Liturgical JottingsGospel Sequence

The Gospels from the sixth to the ninth Sundays in Ordinary time is a literary sequence and forms a catechetical session. After the two major passages of the Sermon on the Mount (Beatitudes, 4th Sunday and "Salt of the Earth, 5th Sunday) the Sermon continues through chapters 5&6 of Matthew. These next two weeks the tone changes from the previous weeks. Jesus has very vibrant words of instruction in general principles, with practical ways to live and an encouragement to deepen faith. Lent both interrupts this sequence and adds to it.

6th Sunday (Mt 5:17-37) Jesus comes to complete the law and teaches ways to deepen our ways of just and right living

7th Sunday (Mt 5:38-48) Jesus exhorts us to love not only our neighbour but also our enemies.

8th-10th Sundays omitted in 2023 Ash Wednesday (Mt 6:1-6,16-18) on prayer, fasting and almsgiving.

Focus on the Readings

Ben Sirach wrote: "God, himself created human beings in the beginning, and then left them free to make their own decisions". Eccles 15:14 RNJB, one verse shy of today's first reading. The French philosopher Jean-Paul Sartre came up with the term, "Condemned to Freedom" and since creation, Ben and John-Paul, we have struggled with our freedom and our conscience. To go further we have the choice of life and happiness, or death and wretchedness. God responds according to our choices with blessings or condemnation.

St Paul bridges the first reading with the Gospel, calling to mind God's wisdom in which we find life and glory. And Jesus took the commands of the Old Testament and with his words of wisdom asked his listeners to not only make the right choices but go deeper, the extra mile, and beyond just the letter of the law but to practise it's real meaning and spirit. Again from creation we are free and responsible, peaceful and happy, loving and faithful, yet we need to discern what is good and have the will and grace to do it.

REFLECTION FROM FR PETER

There is degree of thought the first reading with the Gospel give requirement to a relational commitment in living out God's desires for a more harmonious world. Last week Pope Francis undertook a pastoral visit to the Democratic Republic of the Congo and South Sudan. Youtube is a great means to view visits like these. Pope Francis was strong in pleading for two lands often experiencing civil unrest, corruption and other means of preventing countries from progressing. In one gathering in South Sudan was an ecumenical gathering with the Archbishop of Canterbury and the moderator of the Church in Scotland.

While pastoral visits like these might be along way off from us here there is thought on how we see ourselves from countries experiencing different tensions and uncertainties. The ideals offered from the Gospel might be on side with law making and living, do give us a strength in being people who build the life of the Kingdom with a code for better and improved living. Given our own tensions for living lives open and engaging, I wonder what teachings Jesus would offer today?

Many today are caught up in a mentality of living with codes strapped around one's neck as if to say'this is the only way!". Jesus is saying living with healing, openness to reconciliation, is a teaching for people to see and where fullness in life is achievable. It's a good thing our reading of this Gospel is to hear Jesus reassuring life and love go hand in hand and for a loving invitation to be received in our freedom through faith and committed living.

INTERNATIONAL ASPERGER'S DAY 2023 International Asperger's Day 2023 is on February 18, a time to promote and celebrate neurodiversity in our community. Most Australians have heard of autism, yet only 29% say they would know how to support an autistic person. Young people with diverse abilities, like we see in those with Asperger's, can train and learn skills. Many programs which assist transition from school to employment are funded via NDIS plans. These programs will help those who are interested in social interaction, but may be socially awkward or unfamiliar with conventional social rules.

Don't assume you know what an Asperger needs -- always ask them. Pay attention to the words you use because body language, facial expressions and gestures may not be noticed. Include predictable schedules in your daily routines -- they will reduce anxiety and be much appreciated.

A reading from the book of Leviticus

You must love your neighbour, as yourself.

The Lord spoke to Moses; he said: 'Speak to the whole community of the sons of Israel and say to them: "Be holy, for I, the Lord your God, am holy.

"You must not bear hatred for your brother in your heart. You must openly tell him, your neighbour, of his offence; this way you will not take a sin upon yourself. You must not exact vengeance, nor must you bear a grudge against the children of your people. You must love your neighbour as yourself. I am the Lord."

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

All things are yours, but you belong to Christ and Christ belongs to God.

Didn't you realise that you were God's temple and that the Spirit of God was living among you? If anybody should destroy the temple of God, God will destroy him, because the temple of God is sacred; and you are that temple. Make no mistake about it: if any one of you thinks of himself as wise, in the ordinary sense of the word, then he must learn to be a fool before he really can be wise. Why? Because the wisdom of this world is foolishness to God. As scripture says: The Lord knows wise men's thoughts: he knows how useless they are, or again: God is not convinced by the arguments of the wise. So there is nothing to boast about in anything human: Paul, Apollos, Cephas, the world, life and death, the present and the future, are all your servants; but you belong to Christ and Christ belongs to God.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Love your enemies.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'You have learnt how it was said: Eye for eye and tooth for tooth. But I say this to you: offer the wicked man no resistance. On the contrary, if anyone hits you on the right cheek, offer him the other as well; if a man takes you to law and would have your tunic, let him have your cloak as well. And if anyone orders you to go one mile, go two miles with him. Give to anyone who asks, and if anyone wants to borrow, do not turn away.

'You have learnt how it was said: You must love your neighbour and hate your enemy. But I say this to you: love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you; in this way you will be sons of your Father in heaven, for he causes his sun to rise on bad men as well as good, and his rain to fall on honest and dishonest men alike. For if you love those who love you, what right have you to claim any credit? Even the tax collectors do as much, do they not? And if you save your greetings for your brothers, are you doing anything exceptional? Even the pagans do as much, do they not? You must therefore be perfect just as your heavenly Father is perfect.'
