomfortable conditions expected by mid-morning, the toss was won by Cromer and with no great surprise they decided to bowl and field in the cooler morning conditions.

SPX Yellow opened the batting with its reliable opening pair of Lachlan Jurcevic and Flynn Pavely, with both openers showing strong early signs of another good opening stand. Lachlan was the first wicket to fall with the score on 44 to a swinging ball into the pads, with his opening partner Flynn following soon after. With the openers now back in the pavilion it was Victor Mosmann who steadied the ship and with Nikolai Dimantha also at the crease the two put on a solid partnership to have SPX Yellow comfortable placed at 3 for 80 at the halfway mark on the innings. With the temperature now over 30 degrees by 9.00am, some wonderful late batting from the ever-improving Darcy Keenlyside (who reached his best ever batting top score) and Antony DiMauro saw the team close their innings at 6 wickets down for 169. Special mention goes to Victor Mosmann who hit a wonderfully crafted 49 and who was unlucky not to reach his half century having been caught out on his last ball before his compulsory retirement. Other notable scores on the day was, Flynn Pavely with 26 and Darcy Keenlyside with 23.

With the temperature now hovering around 33 degrees and the team well hydrated, SPX Yellow opened their bowling attack with Declan Carroll and Eamon Boyle, with Declan making the break - through in his second over of the day with a lovely swinging ball that was adjudged to be hitting the middle stump of the Cromer opener. A mix up in calling saw second Cromer wicket fall and the Cromer team was now well behind the run rate and two wickets down for not so many. The combination of the oppressive heat and early exhaustion saw a number of half chances dropped by the SPX Yellow fielders as they squeezed the life out of the Cromer run rate but found it difficult to see further wickets fall. A re-think at the 15 over break along with an intake of fluids saw normal transmission resume, with Ben Vacarella and Nikolai Dimantha the chief destroyers of the Cromer middle order, with now Cromer the team melting away on the 35 degree as they battled to reach the 30 over mark.





The return of Declan and the introduction of Victor Mosmann saw the end of the Cromer innings for 94 in the 28th over just as the umpires were about to question the rule. Highlights of the SPX bowling innings was a wonder outfield catch by Lachlan Jurcevic that wouldn't look out of place in the Big Bash and Flynn's normal one handed first slips catch which you can never get sick of seeing.

The matched ended just in time for SPX Yellow as many of the boys were nearing heat exhaustion and were in need of a rest. This contributed to the unusually high sundries for the innings and will be something the boys will need to watch if they are to go far in the season. There are several points to take from this match. Clearly, we didn't score enough runs. We never got over 3 runs /over. We need to address that. The positives regarding the batting was that we lost minimal wickets. We had 2 x batsmen retire due to the 15 over rule and lost 4 wickets in our 30 overs. That's not bad considering we were playing the comp leaders. Regarding the bowling, that would have been difficult as explained. We did however bowl to short- in effect we bowled to the batsmen's strength and didn't pressure them at all. Something to consider. Carroll executed a spectacular runout before snaring two wickets, both caught and bowled to finish the game in the 21st over.

Round 3 vs St. Augustine's @ Passmore Oval.

Round 4 vs Seaforth Stingrays @ Passmore Oval.

Having lost the toss the SPX boys were having a bowl early. McCallum and O.G.H Freeman were batting beautifully with both retiring after 35balls. The left handed McCallum had been particularly strong square of the wicket, with anything short being dispatched. The rest of the SPX boys got stuck in with Gleeson 23* a highlight, but a late flurry of wickets saw McCallum and Freeman back in the centre. McCallum picked up where he had left off as he feasted on the Seaforth bowlers. Freeman 35* was focused on giving as much strike as he could to his partner, his smart and unselfish batting helped McCallum bring up his first fifty of the season, and the highest score of anyone in his family at this ground! 6-197 after 30 overs. The outfield was fast and the pitch firm, with an even covering of green grass. R. Chang looked very sharp in his blazer as he ran second in the coin toss and St. Augustine's decided to have a bat. The SPX openers, Meares and Opie bowled full and fast, with both boys continually beating the outside edge before Opie sent the stumps flying. The left arm spin of L.
