
the city. The city of Sydney is located on the lands of the Gadigal people of the Eora Nation.

see for kilometres! During an information session, we learned that the bridge builders didn't have any safety gear which resulted in 16 fatalities.

The Rocks Walking Tour was our next stop. There, we split up into 5R and 5P. In The Rocks, we found out about the convicts that were set free for cooperating with the rules. Some of the highlights of the walking tour was when we could see the remains of the old houses, found out about the violent gangs that lurked in the alley ways, and that people would breed and make money from 'handing-in' rats to the government during the bubonic plaque period.

When our walking tour concluded, we went to Circular Quay to have our lunch in front of the Museum of Contemporary Art. Soon afterwards, we boarded a catamaran that showed us around the populated headlands and picturesque harbour. We were given lots of











information about what we saw over a loudspeaker. Standing at the front of the boat with the salty sea breeze in our hair, made us feel like we were passengers on the Titanic. It was such a calm day that we were lucky enough to venture out between North Head and Watson's Bay headland.
